News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The Local government engineer was at Hartland, C. Co., last week making a survey preparatory to making an estimate of the cost of a bridge across the river there.

The County Jail at Hampton contains more prisoners at present than it has for some time. Nearly all of them Scott act offenders.

While Mrs. Joseph Colter was in a neighbor's house Wednesday afternoon someone entered her residence on King street, this city, and stole a valuable gold watch, two or three brooches and other jewelry.

A young son of the late Johnson Patterson, of Midgie, Westmorland Co. was seriously, if not fatally, shot last week, by a son of George Patterson. The boys were playing with a gun, when it was discharged—five duck shot entering Patterson's face.

The hailstorm which passed over Buctouche and vicinity, Kent Co., a short time ago did great havoc. About fifty farmers lost their entire crops and fifty others lost over half of their crops.

The city council, at their regular meeting Tuesday, voted to repeal the sections by-law, which compel people to go to the market to sell and forbids forestall, g before ten o'clock.

The exports from the port of Fredericton for the month just ended amounted to \$24,352. The exports for the corresponding month last year amounted to \$9,199. The imports last month aggregated \$35,667; duty collected \$2,414.51. For the corresponding period last year it amounted to \$22,548; duty collected \$1,705.79.

The C. P. R. machine shops at McAdam are now running on full time and many new men are being employed.

The body of Robert M. Jones, the Carleton, St. John back-driver, who had been missing some days, was found in the river below Indian town on Friday.

A. G. Beckwith, C. E., of the provincial board of works department, Fredericton, has retired from the service.

In the Westmorland circuit court the convicts Reid and Doyle were sentenced to two additional years each for running away from the penitentiary.

P. H. Howie, who said he belonged to Halifax, was arrested for having stolen a watch, valued at about \$10, and one coat and vest, valued at about \$8 from William Arnold, Sussex. The articles were found on him. He had been in Arnold's employ for a month past.

Judge Barker on Tuesday gave judgment in the case of Annie E. Johnson vs. Asa B. Johnson, her husband. In this case the plaintiff prayed for an injunction restraining her husband from interference with her property on the ground of cruelty. His Honor held the defendant was guilty of cruelty as charged, and decreed that the injunction be made perpetual, restraining him from committing waste on his wife's land and also restraining him from said land so long as they live separate and apart.

The potato crop is large, but in very many localities the rust struck in early and now the potatoes are rotting rapidly. A gentleman from up river told a Sun reporter that according to the reports which he had received the rot was pretty general over the province, and farmers in order to save their potatoes would have to dig them at once.

Geo. H. Wallace, collector of customs at Sussex, has received a communication from some unknown person enclosing \$12.50 for unpaid duty. This is another case of conscience money.

C. R. Colpitts Esq., of Dover, W. Co. had a narrow escape from death in Moncton on Friday. He was stopping at the Commercial Hotel. In the morning he was found unconscious. In turning off the gas either there was a leak in the gas pipe, or in turning off the light he turned too far. For hours after being found he was unconscious, but at last accounts was progressing towards recovery.

Recently a number of valuable letters, addressed to different banks in this city, have failed to reach their destination. About three weeks ago, a gentleman at Cross Creek mailed a letter to the bank of Nova Scotia, here. The epistle failed to reach the bank. The post office authorities are unable to trace the missing letter. Another letter containing something like \$4,000 in coupons and bonds was mailed in St. John to the Bank of British North America Agency in this city, and failed to reach its destination. What are these letters have made is a mystery. It is well-known that the boxes in the post office in this city have been for some time in a disgraceful condition, and it is said that some of them can be easily opened by any person with keys other than the one which properly belongs to them. This fact has been offered as a solution to the mystery.

Nova Scotia.

Nathan Hilton, Esq., for many years Stipendiary Magistrate of Yarmouth, died last week. He was a highly respected citizen and official.

Prof. George Lawson has resigned the chair of chemistry in Dalhousie College filled by him for nearly thirty years.

The Middleton, N. S., box factory, has shipped this summer 10,000 pairs of barrel heads. Nearly 1,000 strawberry crates, 40,000 baskets, and stock for 90,000 baskets have also been sold during the past three months.

A Nova Scotia paper says that W. C. Archibald of Wolfville expects to have 20,000 baskets of plums this season, and will plant 20,000 fruit trees next spring.

In Truro Tuesday night a building used by J. Lewis & Sons as a warehouse, was destroyed by fire. Lewis had a valuable stock of ribbon peg wood, shoe shanks and bottle tops stored there.

