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larger cities or smaller towns, there is one story of a remarkable series of meetings, crowded churches, conversions of the unconverted, and stimulating of Christians to greater work and helpfulness. In Chicago, Dr. Stoecker, the Court Chaplain of Germany, has been carrying on his work among the Germans as the result of the impulse gained at the Moody meetings during the summer. In speaking of it he says that there is a power for spiritual work among the Germans here such as is impracticable in Germany. The work was carried on in many ways both in the large halls and in the parish churches. In New York the labors of the evangelistic committee have been very marked. Meetings have been crowded, and in many cases persons have gathered in the open square of Madison Square Presbyterian Church and joined in prayer and praise. Among the various appeals have been those to drinking men, and the work has had some of its best outcome in the rescuing of those who were under the power of intemperance. The pastors of the churches continue the work.

FROM REV. J. N. BARNES.—Perhaps a short notice of a trip up to Riley Brook may be of some interest to the readers of our valuable paper. I hope all love to read its pages as well as I do.

It being my first visit to Riley Brook, I was much interested in the place and people. I was very kindly received by brother and sister Isaac Gaunce, and most hospitably entertained by them. I had three meetings and visited nearly all the families of the place. They have had no meetings, no Sabbath School and no one to preach the word of life to them this winter. This is a very fine part of the river, but just now the roads are in a most dreadful condition. After spending three days with the kind friends, who did not fail to reward me for my effort in going to see them and do what I could to help them. I left on Thursday morning to attend my appointment at Fort Fairfield, travelling over 65 miles of the worst road I think I ever saw. On my way I took dinner at the house of brother John Everett at Dow Flat, 12 miles below Riley Brook, and was very kindly received. In this place, also, there is no worship of any kind. O what a field for work! The remainder of the day I spent in getting to Long Island, where I put up at brother D. Sadler's for the night; there all God's people meet a kind reception. On Friday morning I started again, and in a few hours I arrived at the home of brother George Price, Red Rapids. Brother and sister Price are in good health and are always glad to see the Lord's people. I met Mrs. Barnes there, she being on a visit to that part of the country. The next morning I left at a very early hour for Andover.

N. B. Legislature.

The Legislative Assembly was opened, in the usual form, on Thursday. The speech of Governor Fraser, which is really the Government's announcement was a lengthy document. It referred to the late Gov. Boyd, to the new Governor General, to the freedom of the country from serious business depression, promised the report on the Bathurst schools matter, mentioned the Boy's Industrial Home, promised a bill relating to assessments, suggested that a revision of the statutes is necessary, said bills would be introduced relating to Probate Courts, Mechanic and Labourers liens, and said the accounts &c. would be promptly laid before the House, &c. &c.

The address in reply to the speech was moved by Mr. Wells, seconded by Mr. Ferris. Dr. Stockton followed with an amendment as follows,—

That the paragraph in the address ending with the words "sensibly reduced" be amended by adding: But we take this early opportunity of expressing regret that the act of assembly passed at the last session of this legislature, entitled an act further relating to the Provincial Lunatic Asylum and its management, will impose a heavy burden of direct taxation upon the municipalities of the province, and we trust your honor may be advised to recommend such changes in the law as will lessen such burden of taxation. He made a lengthy speech criticizing the Government. Mr. Blair followed, defending the administration.

Friday. The debate on the address was continued. Messrs. Pitts, Alward, Russell, Dunn, Howe, Powell, Rhinney Mitchell, Smith (St. John), Pinder, Sivewright and Goggin.

The amendment was defeated 25 to 12. Mr. Mitchell moved that supply be made the order of the day for Tuesday. Dr. Stockton said: he would oppose the motion unless the provincial secre-

tary agreed to supply the auditor's report two days before that date.

Mr. Mitchell would only agree to report as soon as it was ready.

Mr. Blair said if the report was not received in time for the debate on Tuesday, the debate could be deferred for two or even four days if the opposition would take the responsibility.

Dr. Stockton was satisfied with this assurance.
