

a substitute, a sacrifice, and a salvation. Christ came into the world not only as a teacher and a door of miracles and a spotless example to live by. He came to offer Himself as our substitute, and to suffer in our stead. He became our sacrifice and died to bear our guilt. He offers eternal life and secures it to every man who believes on Him, obeys Him, and follows Him. This is the core of the Gospel. This is the creed of all true Christians, whatever denomination they belong to. This "faithful saying" made three thousand converts in one day when Peter first preached it in Jerusalem. It inspired the Reformation by Luther, and underlaid the Mont Blanc of Calvin's adamant theology, and kindled John Wesley's enthusiasm to preach a full salvation until converted sinners shouted for joy. The one sublime purpose of all foreign missions is to translate this faithful saying into all the languages on the globe, and to tell dying men that Jesus came to save them. Can any man or woman be a genuine Christian and yet do nothing to spread this faithful saying, or to make other people Christians too? As Dr. Roswell D. Hitchcock pithily puts it, "who, if he could, would like to be plodding heavenward in a path only wide enough for one?"

Voices and Echoes.

If there is anything or anybody high or holy that escape the attacks of unholiness people who hate holiness, we have not discovered the fact.—*Christian Witness.*

That there are some who oppose the professors of holiness cannot be denied. And that such opposition is in some cases unwise is, doubtless, true. But that any Christians, knowingly oppose real holiness, we do not believe. Our observation is that the most of those who make high professions of holiness are the most severe critics of all other Christians, and that their criticisms are not particularly marked by the charity which suffereth long and is kind, which thinketh no evil.

I shall favor government for the people regardless of the interests of the politicians. I shall strongly insist upon a purely patriotic management of affairs and the introduction into our political life of sound Christian ethics.

The foregoing is from the card of Mr. Kelly, a candidate in St. John Co., for election to the Provincial Assembly. One of the St. John dailies seems to regard it as humorous, and thinks that because of it Mr. K. will have difficulty in convincing the people of the seriousness of his candidature. We know nothing about Mr. K., but men who believe and say stand faithfully for just what he says in the above are the kind of men needed in the legislatures of the country.

The bazaar in St. Peter's hall (Roman Catholic) realized over \$200. The Sunday school table made \$1,016.23, and the Sacred Heart table \$1,036.60.—*St. John Globe.*

It would be interesting to know how much of the proceeds came from the lottery which was conducted under the auspices of the church. Isn't it about time the special gambling privilege was withdrawn from the church? Religious gamblers, for alleged religious purposes, should be treated as other forms of gambling. But the Roman church has, evidently, a strong "pull" on the law makers.

Can a man love his neighbor and sell him a liquid that depraves the man morally, and returns him to his family a brute in human form?—*N. Temp. Advocate.*

And can a man love his neighbor and help to elect to a representative place one who will not do his utmost to overthrow the traffic which depraves men morally and returns them to their families brutes in human form? Think about it when you next exercise your voting power.

Mission News and Notes.

The Japanese have organized a missionary society for the purpose of spreading the gospel in Korea, the officers of which come from all the leading denominations of Christians in Japan.

The Presbyterian missions among the Indians of the two Dakotas contain 1,250 members. In addition to their contributions of nearly \$2,000 a year for the support of their own services the Indian communicants give on an average but a few cents short of a dollar a year per capita for missions.

Major Mathison, an officer of the English army, who has served eighteen years and distinguished himself on the battlefields of Egypt, has resigned his commission to become a missionary. He will go to Ceylon under the auspices of the Church Missionary Society, and will work without pay.

The first Chinaman to enter the ministry in New York State is Hui Kin, who was ordained recently at University Place Presbyterian Church. He has been educated under the care of the Presbytery, and has been very successful in mission work among his countrymen. He will hold Chinese services in New York, and hopes eventually to organize a church of converted Chinamen.

"India is an immense network of villages. There are no less than 15,000 villages, and they are all open to the gospel. There is about one missionary to every 400 villages. What an awful disproportion! Even if there were one missionary to every fifty villages, it would require at least five thousand more missionaries to meet this need, and then there would not be too many for India."

Advices received from American missionaries in Armenia report with much sorrow the death of Garabed Agha, one of the ablest Christians in the country. He was chief of the Armenian community at Marsovan, and was exceedingly useful to the missionaries. He was killed by the revolutionary party for declining to take up arms against the government.

Forty years ago missionary Morrison was teaching two or three Chinese, whom he had locked in an inner room for fear of their lives. Now there are some fifty thousand converts in China. "Do you think you can make any impression upon the four hundred million heathen?" said the ship's captain who took him out. "No," said he, "but God can."

An extra cent a day from each one of 15,500,000 Protestant Evangelical Church members in the United States would add \$56,575,000 a year to the Lord's treasury. Only an extra cent a day is required. The first church at Newton Center, Mass., has an Extra-Cent-a-Day Band, which has raised on the average \$359.20 every year for the last five years, in all \$1,796.

The London Missionary Society, during its one hundred years of life, has sent out a thousand European missionaries and their wives. As a result there are 95,000 persons in the fellowship of the Church of Christ, gathered from non-Christian nations, while an equal number of converts have passed into the life eternal. Nearly half a million more are under Christian instruction.