At Middle Stewiacke, 28th August, Mrs. Pratt, who has been of unsound mind for some time past, in attempting to cross over a fence in a remote place, was caught by her foot and held there with her head downward. A search was made and the body was found last Tuesday.

The order of the Sons of Temperance in Nova Scotia has been very prosperous since the last annual meeting. Over 4000 have been initiated since November. One Division in Digby County has 228 members; one in Sydney has 227. There are now in all 254 Divisions, with nearly 14,000 members. The quarterly session was recently held at Sydney.

The freight train on the D. A. R., from Windsor Junction to Kentville, ran over and killed Alex. McDonald of St. Croix, near Newport, Thursday night.

The Joggins strike is over, the workmen having accepted the terms originally proposed by the management.

The following justices of the peace have just been appointed:—F. W. B. Longhead of Truro; Charles H. Eston, of Canard.

The United States battleship Indiana is to be docked at Halifax, N. S. The United States does not possess a dry dock large enough for a vessel of the Indiana's class.

The town of Liverpool was almost completely destroyed by fire Sunday morning. The fire started in an old building opposite Jubilee Hall, and burnt from the water's edge up through the business portion of the town. Several of the most prominent business places are in ashes. All the principal buildings are destroyed are: Store and wharf estate of J. V. Dexter; Jubilee Hall; Mrs. Head's boarding house; Trilby Hotel; A. W. Hendry's store; Union Bank; George Snodden's store; Andrew McNutt, house and store; D. Winter's butcher shop; Jourday's barber shop; N. H. Wetmore's store; Mulhail's grocery store; W. Harrington, house and store; Varg's jewelry store; Putnam's jewelry store; Mrs. A. W. Mader's fruit store; Hutchings drug store; A. W. Balcom's lively stable; Congregational church; Mrs. Bain's tenement; Jov. Winter's butcher shop and dwelling; F. O. Patch's wharf and two warehouses; Isaiah Wilde's house and shop; the Forbes' block; Colin Campbell, sr., two buildings; Advance office; Western Union Telegraph office, and Times office. Origin of fire unknown.

Other Provinces.

The cattle trade of the North West is growing almost amazingly. The C. P. R. now has orders for 1,000 cattle cars at various points.

At Carberry, Manitoba, Tuesday, Paul Brown, a mulatto farm-hand, twice shot his employer, a farmer named Robert Jewell. Jewell will recover.

The Newfoundland government has unearthed a series of smuggling frauds between St. John's and St. Pierre, Miq., spirits and tobacco being the chief articles dealt in. This smuggling has been going on for years, and among those concerned are many prominent citizens.

The handling and transportation to the seaboard of such an immense volume of produce as Manitoba and the North-west have this year to dispose of, is a gigantic undertaking. The Canadian Pacific Railway company is making the most perfect arrangements

for the transportation of the enormous North-west crop. Every available spare car has been called in to assist in the work of transportation, and additional cars will be built to meet the demand.

Toronto is supplied with water from Lake Ontario, a pipe leading into the city from the lake where the water is pure. Last week the main pipe went to pieces, and the city is in a very bad state for water. It will take weeks perhaps months, to secure a proper supply.

The wheat yield in the Portage district is turning out phenomenal. The tales told by the threshers put all estimates of yield in the shade. Near Portage la Prairie, Charles Outhbert in threshing a field of twenty-one acres received 1,193 bushels, or an average of about fifty-seven bushels per acre.

United States.

By the bursting of a gas main at the works of the Providence (R. I.) Gas Co. on Wednesday five men were suffocated and a sixth narrowly escaped death.

On Wednesday the Boston and Albany wharf and freight sheds in East Boston, known as Pier 1, grand docks, were destroyed by fire. The sheds were filled with freight of various kinds, none of which could be saved. The merchandise in the sheds was valued at about \$300,000, and the wharf and building were valued at about \$200,000.

While a train drawing seventeen cars crowded to suffocation by excursionists to Coney Island was standing at Woodlawn station, Brooklyn, a wild cat engine telescoped the rear car. The woodwork caught fire. Four cars were completely destroyed. Of the fifty or more injured it is thought that possibly half a dozen may die.

It is believed that at least eight tramps met their death early Thursday morning by the burning of a large barn belonging to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company near Ernest Station Pa. Six bodies have already been recovered. The barn has been the rendezvous for tramps for years.

A slight earthquake shock was felt throughout the states of New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey early Sunday morning.

Geo. A. Fraker of Topeka, Kan., the man who was supposed to have been drowned in the Mor river two years ago, and whose alleged heirs recently recovered a judgment against insurance companies for \$58,000 life insurance, was captured in the woods near Tower, Minn. last week.

