News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The Grand Division, S. of T., will meet at Sackville on October 30th.

The Moncton sugar refinery has been shut down because of the scarcity of water.

Nothing has been heard of the daughter of Daniel Tracey of Arthur-ette, who mysteriously disappeared some two months ago.

Twelve carloads of canned blueberries, 312,000 pounds, were shipped the other day by Messrs. A. & R. Loggie, of Chatham.

Some of the lumbermen fear the greater quantity of the lumber which is hung up in the St. John river above Fredericton, some 25,000,000 feet, will have to remain where it is until spring. Unless heavy rains set in soon they will not be able to even get it into the booms where, of course, it would be comparatively safe in case of a freshet in the spring.

Snow fell along the line of the C. P. R. from Fredericton Junction to McAdam Tuesday night of last week.

Government steamer Newfield is now at work repairing the Grand Manan cable, and it is expected to be shortly in operation.

The office of Sargeant Brothers at Nelson, Northumberland county, was burglarized one night last week, and \$20 in cash and \$200 worth of watches deposited with the firm by a peddler were stolen.

Fred Reid, St. John convicted of stealing was last week sentenced to three years in the Penitentiary. Dell Vanwart, accessory of the crime, was sent to jail for six months.

At Campbellton, Tuesday, William Wall, an operator on the I. C. R., dropped dead on the station platform of heart disease. He was 19 years of age.

The Eastman residence at St. Stephen was badly damaged by fire and water, Friday.

The dwelling house of Tyler Burt, at Zealand Station, York Co. with all its contents, was destroyed by fire Friday. There was no insurance.

At Kilburn, V. Co. on Tuesday last week, a fatal accident occurred, Oscar Kilburn, aged 21, and a young man by the name of Paul, attempted to set off a can of powder, which they had previously filled, by applying a match to it. The match failed to ignite the powder and Kilburn examined it to see what the trouble was. As he looked into the can it exploded, striking him in the face and knocking his teeth out, mangle his hand and burning his face and head in a frightful manner. The force of the explosion threw him a distance of fifteen feet, and when he was picked up he was expiring rapidly and died in a few minutes.

Nova Scotia.

Potatoes are selling in Cornwallis at 25 cents a bushel.

There are 321 inmates in Pears Asylum. There are 185 males, 8 children, 127 females.

Twenty new buildings have been erected in Truro this summer costing between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

Ernest Kemp, oyster expert, of the fisheries department, Ottawa, is in Annapolis, and will examine the Annapolis and Digby flats, with a view to the propagation of the oyster.

Mrs. Frank Congdon, of Halifax, is suing her husband, a well known barrister, for divorce, alleging cruelty and adultery.

Fred Wilkes for the burglary of C. B. Whitten & Co's store at Antigonish has been sentenced to six years in Dochester.

British and Foreign.

An enormous quantity of ammunition has arrived in the Caucasus for the use of the Russian army there. Several regiments have taken quarters near the Turkish frontier.

A despatch from Shanghai says an explosion occurred Wednesday on board a transport at Kungpai, near Kingchow. The steamer had on board a large number of troops, six hundred of whom are reported killed.

Advices from Formosa state that the Japanese are gradually subduing the tribes which are opposing the Japanese occupation of that island. The natives are making a stubborn resistance to the Japanese but are steadily being overcome. The capital is occupied by black flags and it is expected a sanguinary battle will be fought.

Advices from Kucheng China state that the deadlock which has existed in connection with the commission of enquiry into the outrages upon foreign missions is ended. British Consul Mansfield has had an interview with the viceroy at Fukien with the result that the latter agreed that eighteen more of the men accused of murdering the missionaries shall be executed and that the remaining prisoners shall be speedily tried by the commission, which shall have power to impose the death penalty.

China is reported to have yielded all British demand, having been persuaded thereto by the threatening movements of the British fleet. The murderers of the British missionaries have been, or will be, duly punished. Compensation will be made for losses.

A large district in southern Russia is suffering from a plague—a plague of mice. Their nests are so numerous in the fields that plowing is impossible, the peasants turning away in loathing. So horrible is the plague that peasants in houses are leaving their cottages, seeking spots where they may be free from these vermin.

Russia's conditions for reconciliation with Bulgaria are the abdication of Prince Ferdinand in favor of his infant son Boris, that the latter become a member of the Greek church, and that a Russian be nominated as minister of war for Bulgaria.

A ferryboat having sixty passengers on board was in collision Friday near Cairo, Egypt, with a steamer at anchor. The ferryboat was overturned and fifty persons were drowned.

Severe storms along the Italian coast and in the interior have caused a number of fatalities and done much damage to property. Fifteen deaths have been recorded. Heavy losses were sustained by the drowning of cattle and shipping suffered severely.
