**The Sabbath-School.  
INTERNATIONAL LESSON.**

**First Quarter-Lesson IV.—January 22.**

**JOSHUA THE HIGH PRIEST.**  
—Zech. 3: 1-10.

**GOLDEN TEXT.**—We have a great  
high priest that is passed into the  
heavens, Jesus the Son of God.—  
Heb. 4: 14.

**THE CIRCUMSTANCES.**—The exiles  
had returned, a remnant of them  
50,000, to rebuild the nation. With  
great rejoicings, they had laid the  
foundations of the temple. But  
through the fierce opposition of their  
neighbors, the Samaritans, they had  
ceased to build, and for 15 years  
nothing more was done. Then  
Haggai summoned the people to  
finish the House of the Lord. But  
there was much to discourage.  
(Ezra 5.) The Samaritans, headed  
by their governor, had written to  
the government of Persia, denounc-  
ing the Jews. This letter had been  
sent to King Darius, whose  
disposition toward the Jews was  
unknown. They were working on  
and waiting anxiously for the news  
from the capital. They had been  
disappointed in the help promised  
from Cyrus.

**THE EIGHT VISIONS OF ZECHARIAH.**  
It was in the time of depression  
that God sent to Zechariah a  
series of eight visions. The next  
morning the prophet rehearsed these  
visions to the people, to encourage  
them.

**The First Vision (1: 8-17).** Prob-  
ably while the prophet was wrestl-  
ing in prayer, there appeared the  
vision of these verses as the divine  
answer. The horses of various  
colors, were God's messengers from  
all parts of the earth.

**The Second Vision (1: 18-21).**  
Four horns, symbols of resistless  
power, symbols of the national  
powers which had destroyed Jerusa-  
lem. Soon appear four smiths who,  
as God's workmen, file off these  
horns of power.

**The Third Vision (2: 1-13).** The  
prophet next sees a man with a  
measuring-line. He goes out among  
the ruins and heaps of rubbish. Can  
these vast ruins be transformed into  
the glorious city of God, whose walls  
shall be Salvation, and whose gates  
are Praise, whose stones are laid in  
fair colors and her foundations with  
sapphires? (Isa. 54 and 60). The  
angel bids him stop measuring, for  
such shall be their future prosperity  
and glory that "no walls that man  
can build" will hold that future city  
of God. Towering above all civiliza-  
tions and powers of this world,  
inhabited by God's Spirit, radiant  
with his holiness, it shall dominate  
the world, and all the nations shall  
be gathered to it.

**THE FOURTH VISION.—REDEMPTION  
FROM SIN.—Chap. 3, vers. 1-10.**  
In order to the fulfilment of the  
promises given in the former visions  
and by the prophets of old, as Isaiah  
and Ezekiel, there must be a moral  
and spiritual reformation. The  
more serious among the citizens of  
Judah apparently feared that their  
guilt was too great for the Almighty  
to pardon, and that this was the  
cause of their misadventures since  
their return. Could such great sin-  
ners be restored to God's favour,  
and be made the instruments of  
building up this glorious kingdom  
of God? The vision of this chapter  
is the answer. The prophet sees  
Joshua the high priest, the represen-  
tatives of the entire nation,  
standing before the angel of the Lord,  
as in the Judgment Day. Now  
Joshua was clothed in filthy gar-  
ments. The symbol of the guilt  
and defilement of sin. Standing  
at his right hand to resist him, was  
Satan, the great adversary of souls,  
attempting to induce God to cast off  
his people as unworthy of his favor.

**The Lord that hath chosen Jerusalem  
rebukes thee.** God himself defends  
the accused against his adversary.  
Is not this a brand plucked out of  
the fire? The little band was a  
brand, burned, charred, deformed,  
partly destroyed, blackened, but  
saved. Take away the filthy gar-  
ments from him. The symbols of  
sin. Then follows the meaning of  
the symbolical change of raiment.  
I have caused thine iniquity to pass  
from thee, and I will clothe thee with  
change of raiment. Symbolic not  
of mere purity, but of jubilant wel-  
come and joyful fellowship with  
God. Set a fair mitre upon his head.  
The high priest's head dress. It  
bore a gold plate across the forehead  
with the inscription, "Holiness to  
the Lord." It was significant of  
the forgiveness of the sins of holy  
things. And the angel of the Lord  
stood by, to superintend and sanc-  
tion the proceedings.

