THE PRESS.—A case of some interest to newspapers was decided in Montreal last week—the case of Pelland vs. Graham. Graham & Co. are the publishers of the Montreal Star, and were sued for having published a report of a speech delivered by the Hon. J. A. Ouimet, Minister of Public Works at an official nomination meeting. The jury in the case returned a verdict to the effect that the report was a true one and that it was published in good faith and in the public interest, but that the plaintiff had sustained damages by the publication to the extent of \$150, it being left to the court to decide whether or not the defendants were legally responsible for that amount and the costs.

The Star says: "We regard this case as one of supreme importance as affecting the liberty of the press in Canada. If it be the law of the land that a newspaper cannot legally publish a true and faithful report of a speech delivered publicly by such a responsible person as a minister of the Crown, such report being published admittedly in good faith and in the public interest it becomes of importance not only to the press but to the public that the law should be definitely declared beyond the possibility of cavil or question. We, therefore, propose, as a matter of principle, to carry this question to the final court."

DECLINED.—Rev. O. C. S. Wallace, has declined the chancellorship of McMaster (Baptist) University, recently offered him.

P. E. ISLAND.—A correspondent of the Cincinnati Standard, a native of P. E. Island, visiting it after several years absence, says:

The Scott act is in force here, and the liquor traffic is pretty well crushed out. Very little liquor is sold now, compared with what was sold eleven or twelve years ago.

GONE TO JAIL.—Mrs. Linforth was sent to jail last week for violation of the C. T. act. Now could not the Magistrate send some of the men to jail?

DROPPED.—The Montreal Methodist Conference has dropped Rev. Mr. Horner from its roll of ministers, for breach of discipline. He persisted in going wherever he chose, without consultation with the ministers in charge of circuits, holding independent meetings, and creating dissensions.

MISCHIEVOUS TYPES.—In a note in the INTELLIGENCER about the Dunks, a religious body, a mischievous type turned their name into "Drunkards." Progress godnaturally undertook to correct the error. And this is how it was done:

The zeal of the RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCER, for the cause of temperance is commendable, but it is mistaken when it speaks of a baptism by "the Drunkards" in Maryland. The worthy members of that denomination known as "Drunkards" should feel pained at such allegations.

It is now in order, we think, for Progress to look after its own types.

Rum Traffic Notes.

ONLY ONE-FIFTH.

It is said that one fifth of the annual increase of the wealth of the nation is devoured by the saloon.

THINK AND VOTE.

If the laboring men who patronize the saloons would think more and drink less, and then vote right, there would not be half so much monopolistic oppression of labor, and ruinous strikes would soon be a thing of the past.

RUM KILLED.

The English liquor death-rate, according to the Registrar-General's latest return, stands higher now than it ever did before. In 1869 there were 764 deaths directly ascribed to intemperance, which gives an annual rate of thirty-four per million persons living. For 1893 the figures were 2,174 victims, or at the rate of seventy-three per million persons living.

A "HORN OF PLENTY."

A brand of whisky is called "Horn of Plenty." On this a temperance writer remarks that they have chosen the name wisely, for out of the thing designated shall come:

Plenty of poverty, plenty of pain,
Plenty of sorrow, plenty of shame,
Plenty of broken hearts, hopes doomed and sealed,
Plenty of graves in the potter's field.

THEY ADMIT IT.

The Wine and Spirit Gazette has the following on the situation in Mississippi: "The stringent law and prohibition are rapidly driving the saloon from Mississippi: A saloon will soon be a rarity if they decrease at the present rate. During 1894 only thirteen counties sold whisky legally. The revenue tax was \$107,600, a decrease of \$22,800 as against 1893, and in the number of counties a reduction of nearly 50 per cent."

THE "PERSECUTIONS."

The National Wine and Spirits Association held its annual meeting in St. Louis the other week. A member read an address upon the persecutions and misrepresentations of the W. C. T. U. and Prohibitionists. He claimed there were only 756 murders in the United States last year attributable to liquor. Only 756 murders! ONLY 756! Then there were only 281 suicides attributable directly to liquor. What an innocent business it is! Who could bear to "persecute" such a business.

CAUSE AND EFFECT.

The Union Signal says.—Statistics from Belgium indicate that the revenue from the liquor traffic, which in 1851 was four million francs, is now thirty-three millions. During the same period the public houses have increased from fifty-three thousand to one hundred and seventy-five thousand. The annual consumption of spirits is at the rate of twelve litres per head for the entire population, or forty-eight litres per adult. From 1851 to 1888 the criminality increased one hundred and

twenty-eight per cent. Of every hundred deaths of males, eighty were traceable to alcoholism. Insufficiency of food doubtless had much to do with this terrible showing. The fact is, the temperance and the labor questions must go hand in hand.

