News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The new residence of Mr. Thos. Kirk, near Oak Point, was totally destroyed by fire Sunday night. Damage about \$500.

Arthur Grant, of Canterbury, who came to the Victoria Hospital a short time ago, to be treated for disease of the knee joint, had his leg amputated above the knee last week by Dr. Coburn.

The dead body of an unknown man was found floating in the river at McGinley's, nine miles above town, Wednesday. It is supposed to be the remains of one of the two German Jews who broke into and robbed a store at Andover two or three weeks ago and who, it is thought, were drowned.

Fred. W. Freeze, son of the sheriff, has been appointed deputy sheriff of Kings Co.

John McQuade, a St. John butcher, was crushed Wednesday, by an angry bull. McQuade went into the barn for the purpose of untieing the bull. The animal became wild, and forcing him into a corner of the stall, crushed him badly. Three ribs on the left side were broken, and his thigh was badly bruised.

The Canada Eastern Railway station house at Blackville was burglarized Wednesday. The burglars pried open the cash drawer and got \$110 belonging to the Western Union Telegraph Co.

The body mentioned in another paragraph as having been found in the river at McGinley's ferry, turns out to be that of James Cannon, of Oranmore, who drove an embankment on the Tobique river and was drowned, a few weeks ago.

A brutal assault was made on Mrs. Robert McFarland and little daughter, who live on Shepody Road not far from St. Martins, on May 18th. Her assailant was identified as William Dugan, who lives near Quaco. The efforts to capture Dugan have not as yet been successful.

The catch of lobsters in the vicinity of Cape Tormentine is said to be much lighter than usual. Some of the factories will, it is stated, close if the fish do not strike in soon.

Large shipments of cotton are being made just now by the St. Croix cotton mill. One day's shipment last week consisted of about 250,000 yards consigned to Kingston, Hamilton and Toronto, Ontario.

A house on Campbell street, this city, occupied by Cole Kitchen, caught fire Friday afternoon from a spark lighting on the roof. The building was badly damaged by fire and water before the flames were extinguished. The loss is covered by insurance.

Messrs. Milne, Cuth's & Co., St. George, have received a contract for a granite monument to be erected at Kingston, Ont., in memory of Sir John A. Macdonald.

A miscreant struck with an axe a cow owned by Joseph Johnson, of Greenwich, Kings county. The blow nearly severed the back bone and the animal died in great agony.

The logs are coming into the boom near Fredericton in great quantities. On Thursday 394 joints of logs were rafted at the Mitchell boom.

Nova Scotia.

Truro appears to be in a fair way to have another condensed milk factory, with creamery and general canning establishment added.

Mackerel have struck in on the Nova Scotia coast in immense numbers. The catch during the past ten days has been enormous. The fish taken in the Green Cove, Churchill and Stoneman traps near Yarmouth last week were worth \$15,000.

The Nova Scotia schooner Oddfellow arrived at Canso from sea Wednesday, with her flag at half mast. Capt. Kinlay reported the loss of the dory with two men, which strayed away in the dense fog on Monday as the vessel was within 35 miles of Liscombe.

The Halifax electric railway will be in operation by Oct 1st next.

The county of Pictou has purchased four new road machines, which make eight now owned by the county.

The two fisherman who strayed away from the schooner Oddfellow on Monday arrived safely at Canso.

No hopes are now entertained for the safety of the brigantine Katie, which left Port Morien early in the season with a cargo of coal for Yarmouth. It is feared that all on board have been lost. The Katie was commanded by Capt. Lee, of Mainadieu.

In Nova Scotia children from 6 to 16 years of age must attend school at least 120 days during the year. The Halifax Witness fears that there are still cases of neglect. We have heard lately of an industrious man of some means living not a score of miles from Colleges and Academies and Universities who has children ranging from 8 to 21 years who cannot read.

When sixteen miles off St. Pierre Friday, Capt. Angrove of the steamer St. Pierre picked up Bois Marly and Louis Cotari, two French fishermen, who had drifted away from their schooner, the Ida E. The poor fellows had nothing to eat or drink during four days adrift, and had also suffered terribly from exposure. Capt. Angrove landed them at North Sydney.

