News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A large brick house, on the corner of Waterloo and Cliff St., St. John, was destroyed by fire, Thursday morning. It was insured for \$10,000.

The Kingsclear creamery has closed down operations for the winter for want of sufficient cream to run the factory profitably.

After 12 hours suffering from the effects of a kick from a horse, John Kincaide, of Gagetown, Queens county, aged 19 years died.

Chesley Linton, fell through the railroad bridge at Bristol, C. Co., one day last week, and was killed. He had been drinking.

The Maryville lumber and lath mills have been running night and day for some weeks and will continue to do so till the river freezes over in order to cut out all the lumber in the Nashwaak stream.

It is understood that Geo. F. Baird, manager of the Star line, has made the government an offer to put on a steamboat between Fredericton and Woodstock for a subsidy of \$1,000 a year.

The Local government has dismissed Henry G. Fullerton, a justice of the peace for Victoria county.

Thursday evening the saw mill of Humphreys & Trites, Petitediac, was completely destroyed by fire. There was a large amount of sawn lumber of different kinds piled in the immediate vicinity of the mill, and this also was totally destroyed. The damage done is upwards of \$15,000. The mill was operated both by steam and water power. The property afterwards passed under the management of the Petitediac Lumber Company which was composed of Messrs. D. J. McLaughlin and L. H. DeVeber & Sons. After the failure of the Messrs. DeVeber the trustees disposed of the property to Messrs. Humphreys & Trites who have carried on extensive operations and was equipped with first class machinery and gave employment to about 35 hands. Insured for \$8,000.

It is understood that the York Agricultural society made a deficit of \$700 or \$800 on their exhibition held in September.

John Nesbit, sixty six years old, who lived in St. John many years ago and followed the tailoring business, died suddenly at Bristol, Carleton Co., on Friday.

A fire broke out at 1.30 Sunday morning in the woodshed attached to the dwelling of W. H. Vanwart on Brunswick street. The rear of the dwelling was badly damaged and the main building injured by the water. The damage will amount to \$200 or \$300, insured.

Summer Co., the largest shippers from Moncton, are sending their schooner, the Walter Sumner, Capt. Pye, to Barbados with an experimental cargo, consisting of 113,000 feet pine boards, 755 bushels potatoes and 386 bushels oats. If the shipment proves a success this firm, who own a fleet of schooners of their own, will probably engage quite extensively in the West India trade.

Nova Scotia.

The Windsor and Annapolis railway are said to be negotiating for the purchase of the Nova Scotia Central from Middleton to Lunenburg.

The Orange hall and Salvation Army barracks at North Sydney were burned last week.

On Friday night the tanning establishment of S. S. Henderson, Parrsboro, was burglarized. On Sunday morning it was destroyed by fire. The place was insured.

Arthur and George Palmer, brothers are under arrest at Kentville, charged with burglarizing the stores of Henry Farnsworth and S. H. Nicholls of Aylesford.

Between twenty and thirty new residences have been erected this season in Windsor, N. S.

The ticket office of the Nova Scotia Central railway at Bridgewater was burglarized Sunday night while the agent was at church and \$500 stolen.

Wm. Seeley, belonging to East Pubnico N. S., while attempting to throw a line from a dory to the steamer La Tour, a few days ago, fell overboard and was drowned. He was 51 years old and leaves a widow.

It is stated that the Yarmouth Steamship Company have sold the steamer Boston to the agents of the Brazilian government to be fitted up as a war cruiser. It is said \$320,000 in guaranteed Brazilian bonds were offered in payment, but gold was demanded. President Baker left Yarmouth for Boston on Saturday it is believed to conclude the sale. The steamer cost \$220,000 and has never paid the company.

The Church Point Roman Catholic glebe house, Digby county, was burned down early Sunday morning.

The C. P. R. telegraph company have completed their lines to Orangevale, Port Hastings, North Sydney and Sydney.

Schooner Florence M. Smith, ninety-nine tons register, is fitting out in Halifax for a sealing expedition to the Japan coast.

Steamship Yarmouth, of the Boston and Yarmouth Steamship Co., has been sold to Flint & Co., the New York agents of President Peixoto of Brazil. The sum paid is \$320,000.

John F. Daine and another workman were repairing the elevator at the cotton factory Halifax on Saturday near the top of the building. It started to descend, when it was found that something was wrong with the brakes and the elevator could not be stopped. One of the men jumped off but Daine did not, and went crashing to the bottom. He was picked up terribly injured but conscious and suffering fearful agony.

Other Provinces.

Regina, N. W. T. had a serious fire on Tuesday of last week. The loss is estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000.

In the Quebec Legislature the abolition of the Legislative Council was discussed at some length. The motion was defeated by 33 to 27.