H. H. Holmes, the alleged murderer, has written a book the purpose of which seems to be largely blackmail. With the money thus realized Holmes expects to engage eminent legal talent to save his neck if possible from the gallows.

The potato yield in Aroostook Co. promises to eclipse all previous years. Very good judges estimate that there are 40,000 acres planted this year. And with the average yield be at least 6,000,000 bushels put into the market. T. H. Phair, of Presque Isle the largest starch manufacturer in the county, told a reporter the other day that he would not make any starch this year, as there is practically no market for it. It is feared potatoes will go to waste. It is feared potatoes will be a glut on the market this year in the eastern states, as the western crop is reported large.

British and Foreign.

Vienna advises say that cholera is raging at Broussa, and that forty deaths occurred from the disease there daily.

A despatch says that cholera is raging in China, and that 2,000 deaths occur daily in Pekin.

It is stated that the Japanese government has contracted with a ship building firm at Glasgow for the construction of five war ships, the cost of which will be nearly \$5,000,000.

Serious disturbances, resulting from the enmity of the Hindus and Mohammedans, are reported from Dhulia a town in Candahar district of India. A mob of Mohammedans attacked a Hindu procession on Sunday, killing ten of the paraders and wounding fifty others.

The Nihilist scare prevailing in the Russian capital has become very intense. The measures taken to protect the emperor and other members of the imperial family suggest the return of the days marking the worst period of the reign of Alexander III. The summer palace is closed and the Czar is guarded at every step. The Czarina, is suffering greatly from the nervous strain.

An attempt was made Thursday to explode a bomb in the Rothschild

bank at Paris. The would-be bomb thrower was arrested and taken to the police station.

Sixteen persons have been sentenced for participating in the massacres of missionaries at Kueheng and been executed. As yet nothing has been done in regard to claims made by British and American ministers respecting attacks on missionaries at Szechuan.

There were 2,025 cases of cholera and 118 deaths from the disease in the government of Volhynia, Russia, between July 11 and August 17.

Advices from St. Petersburg are to the effect that the Russian police have discovered a wide-spread plot against the life of the Czar and other members of the imperial family. Some of the leaders were quietly arrested. Bombs, arms and revolutionary pamphlets have been seized by the police of Moscow during domiciliary visits.

Cholera has claimed 15,000 victims thus far in Japan and has attacked 34,000. Nearly a thousand new cases and seven hundred deaths occur daily in the 47 towns and districts where the disease has made its appearance. The places most seriously affected are the cities of Osaka and the town of Hiroshima, the former reporting 140 cases daily and the latter 120.

It is announced that the Turkish ambassador to England, has telegraphed the foreign minister that he has had an interview with Lord Salisbury relative to the Armenian question, whom he had assured, that Turkey could not permit control of Armenia by an international commission. Lord Salisbury replied that under the circumstances it would be useless to continue the interview. If, he said, the porte persists in its refusal the powers will undertake the suggested reforms. If, however, the porte continues to resist, Lord Salisbury added, it would be a signal for the dismemberment of Turkey.

A despatch from Hong Kong says the leader of the Kueheng massacre has been captured by the authorities. The total number of persons thus far arrested for participation in the outrages at Kueheng is 160, of whom 28 have been convicted.

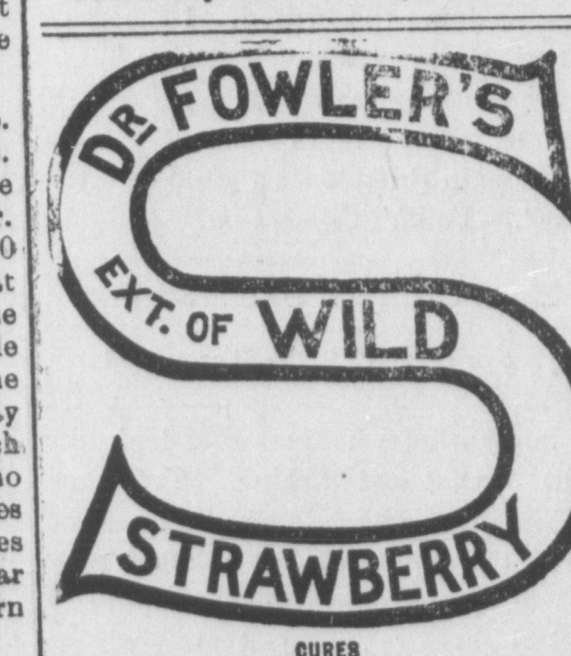