Dr. Griffith John, one of the greatest of living missionaries, expresses his opinion: "There are at present in China about 55,000 communicants, which shows a remarkable increase since 1889. There can be no doubt as to the marked increase of these five years. If the next five be prosperous, our China communicants will, at the close of 1900, number not far short of 90,000. We are on the eve of great changes, and great changes for the better also."

To all the New Brunswick Sunday School Workers.

The 11th Annual New Brunswick Provincial Sunday School Convention will be opened at Chatham on the evening of October 15th, and continue through the 16th and 17th. Mr. Wm. Reynolds, the well-known Field Superintendent, and Mrs. W. F. Crafts, President of the International Primary Union, are expected. Each S. S. is privileged to send two delegates, and each County Convention has elected five. It is desired that this shall be a Convention of representative Sunday School workers, such as will take back to county, parish and school, its lessons for practice. County and parish officers, superintendents, and primary teachers will note this. The programme will contain conferences for benefit of these and their work.

Superintendents, elect your delegates without delay, and send the names by post card to D. P. McLachlan, Chatham. Do not neglect this. The committee at Chatham engage to do their best for delegates, but they ask that names reach them not later than Oct. 8th. While the local committee cannot guarantee homes to other than delegates, it would be profitable to any Christian workers to attend all these sessions.

Reduced fares:—At I. C. R. stations delegates and visitors will ask for Convention Certificate with first-class single fare ticket. This certificate being signed by Secretary in Convention, will ensure a free return. On the Canada Eastern Railway ask for ticket to Convention. A certificate will be given you in Convention which you will present to ticket agent on returning. Albert and Central Railways will give return for single fare to those going to Convention. Shore line will issue their usual excursion ticket to

delegates for Convention. C. P. R. conditions are too complicated for us to offer anything but their ordinary return ticket. St. John and Miramichi river boats, it is believed, will give return for single fare, but their reply is delayed. All pastors are members without election. It is expected many of these will attend. Will they kindly forward their names also to D. P. McLachlan, so that homes may be provided? All trains and boats will be met, and delegates conducted to St. Andrews Presbyterian School Room for registration and direction to homes. It is desired that all come with earnest, prayerful purpose in this great work. By order of the Committee.

A CONVERTED TOWN.—There was a town in Texas founded by an infidel, and of course to be consistent he named it "Ingersoll." No one was allowed to own property in it except infidels. Crime was abundant. It was unsafe to spend a night there, and murder was a common thing. A Western Union operator from Texarkana had a great desire to preach the gospel, so he went to Ingersoll. It was not long until the whole town changed into a Christian community. It was a genuine conversion, for all the saloons were run out of the community. The name of the town was changed to "Edson." Everything is now quiet and peaceable. The gospel has not lost any of its power. Why not try it on some of our large cities?

How IT WORKS.—Iowa has a prohibitory law. But two years ago what is known as the "Mule Law" was passed, by which certain places have, practically, license. The result of loosening the prohibitory law is very apparent, though not very gratifying. An ex-Governor of the state shows that under prohibition there was a decrease from 8,353 convicts in 1886 to 6,893 in 1889. Beginning with Governor Boies' use of his office in opposition to Prohibition, the convicts increased to 7,059, and steadily each year to 8,734 in 1893. In 1894, under the mule law, there were 10,168 convicts, an average per month of 839, compared to 574 under Prohibition. Five months of 1895 show an increase of 549 over the same months of 1894.

A GREAT CHURCH.—Rev. Dr. Conwell, pastor of the Temple Baptist church, Philadelphia, in a recent sermon said of his church:

"You have a united church; you have no quarrels to settle; you have no divisions to bridge; you have no meetings of your discipline committee; you have no occasion to call a church meeting to settle any feud between the deacons, or trustees, or membership. Jealousies seem to be dead, everything seems to be prosperous. A great church, probably the largest in the nation, and as well united as a church can be. We all know that. What a great machine we have!"

A happy church, certainly! And how mighty it may be in the war against all forms of evil, and for the building up of Christ's Kingdom.

Mrs. Porter, widow of the late Rev. T. H. Porter, for many years pastor of the Frederickton Baptist church, died Thursday forenoon. Although she has been in delicate health for some time past, she was able to be about her home as usual Wednesday afternoon. Towards evening she was seized with paralysis and soon passed into unconsciousness from which she never recovered. She was fifty-six years of age and leaves surviving four sons and three daughters. The sons are Wayland, accountant at A. F. Randolph & Sons; Arthur, clerk at Weddall's dry goods establishment; Harry, theological student at McMaster University, and Fred, who is attending school here. The daughters are Mrs. Morgan, wife of J. B. Morgan, insurance agent, Carleton county; Miss Grace Porter, of the Model School teaching staff, and Miss Emma, who is also a teacher. Mrs. Porter was loved of all who knew her for the sweet quietness of her disposition and her general kindness of heart. Bound up as she was with her family, the blow to them will be almost more than they are able to bear. May the soothing hand of the great God smooth out the rough places and make their sorrow easier to bear.
