News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Deer are reported plentiful on the Tobique, where they frequent the fields and pastures.

Will Flewelling, night porter in the Barker House, was found lying on Regent street late Monday night unconscious. He was under the influence of chloroform. He is said to have intended suicide.

Conductor Hoban, of the Gibson branch of the C. P. R., upon boarding his train Monday morning found the upholstery of twenty of the seats of the passenger car destroyed. The velvet had been ripped into shreds with knives during the night.

Monday afternoon Emery Belyea, gateman at the Suspension bridge St. John was killed by falling from the Cantilever bridge. He was coming from Fairville, and it is supposed he was taken with a fit. The tide was out at the time and Belyea struck on the rocks. Both legs were broken and his skull was smashed in. Deceased leaves a widow and four children. He was about 65 years old.

Alfred Dobson was drowned in Humphreys mill pond, near Moncton, on Dominion day. He was attempting to swim across the pond. He leaves a wife and six children.

Brown Brothers, cheese manufacturers, Corn Hill, are taking in daily between 4,000 and 5,000 lbs. milk. On one day last week they took in 7,300 lbs.

The Orange celebration in Fredericton on the 12th promises to be the grandest demonstration the order has held for a long time, and committees are making arrangements on an extensive scale for the accommodation of brethren.

Mr. Alex. Gibson has been loading some schooners at the Givan wharf with hemlock boards for Boston. This lumber is shipped from Mr. Gibson's new mill at Blackville to the Gibson wharf. Two schooners have loaded and cleared and others will be kept loading during the summer months. Many hands are being given steady employment.

The balance due depositors at the Fredericton branch of the Savings Bank on June 30 was \$619,241.59. The deposits during the year aggregated \$116,173 and the withdrawals \$117,498.90.

The total customs receipts at the port of Fredericton for the fiscal year closing June 30th, 1895, amounted to \$33,078.01; for the fiscal year closing June 30th, 1894, they were \$32,893.16.

Eddie Clark, son of Moses Clark, of Mouth of the Nashwaak, was drowned while bathing in the river Wednesday evening. There were several young lads bathing with him, but the little lad could not be rescued. The body was recovered in about half an hour and great efforts were made to resuscitate him, but of no avail.

Mrs. Colter, relict of the late Alexander Colter and mother of Dr. Colter, M. P., and Hon. George J. Colter and Thomas H. Colter, ex-M.P.P., died at the latter's residence at Keswick Wednesday afternoon in the eighty-fifth year of her age.

The Bay View lobster hatchery has had a most successful season and a total of 165,000,000 of young lobsters will have been planted in the waters of the Maritime Provinces.

The question, as to whether Fredericton will have a complete system of sewerage is likely to be submitted to a plebiscite vote in the near future. Mr. A. G. Beckwith has been instructed to make plans and take levels with a view of arriving at the probable cost of the undertaking.

Nova Scotia.

P. McG. Archibald's store, at Bible Hill, near Truro, was broken into Wednesday night and looted of five watches, some jewelry and a revolver, in all about \$75 worth.

Wm. Scanlon, Halifax, has been arrested, charged with stealing large quantities of liquor from John Tobin & Co., where he was employed as a teamster. The total thefts amount to a thousand dollars.

Captain McDougall, of the ship Eather Roy, of Maitland, writes from Iloilo, Philippine Islands, where the ship was on May 9, that on 22nd April while at that port the Second Mate Joseph McDonald, of Sydney, C. B., was stabbed to the heart and killed by one of the seamen. A naval court was held by the British consul at Iloilo and the case was ordered to be sent to Hong Kong, the nearest British port, for trial.

The Summer School of Science is in session at Amherst. The meeting promises to be a most interesting and successful one.

Destructive forest fires have raged in the vicinity of Louisburg.

