News of the Week.

New Brunswick

A train of 15 freight cars, going east, and a locomotive, going west, collided near Penobscus Wednesday morning. Nobody was injured, but the engines were badly smashed and, also, some of the cars.

Wm. H. Murray, estimates that forty-seven and a half millions of lumber will be hung up on the tributaries of the St. John river this year, and that, some twenty-three millions are doubtful to come out.

Canterbury Station has suffered from a disastrous fire. The dwelling and store of Thos. Falconer, the dwelling and store of Miss M. London, the dwelling of Luke Lawson and his store in a separate building near his house were all destroyed with most of their contents. The total loss is about \$15,000. Mr. Lawson has \$4,275 insurance. Mr. Falconer, \$3,300; Miss London, \$3,150.

Brown Bros. of Corn Hill, Kings county, have recently placed two new cheese presses in their factory at that place.

Mrs. Robert Stothart, of Chatham, who was burned on Sunday, 28th of May, by the upsetting of a lamp has died of her injuries after much suffering.

The saw mill of Thomas Seely at Jones Creek, Greenwich, was destroyed by fire Thursday evening, together with some lumber. No insurance.

Good, charged with setting fire to the barn of Mr. E. Cliff, Kingston, was tried in the York County Court last week, and he was found guilty and sentenced to 10 years in penitentiary.

The trial of Mrs. Stevens, charged with manslaughter, is now going on at Dorchester.

D. McLeod Vince, Esq., has received notice from the P. M. General, that, acting on his suggestion, Post Office boxes of Woodstock will be placed at certain parts of the town for the convenience of the public.

Captain Timothy Daley's residence near Bathurst, was destroyed by fire Saturday morning.

The new cheese factory at Petitoctia opened a few days ago.

Agnes Melanson, aged 11, working in the Moncton cotton mill, was killed by being caught between the elevator and the floor, on Thursday.

On Thursday "the remains of a man were found at Anagnance Ridge in a black fallow by Alex. Elliott. Some gold and silver coins were found with the remains. The body has been there or a length of time."

On Saturday, Michael Gallagher went to the house of Robert Fowler, at Smithtown, Hampton, and shot Mrs. Charlotte Fowler. The bullet entered the neck.

There is uneasiness at Fredericton Junction, caused by the report that the location of that junction may be changed to a point about one and a half miles nearer St. John. It is stated that if a change should be made it will be in consequence of the refusal of some property owners to sell portions of their lands unless paid exorbitant prices.

Nova Scotia.

It is reported that a man is living in Cumberland county, now over 80 years of age, who is rather a novice. He says he never spent a copper for a newspaper, never mailed a letter, never was on a train, and always washes himself in hot water.

The public hall at Truro was burned Tuesday morning. The building occupied by Edwards & Gunn, produce merchants, and Bigelow's saterated water factory were also burned, and Colchester block and Victoria hall were badly damaged. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a lighted cigar cigarette.

Wednesday morning the saw mill at Noel Shore, belonging to Capt. Levi Denamore, together with a large quantity of deals, was totally destroyed by fire. No insurance.

The trial of William Mader, for the murder of Dennis Hyson at Mahone Bay in December last, resulted in a verdict of manslaughter.

The recent prevalence of fog on the coast of Cape Breton, has resulted in several vessels getting ashore.

Mrs. Henry Fuller, of Lower Horton was seriously burned Friday morning by her clothes catching from a fire outside the house. The injuries may prove fatal.

Everett Sampson, of East Bridge-water, Mass., mysteriously disappeared at Mira Gut, Cape Breton, on the 27th of May. He was there on a visit, and had considerable money about him. Foul play is feared. Sampson's wife belongs to Mira Gut. She is there sick, and her husband had come down from the States to see her.

The new chief of police of Halifax is making it warm for violators of the liquor law.

On March 11th last the body of David Tanner was found on the road near Blind Bridge, between Lunenburg and Black Rocks. At the coroner's inquest a verdict of "died from exposure" was returned. Last week information was laid before Justice Griffiths to the effect that Tanner was murdered by one James Wagner, who was in his company at the time. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of the accused.

At Northwest Arm, Cape Breton, a little girl, 9 years old, daughter of Hugh McDonald, was strangled by a falling window on Wednesday. She was going to a picnic, to which her parents had already gone. She barred the door from the inside and was getting out through the window when it fell over her neck, strangling her.

Other Provinces.

Geo. Pyke, who while accountant of the Imperial Bank at Toronto embezzled \$12,000 of the bank's funds, has reached Toronto in custody of detectives. Pyke surrendered himself at Kansas City a week ago.