The prisoners in the Parker-Miller abortion case at Annapolis will be tried at the June term of the Supreme Court. Dr. Miller has been released on bail. Parker has not made application for bail.

The Bay of Fundy Steamship Company is understood to have been sold out to the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, operating between Yarmouth, Annapolis and Halifax.

Other Provinces.

Hon. Mr. Bond, Colonial Secretary, has succeeded in borrowing \$550,000 at four per cent. for forty years. The loan will be issued by Glyn, Mill Currie & Co., one of the leading banking houses in England.

It is stated that a representative of the Standard Oil Co. has secured a lease of 20,000 acres of land in Essex county, Ontario, and that a boring plant will be set up there at once.

P. E. Islanders are now considering the establishment of a central creamery at Charlottetown, for the manufacture of butter in winter. There is great activity in the cheese industry on the island this season.

Amedee Chatelle, who murdered Jessie Keith near Listowel last October, was executed at Stratford, Ont., Friday morning.

David Vader, a farmer near Calgary poisoned himself on Tuesday by taking a dose of strychnine.

There promises to be a boom in the building of elevators in Manitoba this season. Between thirty-five and forty are to be erected at points on the C. P. R., and there are to be others on the Northern Pacific and the North-western.

At Ottawa despatch says: The government has received advices from a party sent out last year to prospect the cold fields of Athabasca. The reports are very favorable. Throughout a section of country three hundred by one hundred miles there is every indication of rich deposits of oil.

United States.

Potatoes are selling at Caribou, Maine, for 40 cents per barrel.

An attempt was made last week to burn the United States Hotel in Portland, Me. Twenty-nine gas burners in the rooms and corridors of the building had been turned on, and had the fire got well under way the whole building would have been burned.

A few days ago Italians employed at the coal mines in Bagdad, Pa., bought part of a hog in Pittsburgh which on arriving home they ate. Twelve shortly afterward were taken ill, two dying in great agony. The other ten are in a critical condition. The physician thinks the meat was poisoned.

Mrs. Aubrey, eldest daughter of Chief Justice Fuller of the United States Supreme Court, has been granted a divorce from her husband. Mrs. Aubrey in her deposition says drunkenness was the principal reason for her married unhappiness.

British and Foreign.

A despatch from Madrid says 74 men and 15 women were lost by the wrecking of the steamer Don Pedro. The drowned were mostly Italian, Belgian and Swiss emigrants.

The Pacific Mail Co's steamship Colima has been wrecked. The Colima was an iron vessel of 2,906 tons. The wreck occurred between Manzanilla and Acapulco on Monday of last week. The Colima carried 192 people. There were forty cabin passengers, thirty-seven steerage, forty-three Chinese and the crew numbered seventy-two. The survivors were saved mainly by local residents who went out in boats to their assistance. Many of the passengers and members of the crew jumped overboard when the disaster occurred and tried to swim ashore. Advances received confirm the report that 105 lives were lost.

Hostilities have commenced at Formosa. Private advices received are to the effect that the Japanese are bombarding Kee Lung, a town in the extreme north of Formosa. Lord Li Chang Fang, son of Viceroy Li Hong Chang, accompanied by John W. Foster, the American adviser of the Chinese government, sailed for the Pescadores Thursday in order to formally transfer the island of Formosa to the Japanese, according to the terms of the treaty of Shimonoseki.

A series of earthquakes Saturday virtually razed the town of Paramythia, in European Turkey. Fifty persons were killed and 150 seriously injured. The inhabitants were panic-stricken, and passed the night in open spaces. The total number of shocks was twenty six. A Greek church, built 300 years ago, was moved several yards, but is still standing.

A shaft in Fifeshire colliery, Scotland caught fire Saturday morning and is still burning. Nine persons have already died from injuries received in trying to escape.

Three British warships have been ordered to Jiddah, seaport of Mecca, with orders to investigate the circumstances of the killing of the British vice-consul at that place and the wounding of the British consul, Russian consul and French consular secretary by Bedouins, also to protect lives and property of foreigners.

Great alarm has been caused in Honduras by the rumor that England threatens to collect \$3,000,000 owed to English bankers the same way she collected the debt from Nicaragua.
