The election in North Ontario, on Thursday, resulted in the return of Mr. McGilvray, the Conservative candidate. There were three candidates in the field—a Liberal, a Patron and the gentleman elected.

The Provincial Legislature is expected to meet about the same time as last year, probably on the last Thursday in January or the first Thursday in February.

Col. Prior, M. P., for Victoria, B. C., has been offered a portfolio in the Dominion Government, and has accepted.

Newspaper Jubilee.

The Montreal Witness has reached its jubilee year, its first issue having appeared in December, 1845. Founded by the late Mr. John Dougall, it is now conducted by his son, Mr. J. R. Dougall. The Witness is an example of success, by faithfulness to principle, in spite of many difficulties. It is certainly to be congratulated on the high place it has reached in the journalism of the country. From a small weekly, it has come to be a fine daily in Canada's chief city. It differs from other dailies in that it has no place in its columns for reports of prize fights and like brutalities, nor for the scandals and sensations which are made so much of by many papers, and which are so demoralizing. It has been the staunch advocate of various moral reforms; it has been a temperance paper from the beginning, and is a stalwart friend of prohibition of the rum traffic. We hope it may have another fifty years, as markedly successful as the half century it now celebrates.

A TRADE SUPPLEMENT.—The St. John Globe issued last week a trade supplement of sixteen pages. It contained much information about the industries and other business establishments of the city, and was a very excellent production.

MANITOBA SCHOOLS.—In answer to the rumours of a settlement by the Manitoba Government, of the Manitoba Schools trouble, the Premier of Manitoba has authorized the following statement:

The government have had under consideration at various times the order in council of the Dominion government, of the 27th of July last, inviting action on the part of the legislature of Manitoba to remove the alleged grievances of the Roman Catholic minority in relation to education. It has become perfectly clear that no concession by the legislature will be regarded as a solution of the difficulty or as removing the alleged grievances, unless such concession admit the principle of the re-establishment of separate schools. Upon the question of the re-establishment of separate schools the government will make no compromise.