AN AWFUL WASTE.

The drink bill of England is so great that an adequate conception of it is an impossibility. Rev. Dr. D. Burns, who is recognized as an expert with regard to the figures of the liquor traffic in Great Britain, has just furnished the London Times with a detailed statement, compiled from official sources of the amount spent by the United Kingdom for drink in 1894, being something over \$693,000,000. Of this the sum was spent for spirits and beer—over \$630,000,000 going in this direction, the balance, about \$70,000,000, standing for the expenditure made for high-priced wines and liquors bought by the wealthy. One fact, which is emphasized by a little study of these figures, is that the most of this tremendous outlay is paid by the poor, who can least afford it. The workingman, who needs every penny he earns in order to provide for himself and his household, is the one who buys the bulk of the beer, gin, and whiskey sold in the British Isles. And yet he is the last man to recognize the fact that the wasteful and wretched traffic which he creates and maintains is a constant, conspicuous, and inevitable cause of hard times.

Parliament.

Tuesday.—Parliament reassembled. The budget debate was resumed by Mr. Riker, followed by Mr. Ryckman, Mr. Gibson, and Mr. Davies. Among the returns brought down was one giving the details of the Fredericton or St. Marys bridge transaction. It contains a statement of tolls and fees collected by the company, as follows: October to June, 1889, \$1,546; the year ending June, 1890, \$2,461; 1891, \$2,908; 1892, \$3,011; 1894, \$4,544. The return also contains the form of contract with the government for the loan, by which it appears that the country has a first mortgage on the bridge as its security.

Wednesday.—The Budget was continued by Dr. Montague, who was followed by Dr. Landerkin, Mr. Jeannette and Mr. Casey. At the close of Mr. Casey's speech, the members were called in and the fourteen days' debate was closed by a vote on Cartwright's amendment. The vote was as follows: Yeas, 71; nays, 117; majority, 46.

Thursday.—Mr. Foster introduced a bill amending the superannuation act. The act provides that the government or treasury board may exclude from the benefits of superannuation certain classes of civil servants.

The house went into committee on Charlton's Sunday Observance bill. The discussion turned on the first clause forbidding publication and sale of newspapers on Sunday.

Mr. Charlton got two clauses of his bill through with amendments when the committee arose and reported progress.

Mr. Davin's resolution in favor of Woman Suffrage, with Mr. Laurier's amendment in favor of provincial suffrage, brought out a vigorous discussion on the provincial franchise laws.

At the opening of the Woman's Franchise discussion Mr. Foster said the members would vote according as they felt on the question. He could not speak for the government, but for himself he would say that he would support the resolution and oppose Mr. Laurier's amendment.

Friday.—After the hour given to private bills estimates were taken up. Mr. Mills (Bothwell) brought on a discussion of the costs of the dominion electoral lists. This led to a debate on the franchise act generally.

Mr. Foster objected to a discussion of the principles of the federal franchise in this committee, seeing that two bills in connection with the franchise were to come before the house.

TELLING STORIES.

A good and pertinent story in a public address now and then is not to be condemned, but the tendency to tell stories is one that needs to be carefully guarded. Frederick Douglass said: "One of the hardest things I had to learn when I was fairly under way as a public speaker was to stop telling so many funny stories. I could keep my audience in a roar of laughter, and they liked to laugh, and showed disappointment when I was not amusing—but I was convinced that I was in danger of becoming something of a clown, and that I must guard against it."—*Morning Star.*

DECREASE OF THE POOR.—For some years the question of "old age pensions" has been agitated in England, and the arguments seemed convincing, practically the only difficulty seeming to be to determine upon the amount of the pension, the classes of persons to whom it should apply, and the means to place the law in operation. The recent report of the parliamentary "Commission on the Aged Poor" has, however, put an entirely different appearance upon the question, and it now seems probable that whatever legislation is undertaken will be in regard to general betterment of the labor laws and as far as possible of the condition of the laboring classes, without resort to the much discussed system of pensions. Despite the general impression the commissioners found

that instead of increasing the number of the aged poor is actually decreasing. This decrease, however, is still not very marked, and three out of ten of the total population of England over sixty-five are still compelled to apply for parish relief, though this percentage, it should be added, is lower than previous statistics place it at. The decrease is ascribed by the commission "chiefly to the increased prosperity of the working-classes generally."—*Witness.*
