Parliament.

Mr. Charlton moved the following resolution supporting it in a lengthy speech.

That in the opinion of this house the Canadian department of the Columbian exhibition should be closed on Sunday in accordance with British example at previous exhibitions, in deference to the Christian sentiment of the country, and as a recognition of the duty resting upon an avowedly Christian people to refuse by official act to do violence to Christian principles and to decline to lend aid or countenance to any course that will deprive official caretaker or laborer of Christian liberties or privileges, or will invite or compel any class of the population to violate divine requirements relating to the observance of the Lord's day as a day of rest.

After some discussion, a motion to adjourn the debate, which was practically defeating the resolution, was carried by 76 to 31.

Mr. Foster presented further correspondence between the dominion and Newfoundland and made a statement with reference to the French treaty, present minimum French tariff was as high, and in some respects higher than the general scale before 1892, when all old conditions were abolished and a two scale tariff substituted. On the articles mentioned in the treaty, France reduces on our exports to her the sum of \$30,416, while we reduce our tariff in her favor by \$82,929, taking as a basis the volume of trade as given in our trade and navigation returns. Mr. Foster further showed that by this treaty we get access to and said he would not ask the House to satisfy the treaty this year.

Hon. Mr. Laurier shared the views of the finance minister that there was nothing in the treaty to warrant its acceptance.

Dalton McCarthy moved his trade and tariff resolution, as follows: That since the introduction of the protective system sufficient time has elapsed for the establishment and development of such manufacturing industries as under existing conditions can be successfully carried on in Canada. Moreover, many manufacturers, sheltered under the ramparts thus erected, have formed combinations and trusts which prohibit competition, and thus create and maintain monopolies.

That the existing tariff, defensible only as a protective measure, has proved in many instances oppressive and burdensome to the great mass of the consuming classes, and especially to those engaged in agricultural pursuits; is unfair and unequal in its incidents and has been productive of discontent verging on disloyalty among those who suffer from its injustice.

That no sufficient reason has been advanced or exists requiring investigation respecting the foregoing facts, which are notorious, nor justifying delay in the passage of remedial legislation which is imperative.

That in the opinion of the house the tariff ought to be at once amended in respect to the matters herein indicated and also by the substantial reduction of customs duties in favor of the United Kingdom, in whose markets all Canadian products are admitted duty free, and of those nations which, under treaty obligations with Great Britain, would be entitled to the same advantage, graduated, however, so as not to unnecessarily prejudice the business of the country, nor to do wrong to those who have imported and paid duties in accordance with its provisions.

And the house declares its readiness to make a like reduction in favor of such other portions of the empire or with such other foreign countries, especially the United States of America, as are willing to reciprocate in matters of trade with Canada on fair and equitable terms.

He supported his resolution in an interesting and powerful speech. He asserted that the national policy was formulated to meet an emergency, and was not intended to be permanent, and that protection could only be justified to the extent its benefits to the people equaled the financial burdens it imposed.

Dr. Montague replied. He defended the position of the government on the tariff question and expressed confidence that they would do what was best for the country in the immediate future.

Dr. Weldon's bill to punish voters accepting bribes was discussed.

The first section, which was carried by 55 to 27.

The senate has passed the bill changing the name of the Western Counties Railway Co., to the Yarmouth and Annapolis Railway Co.

The vote of Mr. McCarthy's resolution showed yeas 64 nays 116.

Local Legislature.

Mr. Mitchell submitted the auditor general's report for the last year.

Mr. Mitchell introduced a bill providing for the redemption of provincial debentures falling due from next year to 1896 inclusive.

Dr. Stockton gave notice of motion that in the opinion of this house legislation should be had relating to crown debtors, placing the government on a footing of equality with private individuals.

Dr. Stockton gave notice of motion for a statement of sums borrowed from any bank and of any amount due at the close of year, with rate of interest charged.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted the estimates for 1893. They are as follows:—

Hon. Mr. Mitchell said the bonded indebtedness of the province had increased during the past year by \$241,500 over what it was at the close of 1891, when it was \$2,342,000. Mr. Mitchell referring to the statement of Dr. Stockton that the securities of the province had depreciated, contended that the rate of the sale of our bonds depended upon the state of the money market.

During the past year the total expenditure on current revenue account had been \$676,482.97, and the total receipts had been \$652,668.99, leaving a deficit of \$23,813.98. The receipts for the past year from territorial revenue had been somewhat greater than the estimate. The estimate was \$125,000, the actual receipts were \$128,319.60. The taxes upon banks and insurance companies had amounted to \$20,520.34; succession duties, \$4,690.48. Under the head of agriculture \$20,670.89 had been expended. Mr. Mitchell described the government's aid to agriculture last year. A creamery had been established in Kingsclear, and two in Kings county, and also some eight or nine cheese factories.

The expenditure for education the past year exceeded the estimate by nearly \$4,000. This was due to the increased number of schools. The cost of elections was \$6,789.73. Fishery and game protection had cost \$1,297.

