News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Since Alex. Gibson began operating on the Nashuaak he has cut about 700,000,000 feet of logs.

Between twelve and thirteen hundred dog licenses will be issued in St. John this year.

The new Queen's Printer's Act has been proclaimed, and on August 1st, Mr. Geo. E. Fenety will cease to be Queen's Printer. Mr. Fenety's successor under the new arrangement has not yet been announced.

Woodstock's business men have pronounced in favor of standard time.

On Tuesday a young man named Rankin, 20 years of age, was drowned while bathing at Armstrong's Point. While out in deep water he called to his brother, who was on the shore, that he was drowning. His brother swam out to his assistance, but before he reached him the unfortunate fellow disappeared. His body was recovered.

Fredericton was crowded with visitors on the 12th of July. Twelve crowded carloads of Orangemen and their friends came from St. John and other localities sent proportionate numbers. About 800 Orangemen, accompanied by five bands, walked in the afternoon and the procession was the most imposing ever seen in the city. The best of order prevailed throughout the day, despite the fact that there were about four thousand strangers in the city.

An architect is in Fredericton examining the steeple of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, which has settled and is said to be in danger of toppling over.

Bush fires have made great havoc in Alb. rt county of late, particularly in Lower Cochrane. On Wednesday last the fire proceeded in close proximity to the Cochrane farm, and the neighbors in that vicinity were compelled to fight the advancing tide of flame in order to save property. They were successful in their efforts.

Thos. Morrison, livestock keeper, Marysville, fell over an embankment in the brickyard Thursday and broke his right leg between the knee and thigh. The fracture is a bad one and will lay him up for some time.

Nova Scotia.

Inland Revenue Inspector Grant, last week, discovered an illicit still in Gaetz Mountain, in the house of James Coldwell. He seized it, and Coldwell was fined \$100.

Fagg has turned Queen's evidence against Scanlan. Both men are charged with wholesale liquor stealing from the warehouse of John Tobin & Co., Halifax, where they were employed.

In Nova Scotia the dry weather is impeding lumbering operations. A considerable quantity is hung up in the rivers and streams with no chance of getting it out until autumn. In consequence several mills are reported to have shut down, leaving no logs in their dam.

A drowning accident occurred at Sydney, C. B. Wednesday night when a boy named Covay, about eight years old, met his death by falling over the pier while fishing lobsters.

J. H. Townsend's stables at Windsor were destroyed by fire last week. Nine out of eleven horses were burned alive; insured for \$2,000. The fire originated by boys looking for eggs with lighted matches.

The Dominion Atlantic Railway carried upwards of 30 tons of strawberries over their road one day last week. They were shipped from stations in the valley to Halifax, St. John and Boston. Nearly two carloads came via Yarmouth.

Other Provinces.

Fifty horses were burned at Lorneville, a suburb of Cornwall, Ont. A child was also burned to death.

A serious forest fire raging in the interior of Newfoundland devastated twenty-five miles of country along the new line of railroad and destroyed telegraph lines, saw mills and lumbering settlements.

A gentleman farmer informs the Charlottetown Patriot that an insect resembling an ant has appeared in a two-acre field of his planted with potatoes, and within a day or two has completely destroyed the potato bugs. This parasite eats the bug, leaving nothing but the shell, and seems to possess an insatiable appetite. The same insect was reported in another section of the island last year and no bugs were left where this parasite had visited. It is to be hoped that the potato bug problem is now solved.

A terrible accident occurred at 3 o'clock Tuesday morning at Craig's road, on the Grand Trunk, 14 miles West of Lavis, Quebec. There was a large excursion, or rather pilgrimage, to St. Anne de Beaupre. The number of pilgrims amounted to five hundred and fifty, and they were being carried by two trains. One of them consisted of nine coaches. They reached Craig's Road, fourteen miles west of Point Levis, at about a quarter past three in the morning. At that time the nine coaches were ahead and there was an interval of twenty minutes between the two trains. The first train stopped, and the semaphore was set at "danger," but through some unknown cause the rear train came rushing on and crashed into the other. The engineer, H. McLeod, and the fireman, R. L. Perkins, were killed at their post. At least thirteen were killed, and twenty-nine badly injured.

Winnipeg's industrial exhibition opens next week with more entries and a better programme than ever before. The week following the great territorial fair at Regina will be opened by Lord Aberdeen. At both exhibitions many visitors from eastern Canada are expected, the C. P. R. having granted exceptionally low rates. Manitoba's magnificent crop will soon be ready for harvesting, but the scarcity of farm hands is occasioning some anxiety. Eastern farm hands coming to Manitoba can rely on getting employment at once at the best wages.

