

Home Religious News.

—A Roman Catholic Cathedral is to be erected in Charlottetown, P. E. I.

—The new Presbyterian church at Fairville, St. John, was dedicated last Sunday.

—Rev. Mr. Denton, Woodstock, baptized four persons on the 24th ult., and received them into the Adventist church.

—This is self-denial week in the Salvation Army, throughout Canada. It is hoped to raise \$25,000 in the Dominion.

—Mrs. B. Blackmore, who has been at home in Nova Scotia resting, will return to her missionary work in Japan in a few days.

—The Y. P. Society C. E., of the Presbyterian church in this city, began its career last week with 20 active and 18 associate members.

A number of Normal School students have organized a C. E. Society. The W. C. T. U. has given the society the use of its hall for weekly meetings.

—The erection of a new Congregational church building at Liverpool, N. S., has been begun. The old church was destroyed by fire a few months ago.

—Rev. F. W. Barker, a son of Rev. Joseph Barker, formerly of Sheffield, N. B., has been ordained and installed pastor of the Congregational church at Somerville, Maine.

Rev. W. Williams, a former pastor at Milltown, St. Stephen, has again become pastor of the Congregational church there. He had been in England during his absence from Milltown.

—Thirty converts were baptized by Rev. W. Williams, of the First Baptist church, Moncton, on Tuesday evening of last week. On Thursday Mr. Williams left for his new pastorate in Toronto, an interesting farewell meeting having been held Wednesday evening.

—The Baptist, Free Baptist and Methodist churches at Gibson held special meetings last week with good results. On Sunday the ordinance of Baptism was administered by the pastors of the Baptist and Free Baptist churches, the former to six, and the latter to two converts.

—It is announced that other accessions to the church of England ministry from the Roman Catholic priesthood are probable at an early day. The parties mentioned as likely to change their church relations are not residents in this province, but will, it is said, come here to be received.

—The Home Mission and Augmentation committees of the Presbyterian church held a meeting, in Halifax, last week, at which the re-arrangement of congregations and mission stations was discussed. The belief prevails among the members of the committee that a great saving could be made by a more judicious grouping of the congregations.

—The revival interest in this city continues. Last week the meetings in the Methodist, Baptist and Free Baptist churches were of much interest, and in all the churches new members were received. On Sunday three were received on trial in the Methodist church; in the Baptist church twelve converts were baptized, and in the Free Baptist, five converts received baptism.

HARD PRESSED.—The extraordinary efforts of the rum men about Hampton, K. Co., to save Scribner from the clutches of the law he has so often violated, show the desperate straits to which they have been driven by the brave and faithful Inspector Weyman and those who co-operate with him. But he will win again, as in many another hard-fought battle.

RESIGNED.—Hon. A. F. Randolph has resigned his position as Chairman of the Board of School Trustees of this city. He has been Chairman of the Board ever since the Board was appointed, when the Free Schools system came into effect—twenty-four

years ago. He has given much time and care to the duties of the important office he held, and the citizens feel that they owe him much for what, under his leadership, the Trustees have accomplished in giving the city so excellent a system of schools. His retirement is regretted by all classes, who have for him the highest respect.

Mr. J. L. Inches, who has for several years been a faithful member of the Board, and was at one time its Secretary, has also resigned.

JOURNALISTIC.—Campbellton is to have a new daily paper, it is said. It will be called *The Tribune*, will be Liberal in politics, and will make its appearance about New Year.

Messrs. M. B. Edwards, Thomas Dunning, Thos. McAvity, Walter R. Miles and Count de Bury, the new owners of the *Telegraph*, are applying for incorporation as "The Wm. Elder Publishing Co., Ltd.," with a capital stock of \$20,000 in \$100 shares.

THE W. C. T. U.—Among the resolutions passed by the Dominion W. C. T. U. at its late meeting was one asking Lady Aberdeen to remove liquor advertisements from "Wee Willie Winkles," the children's magazine, published under her direction.

Another resolution was that, in case the Privy Council decides that the power of total prohibition rests with the Dominion government all temperance leaders are to be called upon to formulate radical measures for the abolition of the liquor traffic and present them to the government.

WANT A WOMAN APPOINTED.—The W. C. T. U. of this city, hope to persuade the government to appoint a woman to one of the vacancies in the Board of School Trustees, caused by the resignation of Messrs. Randolph and Inches.

TREAT THEM ALIKE.—The attempts to create sympathy for an imprisoned Woodstock run-seller, because he happens to be a druggist, and has been given some social recognition, reveals one of the chief difficulties in the way of efficient enforcement of the law against rum-selling—the weakness of some people from whom better things should be expected. It is not half so hard to face aroused enemies, as to encounter weak-kneed friends. But Inspector Colpitts and those who work with him, are of better stuff than to be turned aside from their duty by those who think one rum-seller should be treated better than another. They are all one breed.

A FAMOUS REFORMER

Rev. C. J. Freeman Speaks of His Life and Work.

HE HAS WRITTEN AND PREACHED ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ATLANTIC—RECENTLY THE VICTIM OF A PECULIAR AFFLICTION FROM WHICH HE WAS RELEASED IN A MARVELLOUS MANNER.

No 157 Emerson St. South Boston, is the present home of Rev. C. J. Freeman, B. A., Ph. D., the recent rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church at Annapolis, Mont. He has preached before cultured audiences in the old world, as well as to the rough pioneers in the mining towns of the Rocky mountains, and his utterances as well as his writings have been in the line of progress and liberality, well-seasoned with practical common sense. Dr. Freeman has written this paper a letter which will be read with interest. He says:—

St. Nicholas in 1896.

Rudyard Kipling, whose first Jungle Stories appeared in *St. Nicholas*, will write for it in 1896, and James Whitcomb Riley, the Hoosier poet, will contribute a delightful poem, 'The Dream March of the Children,' to the Christmas number. The serial stories represent several favorite names. 'The Swordmaker's Son' is a story of boy-life in Palestine at the time of the founding of Christianity. It is written by W. O. Stoddard, whose careful study of the history of the times and whose travels over the scenes of the story have enabled him to present vividly the local coloring. The Prize Cup is one of J. T. Towbridge's best stories. Albert Stearns, whose 'Chris and the Wonderful Lamp' was one of the great successes of the past year, has written another story that promises much. In 'Sindbad, Smith & Co.' he has again gone to 'The Arabian Nights' for inspiration. An American boy enters into partnership with that greatest of sea-faring adventurers, Sindbad, and the fun and the complications that this brings about can be imagined. These are but a few of the features. During the coming year \$1,000 will be given in prizes. Full particulars concerning it will be found in the November number.
