New Brunswick.

Newcastle and vicinity on Grand Lake, Queens, will be a busy place this season, as the coal industry will be boomed.

A railroad man says that there is more lumber being shipped over the I. C. R. this spring than any previous year for some time. A large number of portable saw mills are at work at different points along the line.

The steamer Flushing, lying at Flagg's Cove, Grand Manan, was run into by a schooner on Friday and damaged to the extent of \$300 or \$400.

The resignation of Mr. G. R. Pugsley, as registrar of deeds and wills for Kings county, has been accepted, and that Dr. Geo. L. Taylor appointed to the vacancy.

Four new post offices were opened in New Brunswick April 1, viz., Monkton, with Ralph K. Giberson postmaster; Oaktown, with C. F. Watson postmaster, both in parish of Kent, Carleton county; Pisarino west, St. John county; Alfred Spence, postmaster; and Village of St. Jean, Acadieville parish, Kent county.

Four Indians have gone from Fredericton to London to join Capt. Paul Boynton and assist in his aquatic carnival. Gabe is one of the quartette.

David Fisher of New Maryland, died at the Victoria Hospital Friday night. The Saturday while he was unloading hay he was accidentally struck near the eye with the prong of a hay fork. Blood poisoning set in and resulted in death.

Harkins' academy Newcastle, was totally destroyed by fire, which was discovered Saturday morning. Origin of the fire not known. There was some insurance.

Nova Scotia.

La grippe is becoming epidemic in Halifax and in many cases is of a severe type.

The Sun learns that the Whitney coal syndicate have secured an option on the New Glasgow steel works and blast furnaces.

The house and farm outbuildings at Mapleton, N. S., occupied by Christopher Lodge, were totally destroyed by fire on Thursday evening. About 100 bushels of potatoes, were destroyed. Loss about \$2,500; insurance \$1,500.

Premier Fielding of Nova Scotia is to introduce a bill to abolish the legislative council.

At Co. J. D. Irving has been appointed D. A. G. of military district No. 3, Halifax vice Worsley, resigned.

The session of the legislature is hurrying towards its close. The Woman's Suffrage bill was defeated in Committee which recommended the three months' hoist; the committee's recommendation was rejected 17 to 16. There is no hope of the bill passing this year; but there is nothing to discourage another trial.

The City Council's liquor bill has been thrown out in defence to the views of the Temperance people.

A North Sydney correspondent writes: "The latest excitement here is the alleged find at East Bay, in this county, of a nine feet seam of anthracite coal. Already figures away up in the thousands have been offered for interests."

Friday morning, Captain Melanson was bringing a 14 ton vessel to Yarmouth. A heavy squall struck the vessel and turned her over. The captain, two men and the boys got into the dory, and got clear of the vessel, which went down in a few minutes. The pilot of the steamer Boston had seen the accident and a boat from the steamer put out, rescuing the crew and they were landed in Yarmouth.

There is strife, keen and almost dangerous, between the people of Victoria, British Columbia, and the people of the mainland, and there is talk of dividing the province into two. The trouble is that Victoria is jealous of the rising influence of Vancouver city.

Three British warships will do duty this summer in Newfoundland in connection with the fisheries protection.

It is believed that the late season has been the most unfortunate for sealing that Newfoundland has yet experienced. The estimated catch is short of 100,000 seals. This is not one-third of the average yield. In some years the number of seals killed has exceeded 500,000. The sealing industry employs some 6,000 men.

United States.

The house of D. Erickson, of Bradford, Mass., was burned Wednesday morning. Erickson, his wife and two children were burned to death.

At Clinton, Mass., Wednesday, fire burned over five or six acres. The loss is estimated at \$250,000.

A terrible wind and rain storm prevailed Thursday night throughout northern Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont, and caused thousands of dollars damage to property.

British and Foreign.

In London, Wednesday, the Dowager Duchess of Sutherland was committed to jail under six weeks' imprisonment for contempt of court in having deliberately burned a document concerning the contest of her late husband's will.

By the shock on Monday the city of Zante was practically wholly destroyed. One hundred and fifty persons lost their lives. The suffering among homeless people is great.

On Friday Gladstone's Home Rule bill passed its record ready by a majority of 43.

The Belgian senate has approved of the compromise granting universal suffrage, accompanied by plural voting based on education and property, as adopted by the chamber of representatives.

Literary Notes.

The Methodist Magazine for April, 1893. Price \$2 a year. Toronto: William Briggs. The Editor gives the concluding paper on "What Egypt Can Teach Us," with near a score of illustrations of temples and people, and engravings of the mummified Pharaohs, Seti I, and Rameses II, the stern tyrant of the oppression of the Israelites. There is a well-written paper, with beautiful illustrations, on Anne Hasselbine Judson and her heroic missionary career in Burmah. "A Plea for Toleration," will command attention. A sea story of interest is "The Spectre Dory." "London's Tragic Tower," "Captain Bass Adams," "The Squire of Bandal-Sid," two stirring stories, and a paper on "St. Catherine of England," make up a good number.

The leading article in the *St. Nicholas* is on "New York." There is no phase of the city life left untouched. "The Story of Whittier's 'Snow-bound,'" is an account of the artist's visit to the poet when he was commissioned to illustrate the homely New England poem. There is abundance of humor and brightness in this number: "What the Lord High Chamberlain Said," "Prince Cam and the Fairies," "The Largest Kite in the World," "Walrus-Hunt in Arctic Seas," "The Gifted Ant," and the "Granger Grind" help to make a good number. One who does not care for either the serious or the amusing articles, may yet find ample entertainment in the pictures, the puzzles, the departments.

The Montreal *Witness*, which is to move into its own building next spring, will be by far the best equipped newspaper in a mechanical point of view in Canada. Its immense Hoe quadruple machine will be capable of turning out 60,000 eight-page or 30,000 twelve or sixteen-page papers an hour, printed complete on both sides, cut, pasted, and counted in piles of fifty. The second, on "India of To-day," is chiefly statistical, and shows that the barbarous customs of self immolation of widows, female infanticide, etc., are fast being swept away. An article on "The Religion of the Japanese Aino," combats the statement that those people have no religious belief. The Department of Literature of Missions, and the other Departments, are full of timely discussions. Published monthly by Funk & Wagnalls Company, 18 and 20 Astor Place, New York, N. Y., at \$2 per year.

The April *Century* opens with a notable article on "The Chicago Anarchists of 1886," being a review of their crime, trial, and punishment, written by Joseph E. Gary, the judge who presided at the trial. It is illustrated with portraits of the judge, the prosecuting attorney, the jury and others. A richly illustrated paper is "The Princess Anne." In the American Artists Series there are two notable examples, one a scene on the coast of Etretat, and the other a reproduction of the relief "The Angel of Death Staying the Hand of the Sculptor." There are further passages from the correspondence of General and Senator Sherman. In fiction, besides the sixth part of "Sweet Bells out of Tune" and the fifth part of "Benefits Forgotten," there are two illustrated short stories, "The Cash Capital of Sunset City" and "Idy." The poetry is good.