The fire is supposed to have originated from sparks from a locomotive. Before the people living on Clark's road could realize that a fire had broken out in the woods, the flames spread so rapidly that in a few hours an area of five miles was covered. Besides loss of fences and crops in the district the dwelling house and barn of Daniel Johnston, with their contents were consumed; also a barn belonging to Daniel J. Nicholson, another belonging to Donald McQuish, at the school house of the district, and six head of cattle and ten pigs, the property of Donald McKiegan, were destroyed by the devouring flames. Besides these a number of fishing houses at Little Lorraine were consumed.

Wellington Turner, a prominent farmer of Waterville, King's county, dropped dead Wednesday evening. He was about 45 years of age.

Mrs. James Brennan, of Newport Corner, Hant's county, fell dead while milking a cow on Wednesday. She was 50 years of age. Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause of death in both cases.

Steamer Greetlands, from Porto Rico with sugar and molasses, has been attached by the inland revenue officers at Halifax, who found a quantity of liquor aboard not entered on the ship's manifest. The liquor was confiscated. The steamer will be released on depositing bonds.

Ernest Bishop, a Nova Scotia convict just released from prison after serving eight years in Kingston penitentiary was again sentenced to 14 years for setting fire to Florist Johnston's house last Saturday night.

United States.

Dr. Buchanan, whose execution has been so often delayed, was executed in New York on the 1st inst. He poisoned his wife in March, 1892, and has been in the clutches of the law for nearly three years. Three times was he sentenced to death.

A treasury warrant for one cent in favor of Grover Cleveland, President of the United States, has been forwarded from Washington to Gray Gables, Mass. This sum was found due him as salary upon adjustment of his account for the fiscal year.

Cayoso Hotel at Memphis, Tenn., went into the hands of a receiver on Wednesday with obligations amounting to about \$180,000. This hotel was Grant and Sherman's headquarters during the war and was raided by Forrest when he raided Memphis, then held by Washburn. Washburn escaped to the river in his night clothes.

The sessions of the International Supreme Lodge of Good Templars at Boston came to a close on Wednesday.

British and Foreign.

King Humbert has bestowed the title of prince upon Premier Crispi.

One of the most disastrous fires in years occurred in Paris Monday. One fireman was killed and fifteen injured. Two thousand people are thrown out of employment and 275 people are left homeless. The property was insured for one million francs. It is estimated that the fire will cause damage of two million francs. A repulsive aspect of the terrible event was the presence of a crowd of thieves, who ransacked the inmates and seized everything possible.

SUNDRIES.—China has only 100 physicians. In the British navy the annual cost of maintaining a man is \$1,055. The Rothschilds have an \$18,000 clock. The saline matter held in solution in sea water comprises one-thirtieth of its weight. Italy was so called from the name of Italus, an early king who governed most of the peninsula. Mail bags can now be taken on and delivered from trains running sixty miles an hour. The Sultan of Turkey spends about \$8,000,000 annually on presents, while \$5,000,000 goes for pocket money. Germany has 26,000 of the 51,000 breweries said to be in the world. The water of the Mediterranean contains greater proportion of salt than that in the ocean. The total production of raw sugar in Hawaii in 1893 was over 150,000 tons. It costs England \$160,000,000 a year to maintain its standing army and navy. When the gulf stream passes out of the Gulf of Mexico its temperature is about seventy degrees. In London there is an army of female clerks the number being not less than 50,000.

The frontispiece, "Blackbeard's Last Fight," illustrates "Jack Ballister's Fortunes," which reaches its climax of interest. "A Daughter of the Revolution," is the story of a New England girl. "The Number Seven Or," is a stirring account of a college boat race. "Running for Boys" is a chapter of seasonal and helpful advice. A general study of John Greenleaf Whittier is given in the series of Great American Authors. For the very little folk there are "What the Pet Pig Saw at the Circus," and "The Lead Regiment."

