News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The house and barn occupied by Dr. Moore, Salisbury, were destroyed Wednesday.

Keswick cheese factory, the butter and cheese factory at Keswick Ridge has begun operations.

Bathurst's school troubles continue. Some of those opposed to the school trustees' arrangements refuse to pay their taxes, and their property has been seized and will be sold.

The Moncton Sugar Refinery Company yesterday voted to amalgamate with the new Acadia Company, so that all the refineries of the maritime province will be under one management.

Diphtheria is at present quite prevalent in St. John and most of the cases known are dangerous ones. There are five patients in the hospital suffering from the worst type of the disease.

The total Gibson relief fund now amounts to about \$5,000.

The evidence taken in the Bathurst school enquiry by F. H. Risteen and Miss Marion Risteen makes seven volumes of 200 pages each and runs up to over 4,000 folios.

Saturday there was a fire in the I. C. R. lumber yard, Moncton. A number of cars on the track were removed with difficulty; three of them were badly damaged. Three piles of white pine lumber were destroyed.

Several small burglaries have occurred recently at Campbellton. Friday night, Mr. W. A. Mowatt, who had lost something on two or three occasions, caught Frank Leneveu. Two other young fellows, Kelly and Gallant, are concerned in the thieving.

One day last week, Mr. Albert T. Fawcett of Sackville, found two colts dogs busily at work among his sheep. Of 26 only three were untouched. Three were dead, five or six more wounded so that they will die and the remainder mangled more or less.

Nova Scotia.

Mr. Patrick Curran, assistant manager of the Nova Scotia Sugar refinery, dropped dead Wednesday evening.

D. J. Murphy, trackmaster of the Western counties railway, took up forty miles of old rails and laid forty miles of new steel rails in sixteen hours. They were lined and gauged and laid as fast as taken out of the steamer. Sidings and frogs were also put in. There are only ten miles of old rails between Yarmouth and Digby.

Kenneth McKay, aged 21, of Grand River, C. B., was drowned on Wednesday. He, with his father and two others, was hauling a mooring over the stern of the boat. The rope with the kellock attached slipped around to the side and the weight of the kellock overturned the boat. Young McKay, in attempting to swim to another boat near by, was killed. The three others clung to the overturned boat until rescued.

In Halifax a bar of gold weighing 233 ounces, valued at \$4,500, was taken Thursday morning from the Richardson mine at Isaac's harbor, being the production of their July crushing.

Richardson Harris, stipendiary magistrate, Annapolis, had the misfortune to fall from a step-ladder, Tuesday, which resulted in the fracture of a rib and other internal injuries.

Work is progressing on the Granville Ferry water works. The reservoir, it is expected, will be complete in about two weeks.

Mr. Reed, of Middleton, has shipped over 11,200 quarts of strawberries this season to Halifax and Boston markets.

By the upsetting of a sail boat in Halifax harbor, Friday evening, E. R. Harrington, a well known citizen was drowned.

Says the *Truro Sun*: "Reports say that cereals of all kinds will be an immense crop this season. Judging from the appearance of a four acre field on Foundry Hill, there can be little doubt about the success of the oat crop."

The hay crop in Upper Stewiacke will be scarcely more than half an average, being much injured by the severe frost of June 27th and subsequent drought. But the late rains have been most seasonable, and have assured excellent grain and root crops. Stock is likely to be very low this autumn on account of lack of fodder.

When an outbound train was nearing Fairview Thursday morning George Cook fell from the front platform of a car. He was picked up unconscious and bleeding from the ears and nose. One of his arms was broken near the elbow.

A meeting of Dartmouth ratepayers unanimously decided in favor of connecting the town with Windsor Junction by rail in preference to rebuilding the Narrows bridge. In the meantime the government is asked to lighten freight to Halifax from Dartmouth.

A correspondent of the Sydney Reporter says: "Wm. McKenzie of Farlo Mountain is supposed to be the oldest man in the maritime provinces. He is now in his 108th year. He says he was 30 years old the year the great

Napoleon fought at Waterloo. Mr. McKenzie is still hale, and can read without the aid of glasses. Last summer he walked 10 miles to a camp meeting.

Other Provinces.

It is stated that 11,000 acres of land near Calgary have been recently purchased and settled by citizens of Schuyler, Nebraska.

P. E. Island lobster packers at a meeting in Summerside, decided to prepare a petition to the minister of marine and fisheries praying that the fishing season, from West Cape to Sea Cow Head be from June 1st to August 20th inclusive.

Wheat harvesting has begun in several parts of Manitoba.

When it came to the question of accepting a reduction in their wages or lying idle for three months the Nanaimo, B. C., miners weakened. It is expected that the full reduction of twenty per cent. will be accepted, without much further discussion.

Nova Scotia and P. E. Island do quiet a large export trade with Newfoundland. In 1892 Nova Scotia sent thither \$584,439 worth of products, made up of coal, animals and products and nearly \$140,000 of manufactures. Prince Edward Island exported to Newfoundland a value of \$112,855, made up of farm products almost entirely.

It is reported that stock-raisers in the North-west are suffering great loss from wolves. Colts and calves fall easy victims to these rapacious animals. Hunting parties have been organized against the wolves, but without diminishing their numbers very materially. It is proposed that the government shall employ the Indians to kill off the wolves.

At Sarnia, Ont., Sunday, Roland aged 15, and Norman aged 11, sons of Alex. Mitchell, while driving across the railway track were struck by a train and killed.

An expert diamond driller is to resume this week, and carry to completion the sub-marine drillings started last summer in connection with the proposed tunnel under the Northumberland straits to connect Prince Edward Island with the mainland.

