Farewell Meeting.

A meeting to bid farewell to Rev. F. D. Crawley was held in the Baptist church in this city on Thursday evening. There was a large attendance, many besides members of the Baptist congregation being present. Hon. A. F. Randolph, one of the deacons of the church presided. The programme was as follows:

First hymn, Rev. G. B. Payson, (Methodist); Scripture lesson, Rev. Willard McDonald (Presbyterian); prayer, Rev. Mr. Davidson (Baptist); an address on behalf of the church and congregation, and presentation of a purse containing \$200 by H. C. Creed, clerk of the church; address on behalf of the Young People's Society, by Chas. McNally; music; addresses by Rev. W. D. Manzer (Baptist), and Rev. Joseph McLeod (Free Baptist); singing; benediction by Rev. F. D. Crawley. Rev. R. W. Weddall (Methodist) was not able to be present, but sent a note expressing his regard for the retiring pastor.

The addresses expressed the strong affection of the people for their pastor, and their regret that he was going away from them. Mr. Crawley's reply was a tender expression of his deep love for the people to whom he had ministered so long. He has been pastor of the church thirteen years, during which time it has enjoyed steady prosperity. About three hundred have, during his pastorate, been received by baptism. Mr. Crawley carries away with him the love of his church and the good will of the christian citizens generally. He intends to spend the winter in Boston, in study chiefly; and after that will become a pastor again.

On Saturday at noon the life of Susan Emery Badger, wife of William S. Badger, Esq., of this city, came to a peaceful close. Mrs. Badger had for some months been in feeble health, but more recently disease had made such rapid progress that her death was not unexpected. Her age was 70 years and 7 months.

Mrs. Badger was born on Feb. 18, 1823, at Boston, Mass., here her father, Mr. Joseph D. Emery, the architect, was in practice. He came to Maine to superintend the construction of the Augusta State House, and it was at Augusta on the 30th of November, 1846, that she married Mr. Badger, and from that time till her death Augusta has been her home.

Mrs. Badger leaves two sons—William S. Badger, J., now a resident of Abilene, Kansas, and Joseph Emery Badger, of this city, who is associated

with his father in the office of the *Maine Farmer*. Three sisters and two brothers survive her—Mrs. Sarah E. Prescott of this city; Mrs. Sarah E. Hope of Summerside, Prince Edward Island; Mrs. John R. Larrabee of Marysville, Cal.; Joseph H. Emery of Portland, and George R. Emery of Brooklyn, N. Y.

She was a woman of strong personality and of large acquaintance, and it is a widely extended circle of friends that will mourn her death. Her family ties were of the strongest, and as a wife and mother her memory will be cherished with tender affection.

The funeral services were held at the residence of Mr. Badger on Winthrop street, at half-past ten o'clock, Tuesday morning, being conducted according to the Episcopal service, by the Rev. Walker Gwynne. The bearers were Joseph A. Homan, Oscar Holway, Joseph H. Manley, and B. F. Parrott. Rare and beautiful flowers were furnished in profusion. The interment was in the family lot at Forest Grove Cemetery, *Maine Farmer*.

The deceased was aunt of the editor of the *Intelligencer*.