United States.

Geo. Harris' furniture warehouse, 156 to 166 West Monroe street Chicago, was destroyed by fire Tuesday. Loss \$150,000. The establishment was used for storage purposes by about 500 people, all of whose possessions were destroyed.

A drowning accident at Lake Keuka, N. Y., Tuesday, by which five persons lost their lives, Terry Tuft, his wife and three children. The boat capsized and the whole party was drowned.

President Cleveland has had an addition to his family, a third daughter being born to his wife at Buzzard's Bay Mass., a few days ago.

Mrs. Catherine O'Leary is dead. She was the owner of the fractious cow which in a barn in the rear of No. 137 Dekoven street, on a memorable night in October, 1871, kicked over a lamp and started a blaze which cost Chicago \$10,000,000.

Forest fires are raging in Michigan. Wallin, a small town swept by fire Thursday, presents a desolate appearance. Mrs. Griffin and her three small children, wrapped in bed clothes, were found buried in sand in a very precarious condition. The fire had swept over and scorched them severely. Johnnie Payne, aged eight, was found in Bethel river, with the fire raging on both sides of him. He had lain in the stream all night. So far no actual loss of life is reported, although three or four persons are reported missing. Nothing but heavy rains can avert enormous losses to property.

Immense crowds attended the different Christian Endeavor meetings in Boston Thursday and great interest was taken in the proceedings. At a meeting of the executive announcement was made that the convention in 1897 will be held in San Francisco if satisfactory railroad rates can be secured.

British and Foreign.

In a collision between two immigrant trains at San Pablo, Province of Corrientes, South America, fifteen persons were killed and thirty injured.

The Tacoma, Wash., Union has private advices from Honolulu to the effect that Queen Lil and following are plotting to form an alliance with Japan by her marriage to a Japanese count. The Japanese have 30,000 residents on the island and with this new alliance it is claimed the Hawaiian republic are alarmed at the Japanese recently brought in.

The royal proclamation dissolving Parliament fixes the date of the assembling of the next Parliament for August 12. The bulk of the provincial elections will take place on Saturday next, and the elections in London will occur on Monday.

The discovery has been made near Moscow of an extensive conspiracy against the life of the Czar. The chief of secret police, after tracing the conspiracy for over a month, has succeeded in arresting eight of the conspirators, who include six recently pardoned nihilists. The Czar has rewarded the chief of police with a present of ten thousand roubles.

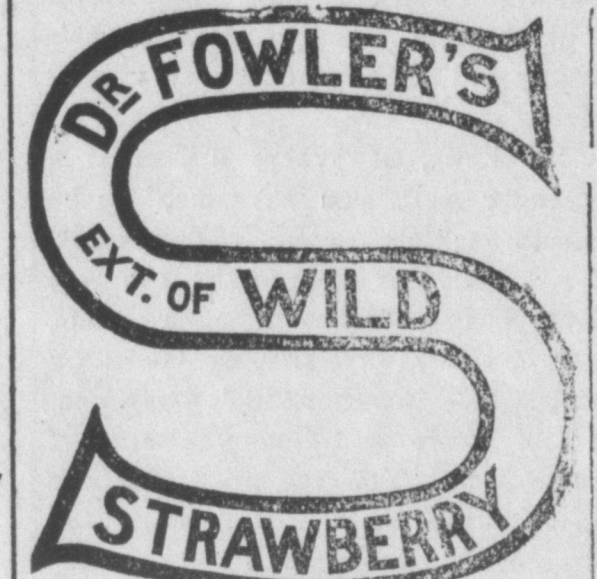

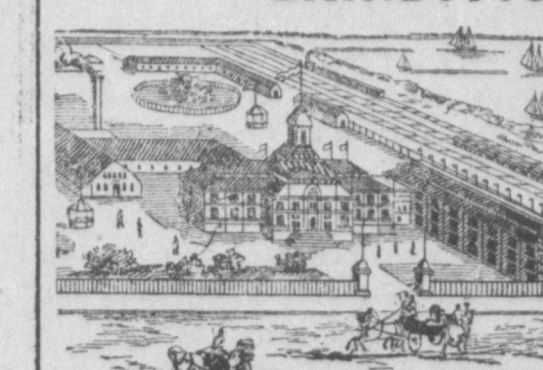