The interest account last year came to \$106,910.84; legislation to \$25,034.40, an item which varied with the length of the session. The expenditures upon Lunatic Asylum account were \$45,000. The average cost of maintenance last year was less than it had been in any year since 1888, being \$107.39, as compared with \$110.90 in 1891. The public printing exceeded that of the previous year, amounting to \$12,492.09.

In the public works department there had been an over expenditure during the year of \$16,871.15.

Mr. Powell followed. He differed from the secretary, as to the financial situation of the province. If the net indebtedness of the province at the end of 1891 compared with the net indebtedness of the province at the net of 1892 showed an increase it was useless for the secretary by any manipulation of figures to attempt to say that there was a surplus on the year's operations.

If the equilibrium between expenditure and revenue cannot be attained by simply pruning the expenditures in a rigidly economical manner, let the government apply the pruning knife. Begin with themselves.

The house went into committee of supply. Mr. Killam in the chair.

Mr. Alward gave notice of motion for copies of contracts, correspondence, reports, etc., in connection with the Woodstock bridge.

Mr. Pitts gave notice of enquiry as to whether the \$4,000 mentioned in the auditor general's report on account of the expenses of the appeal on the Maritime bank was the entire expense for which the province is liable in connection with that case.

On the item of \$2,000 for steam navigation, Mr. Emmerson said there

was to be an increase of \$250 in the subsidy to the steamer Flushing, and \$600 was to be given the steamer Arbutus for service between the island and the mainland.

The Carleton Co. election case was considered. Mr. Blair moved the following:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this house it is not advisable to proceed with a petition complaining of the undue election and return of a member of this house in any case which could be, or could have been, prosecuted before the Supreme court under the Conventured Elections act, until the sum of \$1,000 is deposited by the petitioner with the receiver general, subject to the order of the house, to defray expenses incurred in connexion with such petition.

After much discussion the resolution was carried, 24 to 13.

New Brunswick.

Hereafter the Fredericton Boom Company will manufacture their rafting pins by machine. Formerly the pins have been all made by hand. The new machine, it is said, can turn out 3,000 per day.

The Local government have appointed Hon. Wm. Pageley law clerk, and Mr. Richard and Mr. Geo. A. Hughes secretaries to the general committees.

Joseph Dixon, the Sackville postmaster died Tuesday.

A cheese factory is to be established at Derby, Miramichi.

Isaac Newton took ninety-one hogsheads of herrings out of Dark Harbor pond last week, the best week's work ever done there yet.

Capt. Ingersoll, of the steamer Flushing says that as soon as the boats machinery is put in order, at Grand Manan, she will come to St. John to receive an overhauling and then go on her old route to Grand Manan. She will go on the route in April.

The civic elections in Moncton, resulted in the return of an entirely new board of Aldermen. Mayor Sumner is the only member of the old Council still in office.

Nova Scotia.

Schooner Unexpected, of Halifax, was dismantled January 16th in a terrible storm 300 miles off that port and rendered perfectly helpless. The first officer and one of the crew were washed overboard and drowned. The remaining seven of the crew stuck to the wreck amid great hardships for nine days, when they were rescued by the German steamer Sanfred. Two of the crew returned to Halifax last Thursday.

An Amherst despatch says that at a meeting Thursday of provincial directors and representatives of the Harris car works of St. John, the amalgamation of the Harris car works with Rhodes, Curry & Co.'s business here was finally arranged so that the new industry for Amherst is now an established fact. Work on the building and removing of the plant from St. John will be commenced at once.

The city of Halifax is to receive a \$100,000 consignment of new water pipes from a firm in Scotland.

United States.

Half the town of Arkansas City, Ark., was burned Wednesday. One fireman was burned to death. The loss is about \$1,000,000.

Dougald Lacy, employed on the Bangor & Aroostook railway, was seriously injured Wednesday, by a premature explosion of dynamite. His face is much shattered, and one eye destroyed.

British and Foreign.

The British have had a severe battle with tribes beyond Chitral, where the British have been for some time endeavoring to strengthen the Indian frontier against the possibility of Russian encroachment. The British recently occupied Chielas, beyond Chitral, with a garrison. Mountain tribes made an attack on the fort and were driven off with the loss of 200 men. The British then marched against the entrenched villages of hostile tribes and stormed the villages. Major Daniell was shot through the heart while leading his men in assault. Every point occupied by the hostile natives was carried. The British lost 23 killed; 30 wounded. The tribesmen finally submitted to British authority. The result of the struggle has greatly strengthened the British position at what is considered its weakest point in the vicinity of the Hindu Kush.

Two cases of what is believed to be genuine Asiatic cholera have appeared at the town of Entrepas near Venice.

In Madrid, Sunday night, fire broke out in a densely tenanted district. All the occupants were sleeping and the flames were around them before they could be warned. Two families on the top floor of the four story house were suffocated in their beds. Fifteen persons jumped from the windows. Ten were killed and three received mortal injuries. Twenty-one persons are known to have perished. Several other whose fate is unknown are believed to have been burned or crushed in the ruins.


