News of the Week.

New Brunswick

James Murchie & Sons' steam mill at Deer Lake was totally destroyed by fire one night last week.

On Sunday John McKelvie, of Memramcook, was fitting his horse to drive to church, he was kicked in the face, breaking his lower jaw and causing a heavy flow of blood. He died next day.

Harvey's steam saw mill, near Canterbury station, York county, was destroyed by fire early Tuesday morning, together with some other property in the vicinity. The mill was insured for \$5,000.

The contract for re-building the Cumberland Bay bridge in Queens county has been awarded to J. A. Killam & Co.

Two prisoners confined in the Dorchester penitentiary escaped on Tuesday of last week. Their names are Carter and Connell. Carter had only eight months to serve. They were captured two days after, twenty miles away.

Dr. Colter M. P. was thrown from his carriage in Woodstock last Wednesday, and his collar-bone was fractured.

Mr. Issiah S. Bacon, of Hopewell Hill, was run over on Monday and had four ribs broken. Mr. B. is 77 years of age.

Jas. G. Murchie & Sons, of Calais, have purchased Morrison's Mill.

The Flushing is now the regular mail carrier between Grand Manan and the mainland.

The dwelling house and barns of Michael Shannon, a little over a mile from Fredericton on the Maryland road, were destroyed by fire Wednesday night. A cow and some pigs were burned in the barn. Small insurance.

The Royal Gazette announces York County appointments as follows: Anthony Currie and Alexander Munro junior, to be justices of the peace; George W. Brown to be a commissioner for the parish of Southampton civil court, in room of Andrew Calder deceased; Amasa J. Whitehead to be a commissioner for parish of Queensbury civil court, in room of George W. VanWart resigned.

The Sussex Cheese Factory is now receiving daily nearly 10,000 pounds of milk. Last week the grinding of the curd by steam power was started and will save a vast amount of manual labor.

A man named Gould employed in Randolph & Baker's mill was caught by a set screw on a rapidly revolving shaft connected with the sawdust chain on Thursday. He was hurled around and around several times and every stitch of clothes torn from his body, his shoes only remaining when he was extricated. His left arm was broken, his body badly bruised.

Charles Harper, a young man, was drowned in the Oromocto at Fredericton Junction Thursday afternoon while bathing.

FIRES.—While the family of Daniel Carmichael, of Johnston, Queens Co., were attending a funeral Friday, the house and barn, with all their contents, were burned. A barn adjoining the I. C. R. station house at Apohiqui was burned Friday evening.

Nova Scotia.

Hon. Samuel Locke, M. L. C., of Lockeport, was found dead in bed at his home on Saturday. He was 79 years of age.

The dwelling house of James H. Rhodes at Grandville Ferry was damaged by fire. Loss about \$100. Insured.

The Yarmouth skating rink was burnt on the 9th.

A nurse girl of Dr. Ings, New Glasgow, was coming down stairs last Thursday morning with the baby in her arms. She slipped and fell and the babe was so severely injured that it died on Thursday morning.

\$25,000 worth of hay was imported into Cape Breton this spring; also other kinds of feed for cattle.

The Amherst shoe factory last year sold \$364,000 worth of boots and shoes and paid nearly \$60,000 wages.

At Sydney, C. B., forest fires are doing much destruction. A house and barn of Neil Campbell, on the Mira road, was burned, and two houses are reported to have been destroyed at New Boston. One man at Pt. Edward lost several sheep by the fire, which started from brush burning. If the weather continues as at present the loss to the forest by fire and to the crops by drought will be very serious.

The trial of Mrs. Wrayton at Barrington, charged with the murder of Wm. Thurston, began on Tuesday before Chief Justice McDonald.

A prisoner named Erickson, serving a sentence in the Halifax city prison, made an attack on Keeper Murray Saturday. The keeper defended himself with a revolver and put two bullets into Erickson, one into his shoulder and the other into his leg. The prisoner is dangerously wounded.

Young Bros. & Co., the largest lumber operators in Cumberland, will make their biggest output this year. They will cut 10,000,000 feet of long lumber and 7,000,000 laths at River Herbert and Newville, N. S.

The county poor house near Kentville, was totally destroyed by fire Sunday. The fire was caused by one of the inmates upsetting a stove in the kitchen. Insured for \$1,200.

A curious freak of nature has just come to light in Leeds, Megantic county, Que., where a Mrs. Vanklecker recently gave birth to four children, two boys and two girls; one of the boys having three hands, of which two are attached to the same wrist.

Nelson Whitmore, his wife, their niece, Miss Dunlop, and Miss Church, of Pembroke, were boating on the Ottawa river, near Pembroke, when the boat upset and Mr. and Mrs. Whitmore were drowned.

On Saturday evening, at Chambly Canal, Quebec, Miss Comeau, missed her footing when crossing from one pier to another and fell into the river, and was drowned.

At Windsor, Ont., two men, named Captain James Hickey, a submarine diver, and John Vrooman, a mechanic, were driving along the street in a buggy, when Vrooman drew a revolver and shot Hickey in the left breast, and then pushed him out of the buggy and drove off. Hickey died instantly. Vrooman has been arrested.

The Northwest is experiencing terrible heat this week—probably the hottest June weather in years. With previous plenty of moisture the warm days are rushing the growth and the crop reports still continue of the brightest character.

The business portion of the town of Monomille, Cardwell Co., Ont., was destroyed by fire on Thursday night. Eleven buildings in all were destroyed. Thought to have been incendiary.

British and Foreign.

Cholera has broken out in Frontignan, department of Hrault, France. A despatch from St. Petersburg states cholera is spreading so rapidly in the government of Saratoff an appeal for doctors and nurses has been sent out.

The embarkation of Russian emigrants from Hamburg for the United States is being forbidden.

There have been 350 deaths from cholera at Mecca, during the past five days.

The church of the Chudoy, a Russian monastery, within the walls of the Kremlin, was recently robbed of a vast amount of plate, money and gems, valued at between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 roubles. A search of the cells occupied by the monks revealed that they perpetrated the robbery. This crime is punishable in Russia with the most severe penalties.

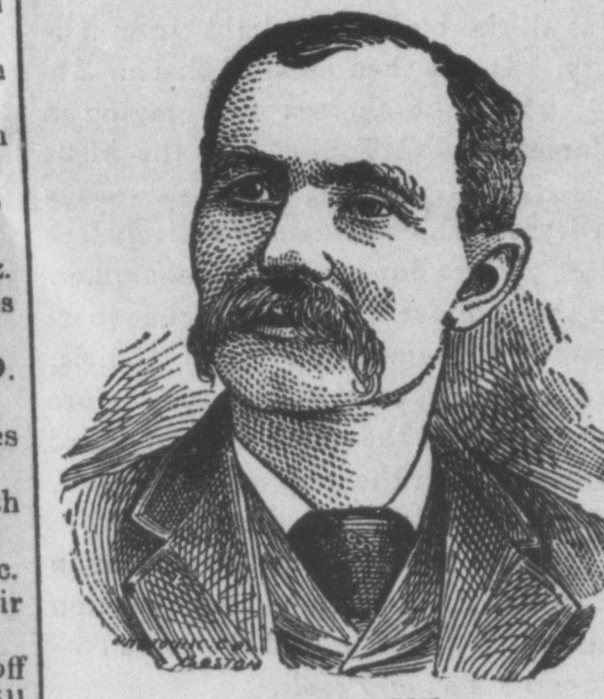