In the July Century under the title of "Daniel Webster against Napoleon" is printed the unpublished, and probably undelivered, draft of a speech by Webster at the time of the debate on the French decrees in 1813. "The future of war" considers the effect on military operations of the new armaments, with special reference to the battle of Gettysburg. The Napoleon Life reaches a very important point, beginning with his campaign from Egypt to Jaffa, and closing with his overthrow of the Constitution. There is a diverting article entitled "A Japanese Life of Grant," of the "English as she is spoke" order, with funny illustrations. "Picturing the Planets" makes record of the methods employed at the Lick Observatory in making photographs of Jupiter, Mars and Saturn. There are three short stories in various keys "The Strike at Mr. Mobley's" has for its background the Woman Suffrage movement. The number contains thirteen poems. The editorial departments deals with "A Cheap-Money Experiment," "The Civic Revival," "The Works of Lincoln as a Political Classic," and other topics.

The safeguards of marriage are treated of by Dr. Parkhurst in the July *Ladies Home Journal* in a way that will strike many as particularly direct and to the point. The story of Brook Farm, that unique New England experiment is told. The musical features of this issue are many. Dainty house-keepers will be charmed with "A Toilet Table Set." "Amusing Children in Summer" is the title of a page devoted to outdoor and indoor summer

parties for children. *The Ladies Home Journal* is published by The Curtis Publishing Company, of Philadelphia, for ten cents per number and one dollar per year.

A Bogus Agent.

The firm of T. Milburn & Co., manufacturers of proprietary medicines have for some time past been in receipt of letters from correspondents in and about Orangeville and Meadowvale, Ont., stating that a man has been operating in those districts, representing himself as their agent, and has been peddling medicines from house to house offering them as the medicines—Burdock Blood Bitters, etc.—put up by this well-known and reliable firm.

A globe reporter, having been placed in possession of these statements, called at the office of Messrs. T. Milburn & Co., on Colborne street, and was shown a number of communications from merchants in the localities indicated; all of which confirmed the information at first received and as given above.

Not only had his firm been in receipt of communications, Mr. Milburn said, but some of his customers from Peel County had called at the office in Toronto and had informed him that this bogus agent had sold stuff at several houses which had necessitated the calling in of the doctor to treat the members of the families who had used his compounds.

In closing the interview, Mr. Milburn the head of the firm, said: "We have no such agent, nor do we sell our medicines through peddlers or agents other than druggists and general merchants, and on this account we are desirous that farmers and others buying our remedies should understand that any persons peddling from house to house cannot represent us. They should therefore, be on their guard against bogus medicines being fostered on them for those of our manufacture. I may say we are willing to defray any expenses incident to the detection and conviction of this man, or of anyone falsely representing as our agent."

The Ottawa city council has passed an ordinance compelling the use of broad tires. On four wheeled vehicles drawn by one horse, the tires shall be at least two and a half inches in width; two-wheeled vehicles drawn by one horse are required to have tires at least four inches in width. Vehicles drawn by two or more horses shall be wheeled and tired to the width of at least four and a half inches, according to the diameter of the wheel and weight of load.

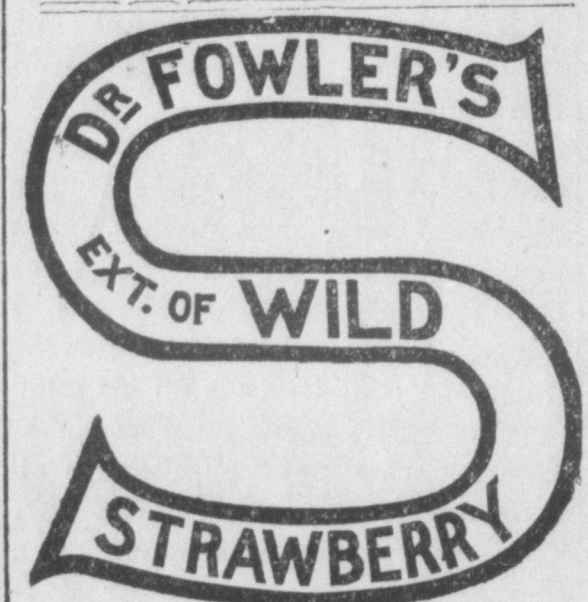