At St. Cunegonde, Que., Sunday, while four young men of this place were gunning on Saturday, all being under the influence of liquor, a gun in the hands of George Laberge was discharged and Joseph Poitras, aged 19, was instantly killed. The other three left the body where it fell but a boy who witnessed the shooting informed the police and Laberge was arrested.

United States.

A despatch from St. Paul states that 14,000 men are out of employment in Michigan, and that 6,000 more have to quit work in a few days. In St. Paul itself nearly 4,000 are idle.

The *World* says the stoppage of fifty-seven industries in New York city has thrown 30,000 men out of work, in addition to the number heretofore unemployed. Thousands of idle workmen are coming to the city from the west in search of work. The outlook is gloomy.

DISTRICT MEETINGS.

3. Third District Meeting, with the Church at Marysville, the third Friday in September. Ministers to attend, Revs. W. J. Halse, David Long, G. W. Foster and B. H. Noble. Rev. F. C. Hartley to preach the annual sermon.

Sale of Tobacco Prohibited.

The following act passed at the last session of the General Assembly, came into force on the first of July:

1. Any person who either directly or indirectly sells or gives, or furnishes to a minor under eighteen years of age, cigarettes, cigars, or tobacco in any form shall, on summary conviction thereof, be subject to a penalty of not less than ten dollars or more than forty dollars, with or without costs of prosecution, or to imprisonment with or without hard labor for any time not exceeding thirty days, or to both fine, with or without costs and imprisonment, to the said amount and for the said term, in the discretion of the committing Justice; and in case of a fine, or a fine and costs being awarded, and of the same not being, upon conviction forthwith paid, the Justice may commit the offender to the common goal, there to be imprisoned for any time not exceeding thirty days, unless the fine and costs are sooner paid.

2. This act shall not apply to a sale to a minor for his parent or guardian, under a written request or order of the parent or guardian.

3. A person who shall appear to the Justice to be under eighteen years of age shall be presumed to be under that age, unless it is shown by evidence that he is in fact over that age.

4. The Act of Assembly 53rd Victoria, Chapter 23, intitled An Act to prohibit the Sale of Cigarettes or Cigars to Minors, is hereby repealed.

ABOUT THE JEWS.—The Jews are

much more numerous and wealthy today than ever before in the history of the world. In the days of the greatest prosperity and power of the Jewish kingdom, under David and Solomon, they probably did not number all told more than five millions. Now they number considerably more than twice as many. In Asia, their original home, there are not more than half a million, settled in Syria, Persia, Arabia, India and China. Perhaps half a million more are to be found in Africa, chiefly in Morocco, the descendants of those Jews who, in the year of Columbus' discovery of America, were expelled from Spain. A considerable contingent is to be found in America. But the chief modern home of the Jew is eastern and central Europe, where they settled in the days of the Crusades. At one time the kingdom of Poland contained nine tenths of the Jews in the world. Two years ago there were in the Russian Empire, chiefly in its Polish provinces, fully five million Jews. In the Polish provinces of Austria there are two millions, and in Germany 750,000, and in the United States one million.

WORSHIP IN RUSSIA.—In reference to the temper of Russia respecting freedom of worship, Mr. George Kennan says in the current *Century*: "If the Saviour himself should appear, poor and unknown, in a Russian peasant village, as he appeared in Galilee nineteen centuries ago; if he should speak to the people the same words that he spoke in Galilee, and that are recorded in the four gospels, he would not be at liberty twenty-four hours. He would first be handcuffed and sent to the pale of settlement as a Jew, and then, if he continued to teach, he would be rearrested and thrown into prison. If he finally escaped crucifixion at the hands of the holy Orthodox Church which bears his name, it would be only because crucifixion has been superseded in Russia by exile, incarceration in the 'heretic cells' of remote monasteries, and deportation to the mines of the Trans-Baikal."

Surgeon Young stationed at Naples, reports the condition of affairs in that city regarding cholera, is growing worse.

Chinese advices say the depreciation of silver has brought business to a stand still in that country. In Japan affairs are equally as bad.

Mail advices from Costa Rica, South America, report a disastrous state of affairs throughout the country. A financial panic prevails on account of the condition of the silver market. Numerous failures have occurred and more are expected. Yellow fever is raging at Point Limon, where half the population are said to have fallen victims to the scourge.

An earthquake shock was felt Friday night in Charnwood forest, Eng. a district eight miles from Leicester. It was also felt in Leicester, but less distinctly.

UNFORTUNATE ARMENIANS.—The question of Turkish outrages upon Armenian Christians was again brought up in the House of Commons last week. Several members asked for information as to the charges made that the Turkish officials had tortured the persons who were some time ago arrested for complicity in the seditious rioting at Cessaria and Marsovan, in their efforts to get the accused to implicate themselves and others. In response to the questions Sir Edward Grey said that what little information the Foreign Office had on the subject was very painful. Fifty-six persons had been arrested, and of this number seventeen had been condemned to death, and many of the others sentenced to long terms of imprisonment. Subsequently the Sultan of Turkey commuted the death sentences of all but five of the prisoners. These five men have been executed within the past two or three days. From the evidence that had been given at the trials, all of which had been carefully investigated by the British representatives in Turkey and reported thereon forwarded to the Foreign Office, it was clear that two of the men executed, and probably more, were innocent of the charges made against them. The British representative in Constantinople had used his influence to convince the Ottoman authorities that the trials were unfair, but his efforts to have the wrong righted were in vain.

Thus set thinking, he recalled "several instances in which the children of physicians had fallen victims to scarlet fever and diphtheria, the cause being clearly traced to the disease brought home by their fathers." There can be no doubt that in the past contagious diseases have been spread abroad, have even become "epidemic," because physicians have been the media; but in the light of the present, and with sure disinfectants at hand, such work is simply criminal.