Alfred Langan will be tried at Montreal for having tied little Joseph Menard, aged 12, to a bull's tail. The infuriated animal rushed off with the result that the little fellow was fearfully injured before he could be rescued.

Judge Gill has awarded Mrs. Williams, widow of the bell boy killed at the Windsor Hotel Montreal, by falling from the elevator shaft, \$1,500. The hotel company being held responsible.

The police census of 1891 gave the total population as 138,914. The census was taken because the people of Toronto thought the Dominion census, which gave it as 188,333 inaccurate.

The Christian Brothers' school at Ottawa has been burned. The loss is about \$50,000.

Another attempt has been made at Lorette to wreck one of the C. P. R. trains from Montreal. Ten deals heavily laden with stones were placed across the track. This is the fifth attempt to wreck trains at the same place last week.

Manitoba had a howling blizzard and heavy snow storm. It lasted a day and night.

A general election in P. E. Island will be held on December 14th, nomination December 7th. A prohibition plebiscite is to be held in connexion.

The seventh attempt in the last month to wreck the Montreal express between Quebec and Montreal occurred Monday morning near Cerette where six previous attempts were made. Sleepers with rocks piled on them were piled across the track. The superintendent, a-cries the dangerous work to a clever crank with a mania for train wrecking. United States.

Fifteen to eighteen inches of snow fell Thursday.

There are four cases of small pox in Boston.

John A. Drake, treasurer of the Indian, Illinois and Iowa Railroad Co., was said to have been robbed of \$20,000 in Chicago on Wednesday in the office of the company. Mr. Drake had the money in a little hand satchel, and was preparing to go out on the road to pay the employees. Two men felled him to the floor by several hard blows on the head, tore the satchel from his hand and escaped.

Edgewood Female Seminary, at Madison, Wis., a catholic institution conducted by Dominican Sisters and valued at about \$75,000, was destroyed by fire Thursday. Two girls lost their lives by suffocation.

Twenty thousand people on the Gogebic Range Wis., have been reduced to starvation by the continued inactivity of the iron mines.

Prairie fires are raging in the western part of Oklahoma territory, high winds prevail and are spreading them.

Thousands of dollars of damage done. Several people perished in the flames.

On Thursday, fire destroyed the Granite State Mills at Guild, N. H. The main mill was destroyed, but the connecting buildings were saved. The loss is estimated to be upwards of \$100,000. It is insured.

E. P. Barnard, an old citizen of Toronto, Kansas, shot and instantly killed his wife, daughter and himself on Sunday. He was 80, his wife 63 and daughter 36.

Last week a young son of Hon. T. H. Phair, of Presque Isle, in forcing a cartridge into a revolver, struck it with a stone, causing it to discharge, the shell lodging in the right eye, with the result of a total loss of the eye.

The financial condition of the city of Chicago is very distressing. At the beginning of next year the current liabilities will be \$1,300,000. The accounts of the city are in an almost inextricable muddle.

British and Foreign.

Fire in London on Wednesday destroyed thousands of pounds' worth of property. Cassell's publishing house was badly damaged.

The scarcity of coal caused by the miners' strike made it impossible for the town of Clitheroe, county of Lancaster, to get the necessary supply for the gas houses. All the streets are in darkness. The mills, shops and public buildings closed at night fall.

A despatch from Berlin says that since Nov. 10 there have been 27 fresh cases of cholera in the German Empire.

Last week the Steamer Boileau founded in the English Channel. The captain and sixteen of the crew lost.

Senor Mores, Spanish minister of foreign affairs, received from Brazil a telegram that Admiral Mello proclaimed Count D'euon emperor of Brazil. This son is Prince Pierre D'alcantara Louis Philippe, grandson of the late Dom Pedro.

Happily the Matabele war is as good as concluded, and Lobengula has ceased to be a power in the dark continent. He was at best a cruel and treacherous savage, and the utter overthrow of his power will be the advantage of humanity, civilization, Christianity and British prestige. Mr. Labouchere made much ado in the House of Commons because of the hard measure meted out to the savage Africaner; but Mr. Gladstone was able to tell the House that the British forces were justified in all they had done. Very few of the British lost their lives in the various conflicts that are hardly worth calling battles, but the number of savages that perished must have been considerable. It is satisfactory to know that this little war is over or very nearly over.

The boiler in a silk mill at Czernowitz, capital of Bukovina, Austria, exploded Saturday, killing 16 persons and injuring 20 others.

Reports of great damage in Scotland and the loss of vessels and lives along the Scotch coast, by last week's storm are continually received.

The storm Saturday, swept the United Kingdom and reports of ship wrecks have been received almost incessantly. The people of the Orkney Islands have suffered terribly. Many houses were unroofed yesterday, walls and barns levelled and haystacks blown out to sea. The whole plantation of Dunbeath Castle, Caithness, Scotland, was swept clean to the ground.
