

The Brigadier and staff-officer of the Salvation Army at St. John, T. Miles Scott, has been authorized to solemnize marriage within this Province. The announcement is made in the last *Royal Gazette*.

It is announced that the colored people are to have a camp-meeting at Onabog, Q. Co., commencing on Tuesday of this week. Rev. Mr. Henderson, pastor of St. Phillips' church (colored), St. John, is to lead the meetings.

The Maritime Convention of King's Daughters is to meet in St. John on Wednesday, 25th inst. Several prominent members of the organization from the United States are expected to be present. The Convention will be held in the Centenary church, and will continue three days.

Rev. Father O'Brien, a Jesuit priest from Ontario, is holding "a mission," or a series of "missions," in the Roman Catholic churches in Albert Co. A mission is what in a Protestant church would be called revival meetings. The attendance at the services conducted by the Jesuit priest is reported as large and considerable interest awakened—among Roman Catholics of course.

Last Sabbath Rev. Dr. Steele, pastor of the Amherst Baptist church announced that he intended to occupy the pulpit of the new church for one year only, and then that his service, as pastor, would end. The reasons given are that it is difficult, at the best, to lead so large a church, with its various interests, with the aid and sympathy of all, but when there is not full sympathy it is an impossible task. Understanding that there was some dissatisfaction, he preferred to offer his resignation rather than work when there is not perfect harmony. His reasons for giving a year's notice, instead of the usual three months, were, that it was due to himself, after the part he had taken in the erection of the new building, that he should preach in it for a time, and also that there were some matters of importance that needed attention before he could hand over the reins to his successor.

Dr. Steele has labored faithfully and with great acceptance in the Amherst Baptist church for 28 years, and his resignation was unexpected. What action the church may take is a matter of conjecture.

FROM REV. G. W. FOSTER.—Some time has passed since I have written anything for the *Intelligencer*, and, perhaps, I ought now to pen a few lines. We shall continue the services during this week at least. Pray for us.

NEW GOVERNOR.—Hon. J. C. Patterson was sworn in Governor of Manitoba last week. He has for several years, until last spring, been a member of the Dominion Government.

HON. WILLIAM LINDSAY, Woodstock, died on Saturday. He was 82 years of age. Up to within two or three weeks he had been in very good health. Mr. Lindsay was well known in the Province, and was regarded a man of ability and integrity. He was many years a representative of Carleton Co. in the Provincial Legislature, and was for some time a member of the government. He also sat for a few years in the Legislative Council. He was an independent thinker, feared nobody, and never hesitated to express his views on public questions, which he was able to do with clearness and force. He was a man of the people, and stood faithfully for their interests, and will be remembered kindly by them.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mrs. Payson, wife of Rev. G. B. Payson (Methodist), of this city, died very suddenly Wednesday morning of last week. She and Mr. Payson had the day before returned from a holiday trip, and seemed in her usual health. Paralysis of the brain was the cause of death. Mr. Payson has the sympathy of many friends.

STORM PREDICTION.—"Prof." Wiggins has ventured another storm prediction. He says there will be a great storm about the 21st of this month. He says it "will sweep the shores of all the continents from the equator to the poles as early as the 17th, but on the east coast of North America will reach its climax with high tides by the afternoon of Saturday, 21st inst." He says, also, that "there is danger of volcanic upheavals on the meridian of Japan, and of earthquakes in South America and Mexico."

POLITICAL NEWS.—It is stated that the ex-Governor of Manitoba, Sir John Schultz, will run for Parliament in a Manitoba constituency in the general election.

The Patrons of Industry claim that they are making encouraging progress all over the country. Prohibition is being made a plank in their platform. They expect to make a good showing in the general election, hoping to elect thirty or forty members.

There is some activity among Provincial politicians, looking towards a probable election of a new assembly this fall.

PERSONAL.—Major D. McLeod Vince, Woodstock, has been confined to his house for several weeks, suffering from rheumatism; but, we are glad to hear, is improving, and will probably be able to be out this week.

Dr. Atherton is expected here about the middle of this month. He has been in Toronto several years; but intends now to resume his practice in this city.

SMALL-POX.—An outbreak of small-pox in London has brought from the London *Lancet* the statement that at no time within the present generation has there been in England such gross and criminal carelessness in enforcing obedience to the vaccination laws as within the last six years. This, in turn, is due to the fact that a Royal Commission, appointed in 1889 to investigate the whole subject of vaccination, has done its work with such amazing deliberation that even it is not ready to make a report. Meanwhile the Boards of Guardians are constantly declaring that until the question is settled one way or another they do not feel called upon to enforce with vigor—at all would be truer—the provisions of the Vaccination Acts. As a consequence the most enlightened city in the world is exposed to the ravages of a wholly preventable disease.

Literary Notes.

Mark Twain contributes to the September *Harper's Magazine* a paper in which he gives an account of some curious personal experiences in telepathy, or second-sight, or coincidence, whatever it may be. These are in continuation of an account published in December, 1891, of some earlier experiences of the same sort which Mr. Clemens gave under the title "Mental Telegraphy."

An important contribution to the discussion of the Armenian question is made in the September *Harper's* in an article called "Arabia—Islam, and the Eastern Question." In this paper Dr. Thomson shows that persecution of the Armenians by the Turk, like the slaughter of the Christians of Damascus, was due not to local or temporary causes, but to hereditary race hatred and the unequivocal teaching of the Mohammedan religion. According to Dr. Thomson, civilization has little to expect from the enlightenment of the Turk or any other Moslem.

Japan has a large place in the pages of *The Missionary Review* for the month of September. The year 1895 in Japan, "deals with present conditions of affairs in the Sunrise Kingdom; Japan's Debt to Christianity; and the field of survey contain many statistics and items of interest concerning the rise and progress of Christianity in Japan and Korea. This issue contains three articles on "Medical Missions." Other articles of interest are on the "New Program of Missions," by the editor; and the "Work in India," by the late Dr. J. L. Phillips.
