Perhaps in a few years Irish mobs will learn to show respect to the religious convictions of other people. It is time.

FROM REV. THOS. CONNOR.—I enjoy reading letters from my brethren, and I don't doubt that my brethren will like to hear from me. My work will soon be done. I was anxious to be going home to see some of my old friends; and so I made the appointments which have appeared in the INTELLIGENCER.

I left home the first of July, and went to Hampstead and spent the Sabbath. I met bro. Lewis, the pastor, and enjoyed meeting him; he is doing good work on his pastorate, which is a large one.

The next day I went to St. John to see my son, and spent three pleasant days with him and family. I missed seeing my brethren in the ministry. When I went to "Tennant's Cove" on Sabbath morning, met bro. Long and had the pleasure of hearing him preach. In the afternoon I went to a "Connor meeting house," where I attended a meeting when an unconverted boy, and when I was or sined

by my brethren Hartt, Merritt and McLeod, who have all entered into the blessed Kingdom. My thoughts, you may be sure, were busy with the past as I noted the many changes the years have brought. Although the house was well filled, not one of the dear old, familiar faces was present. All have passed over. I thought of men and women whose voices I had often heard there—Carmel Secord, Aaron Price, Frank Phillips, Jane Price, Betsy Foster, and my old mother. It was here that I was baptized, when seventeen years of age, by bro. Pennington, who also baptized those I have named—Carmel Secord being the first person he ever baptized, the day we were baptized being his first baptism. Here, in the old grave-yard, many of my kindred sleep until the resurrection morn; I visited the graves of my father and mother, and there beside them is the grave of grand-father John Jones, who came, a ship-carpenter to this country before the revolutionary war.

Sabbath the 29th July I spent at Long Point, and enjoyed meeting the friends and bro. Long, whom I was glad to meet and greet; he is doing well on his large pastorate. The same Sabbath I went to the Lake meeting house, and met some of the old friends, deacon Ricker among them, who, like myself, is almost home. It was here that bro. McKenzie and I laboured together in a glorious revival when over eighty were baptized. This is the home of the Downey's; here is where the late bro. Wm. Downey was born, and here he was ordained. He assisted us in the revival referred to above. One beautiful moonlight night we were going home from meeting. Gilbert Downey, a large, strong, noble looking man, who had been convicted and burdened and sick and weary of his sins, knelt down on the ice and began to pray; the people were amazed, and I remember how bro. William Downey was perplexed and, perhaps, a little ashamed; I prayed, and asked bro. Downey to pray, and then, as he opened his mouth and the light and the power came, such a prayer I never heard, as throwing fear and pride to the wind, he prayed for his brother who was soon converted and became a faithful witness until his death, which came when he was in the prime of life from heart disease. Many years have come and gone since that prayer meeting on the ice, but how vividly its scenes come before me, and my heart catches fire—as I muse "the fire burns."

August 5th I went to Shannon Settlement, and enjoyed myself well. It was here that, a good many years ago, I had a revival. Bro. Merritt and I had a meeting and after it was dismissed I felt impressed to ask how many wanted meetings held, and the whole congregation rose; I then asked who wanted to serve the Lord and one man, bro. John McCready, said "I do;" the work commenced, and I baptized him and his wife and forty others before the work ceased.

On the 12th August I went to Wickham and Bald Hill, and enjoyed meeting old friends. On the 13th I started for Brown's Flat, visiting old scenes and friends; and wherever I went I found memory bringing back to me things I had long forgotten. I was in a house where I went to meeting with my father when a little boy eight years of age. It was the house of Jacob Vanwart, and one of his grand-children lives in it. I remember how the old man looked, his hair as white as snow, his heavy black brows, and eyes as bright and black as jet. I remember the prayer or some of the prayer offered by the old Baptist minister, Charles Lewis, "Oh Lord, let our prayers acquire around thy throne." I wondered what acquire meant and what it had to do with the prayers, and kept repeating it over and over again that I might ask my mother when I got home about it; for I felt if I asked my father the meaning, a stick might "acquire" around my back.

At Brown's wharf I met bro. John Kindell of the Reformed Baptist church who very kindly drove me down to the Lower Creek, where I was kindly entertained by bro. Mabey and family. A good many years ago I felt impressed to go to Brown's Flat and hold meetings. No meetings of any kind had ever been held there, but the people had built a meeting house and wondered if any one would come and hold meetings. I commenced meetings, there were conversions, and I baptized about twenty persons and organized a church. I found some of the old members still living, and was glad to meet them, and find that they were keeping up their prayer meetings and contending for the faith. We have some as loyal, good members at Brown's Flat as we have anywhere.

After leaving the Flat I went to visit my twin-sister, Mrs. McKenzie, at Nerepis; I spent two or three pleasant days, and then went to Hampstead by stage and boat. Then I went to Jerusalem Mountain, where forty years

ago, I commenced my ministry. How I remembered those early days, and my struggles and temptations, defeats and triumphs. I remembered one Saturday starting from my home to attend meeting Sabbath morning, and how the tempter met me and persuaded me to go back home. I retraced my steps for a little while, and then, thinking that I had played the coward, and not the man for God, I went back, and God was with me, bless His name; for that day a gracious revival (my first) began and many were converted to God.

I visited Hibernia and found that all the faces were strange ones, not the face of an old friend did I see, but I was glad to meet the new friends, and trust my visit was not in vain. In the evening I met bro. Lewis at the hall and enjoyed hearing him preach. And so my mission ended, for I found that I was not able to attend the appointments at Blissville and Patterson Settlements.

There is one thing I want to speak about, I saw very few INTELLIGENCERS in the many homes I visited. I urged them if they wanted to know what their brethren are doing, and to be helped, to take the paper that would bring them good news.

I want to thank all the friends who were so kind to me in getting me to my appointments, and who showed their kindness in other ways. May God reward them. I hope that many of them have subscribed to the INTELLIGENCER and that they will see this letter which tells of my thankfulness and of my pleasant visit.

I am at home now, and feel rested, and ready for any work that I can do. We have good meetings here and I enjoy myself worshipping with the people, and hearing bro. Phillips preach the word.