This scene reminds us of the re-  
turn of the prodigal son. His sins  
were not merely passed over, and  
punishment taken away, but he was  
received into his old home and into  
the family life. Thus saith the Lord  
of hosts; If thou wilt walk in my  
ways. True repentance and for-  
giveness imply a new heart and a  
new life. Thou, the high priest  
and the whole priesthood. Shall  
also judge my house. Regulate the  
temple services, rule religiously over

my people. And I will give thee  
places to walk. Free ingress and  
egress to the presence of God.  
Among these that stand by. He will  
have his place among those who are  
most familiarly known in the  
heavenly court. The obedient priest  
shall realize in his ministry their  
presence and their fellowship. Thou  
and thy fellows. The other priests.  
For they are men wondered at. A  
type who foreshadow and prophesy  
the future spiritual and glorious  
temple of God, with its completed  
sacrifice and perfect service of love  
and worship. I will bring forth the  
servant The Branch. The new  
shoot. The nation was like a tree  
cut down and only the stump re-  
maining. The few returned exiles  
were starting up as a new shoot,  
from which should come the Messiah  
and the new kingdom which should  
far excel in glory the old. For be-  
hold the stone. The chief corner-  
stone, selected, but not yet hewn  
and carved. This stone was in  
charge of Joshua, the religious  
leader of the people. Upon one  
stone shall be seven eyes. We under-  
stand the words as a promise that  
the seven eyes (i. e. the perfect  
watchfulness and care) of God shall  
be fixed upon this stone; that he  
will never, so to speak, take his eyes  
off either type or anti-type, till his  
purpose respecting them is accom-  
plished. And I will remove the in-  
iquity of that land. The Messiah;  
the iniquity of the people should be  
taken away. In one day. The day  
of Golgotha. The day when Jesus  
died. In that day, etc. There will  
be superabundant joy and blessed-  
ness, beautifully represented here  
by the common Jewish conception  
of reposing in peace and in love  
under the vine and the fig-tree.  
Every man shall cry to his neigh-  
bor, "Ho! under the vine and under  
the fig-tree;" come and let us have  
peace and rest, enjoying the gifts of  
our bountiful God!

**PRACTICAL HINTS.**  
Every great cause has its periods  
of discouragement, its hills of diffi-  
culty, its gardens of Gethsemane,  
its long nights of prayer.  
The great forces of God work  
silently and unseen, and yet  
are disintegrating the mountains  
and changing the level of the seas.  
Thoughts, feelings, ideas, conscience,  
reason, love and faith, and the Spirit  
of God, are silently but surely  
changing the nations, overturning  
the powers of evil, bringing in the  
kingdom of God.

No earthly measuring-line or  
standard can measure the City of  
God which comes down out of  
heaven.  
Only through cleansing from sin  
can there be fitness to carry on the  
work of God or to dwell in his glori-  
ous city.  
Jesus Christ is our great high  
priest.

**New Year's Dinner.**  
The New Year is over an occa-  
sion of rejoicing, and it is made  
doubly joyous when christian chari-

children of the city, given by the  
W. C. T. U., took place in the Tem-  
perance Hall on New Year's day.  
This dinner has been given for so  
many years, that it has almost be-  
come an institution of the city.

The request of the ladies of the  
Union for contributions to this  
worthy object, was responded to  
most liberally by the citizens.  
Donations of money, turkeys, pies,  
fruit and confectionery were sent in  
profusion.

Notwithstanding the rain, at an  
early hour the little people began  
to arrive, and were kept waiting in  
the ante-room until the dinner was  
ready, one of the young ladies enter-  
taining them with stories. When  
the signal was given the children  
filed in, and took their places, 130  
in all. After the blessing by Rev.  
Canon Roberts, the children were  
served with a generous supply of  
turkey etc., followed by pie, for  
which as a lady remarked human  
nature has a weakness, and the chil-  
dren are not an exception. A bag  
of candy, nuts, oranges and a  
pretty Christmas card was given  
to each one.

Short addresses were made by  
Rev. Canon Roberts, B. C. Foster  
and J. W. McCready.  
Mrs. Johnston called for cheers  
for our Governor, Sir Leonard  
Tilley, and for the donors of the  
dinner, which was heartily respon-  
ded to.

Mrs. Steadman asked the children  
if they remembered being told, on a  
former occasion, which was the  
right side of a saloon. A number  
of hands went up, and the answer  
"the outside" was given by several.  
She spoke a few words to them em-

phasizing the importance of always  
keeping on the right side, and ab-  
staining from intoxicants.  
One little boy asked one of the  
ladies why they did not have a  
meeting for the boys such as they  
used to have, when Miss Thompson  
used to take charge of it. He re-  
ferred to the Loyal Legion, that  
was disbanded some time ago. This  
led to the enquiry, why not start  
another? The boys were asked if  
they would like to join. A good  
show of hands responded. So Sat-  
urday afternoon at three o'clock was  
appointed for the meeting. It is to  
be hoped that some one will be  
found who is willing and able to  
undertake this important branch of  
temperance work.

Mr. Johnston made a few re-  
marks and called for cheers for the  
W. C. T. U. which were heartily  
given.  
The Doxology was then sung, and  
the children filed out in order, and  
dispersed to their homes, carrying  
with them pleasant memories, and  
we trust good impressions that will  
bear fruit after many days.