Richard Carson's dwelling at New Glasgow Road, P. E. I., was destroyed by fire the other night and the inmates narrowly escaped cremation.

Another big fire in Newfoundland—in St. John's—26 families rendered homeless.

A new cheese factory at Belfast, P. E. I., with its contents, was burned Thursday. Loss \$1,200; no insurance. It was only handed over to the owners by the contractor on the previous night. Incendiaries suspected.

Mrs. Ann Lexington, aged 68, was burned to death, and her brother, Alexander Roger, aged 78, fatally injured, in a fire which destroyed their house in York Ont., Saturday.

A Catholic church at Longue Point, near Montreal, was burned Sunday.

United States.

During a fire at Omaha Sunday night a wall fell, killing five firemen.

The woolen mill of W. H. Estey, Houlton, was damaged by fire Friday. Insured.

Lizzie Borden, accused of murdering her father and step-mother at Fall River, Mass., nearly a year ago, is now being tried. The case attracts much interest.

Fargo, Dakota, had a disastrous fire on Wednesday. The loss is up in the millions, and two or three thousand people were made homeless.

A building, occupied by 300 or 400 government clerks in Washington, fell on Friday, and many lives were lost, besides many seriously injured. The first floor collapsed through weakness caused by excavation of a cellar, and in its fall loosened the supports of the other three floors, which fell with hundreds of clerks.

Edwin Booth, actor, died, in New York, on Wednesday.

Greenwood C. Bray of Shirley, Me., put four bullets into his wife, Thursday, two of which pierced her heart. He then fired three shots at her sister, but none took effect. Then he loaded the seven chambers of his pistol and fired one into his head. Domestic trouble separated him from his wife a month ago.

British and Foreign.

Despite the denials of the French local authorities, Spanish consuls in France continue to report the spread of cholera epidemic at several ports.

Fifty villages in Galicia and Bukovina have been partly destroyed by floods.

Sixty deaths from cholera were reported in Mecca Thursday.

Floods continue to cause great destruction in the province of Bukovina,

Austria. The river Czeremosz, Wednesday evening, burst through the temporary dams erected to stay its devastating course and submerged the town of Wischnitz. The town has a population of about 4,000. Many were drowned. Rows of houses were demolished. Thousands are homeless. The loss to property is very great.

Cholera has broken out in Narbonne, in the department of Ande, France. There were 70 deaths from cholera in Mecca Tuesday. The disease is on the increase.

AFRICAN SLAVE-TRADE.—Mr. Henry M. Stanley's recently published views on the African slave-trade have put the question very clearly before the public. Of all men, he is likely to give the most correct view of the present condition of the traffic and of what is necessary to be done. He says that the slave-trade has shifted his operations from the sea-coast to the coast of the lakes in the interior, and that he must be watched there with the same vigilance which has driven him from the sea coast. He makes one point which will produce a deep impression. He shows that the profit of the traders out of their nefarious business is only a wretchedly small percentage compared with the enormous destruction of life and permanent injury to the country caused by the traffic. The depopulation and ruin of whole districts have been going on in order that, after all destructions, only a scant one or two percent, remains to these rascals upon their work. At the same time, he has hopes of the result of the Brussels Conference, but blames England severely for remissness in carrying out her part of the agreement, alleging that in this respect she has been far behind Germany and France.

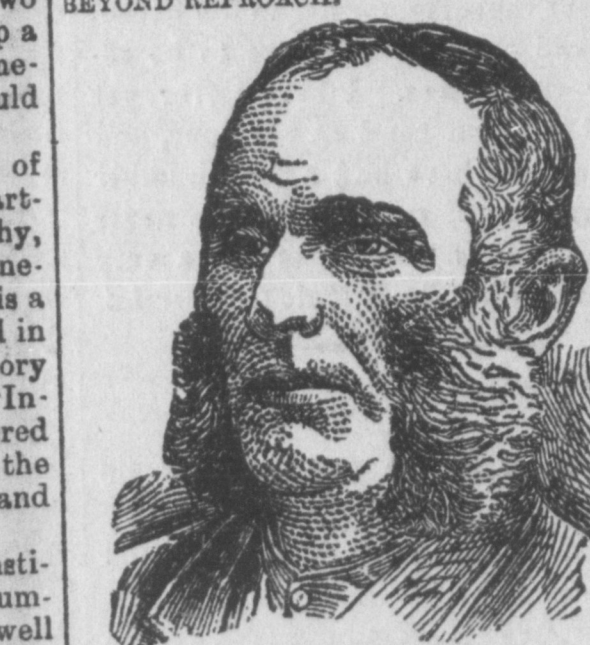
