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The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Fourth Quarter—Lesson VIII—Nov. 22.

REWARDS OF OBEDIENCE.—Proverbs 3:1-17.

Read Proverbs 3:1-35. Commit verses 1-4.

GOLDEN TEXT.—In all thy ways acknowledge him and he shall direct thy paths.—Prov. 3:6.

FIRST CONDITION.—A GODLY LIFE.—Vs. 1-4. My son. The older and wiser man addresses the younger, as a father and friend. Forget not my law. It is our duty and our wisdom to (1) read the whole law of God; (2) to study it earnestly; (3) to use it as a guide to our daily lives.

There are those who say that they cannot become interested in reading the Bible. But as soon as they use it as a guide for living, to find out what to do and what to believe, it gains a new and deep interest. Silently to forget God's law is a much more common thing than blasphemously to reject it. It is no excuse for doing evil to say that we did not think. Let thine heart keep my commandments. There is no true, lasting obedience that does not come from the heart. Mere outward obedience is not acceptable. For length of days and years of life and peace. Long life is of little use unless it be accompanied by peace and prosperity. (1) A wise way of living falls in with the laws of health. Reckless fully saps the energies of life, induces disease, premature old age, and death. A large part of the premature deaths are the result of crime or disobedience to one or another of God's laws. (2) The statement is especially true of nations. (3) While not a few righteous die young, their early death is often due to the sins of others. (4) The righteous have by far the most good out of life. If we measure life by deeds, not years, the righteous live longest. Mercy toward the sinning and toward the suffering. And truth, sincerity, upright dealings in all things. These are mentioned as duties toward our fellow men which are apt to be neglected. Bind them about thy neck, as costly ornaments, carefully guarded from loss. They are indeed the graces and the beauty of men, as well as their duty. Write them on the table (tablet) of thine heart. As the ten commandments upon the tablets of stone, never to be effaced. The heart is a tablet on which many things are being continually written. We should take care that only the best and noblest things are written there. Favour and good understanding. God cannot give his best favor to those who will not obey him. If any one would enjoy God's favor, it must be by coming out of the dark shadow of sin into the sunshine of his grace. The best way to find favor with man is to be in favor with God.

THE SECOND CONDITION.—FAITH IN GOD.—Vs. 5-8. Trust in the Lord with all thine heart, with no divided allegiance. No one is wise enough to plan confidently and insist on having his plan realized at any cost. God is our best guide. How are we to know whether he is guiding us? (1) Not usually by any mere impressions on the mind. (2) By the principles of his word. If anything is wrong we know that that is one of the things he does not want us to do. (3) By the leading of his Holy Spirit. (4) By using our reason and good judgment. (5) By following on, day by day, doing present duties. Lean not upon thine own understanding, whenever it differs from God's expressed will. Self-conceit and over confidence are great hindrances to the best success. In all thy ways acknowledge (recognize) him, as teacher, master and guide. And he shall direct thy paths, open the way for you, and guide you to the best ends. Wise in thine own eyes, i. e., in thine own opinion or conceit. Self-confidence is often but another name for self-deception. Fear the Lord. Not be afraid of, but reverence his greatness, and wisdom, and goodness. And depart from evil. The natural consequences of fearing the Lord. It shall be health to thy navel, the muscles of the body, And marrow, or moisture, to thy bones. The marrow was supposed to keep the bones in a healthy state. These results are to be taken both physically and spiritually. From the fear of the Lord comes health of body and of soul. To commit our ways wholly to God, to do his will, is to believe on him unto salvation.

THIRD CONDITION.—CONSECRATION.—Vs. 9, 10. The consecration of property to God is one manifestation of entire consecration of ourselves. It requires faith, self-denial and love for men and for the cause of God. Honour the Lord with thy substance, the property you possess. To honor the Lord with this is to devote freely a generous portion of it to his cause, as an acknowledgment that all comes from him. You cannot honor him by giving away a part of unjust gains. Only clean

money honors God. The first-fruits. First and best. Of all thine increase. Your gains. So shall thy barns be filled with plenty. There are two reasons for this. One is found in the natural results of such a spirit. It is a training in generous sowing for larger crops. It cultivates broadmindedness and larger views. It inspires with new and stronger motives for industry. The other reason is in God's favor. God controls all things, and he makes all things work for good to those that love him. The pillar of cloud is light to his people and darkness to his enemies. But far greater is the spiritual blessing, the increased love, the consciousness of usefulness. Fals shall overflow out. Overflow with the crop of grapes.

FOURTH CONDITION.—DISCIPLINE AND REPROOF.—Vs. 11, 12. Despise not (shrink not from) the chastening. Discipline, instruction by punishment. There are some lessons which we never learn except through discipline. Neither be weary; i. e., do not feel vexation towards. Of his reproof, or correction by means of reproof. For whom the Lord loveth he reproveth. Care, burdens, losses, sickness, troubles are no proof that we are worse than other men, but are the fatherly discipline of one who loves us too well to let us go on in wrong. Even as a father the son in whom he delighteth, and because he delights in him. God's strokes are better than Satan's kiss and love. God smites for life, Satan caresses for death.

The School of God. For human beings there is no way of gaining wisdom without learning in the school of God. He has some discipline for every virtue to be gained. God's school has an infinite variety. Life is full of God's lessons. Every trial, every temptation, every hard duty, every pain for him, every burden, every pain, and also each joy, and prosperity, all love and peace, these are his lesson books. God sends us to his school because he loves us. His disciplines by joy as well as by sorrow.

THE BLESSEDNESS OF THE LIFE OF HEAVENLY WISDOM.—Vs. 13-17. Happy is the man. He is blessed in every way, at all times, from all sources, in all departments of his life, in all circumstances. He is blessed in body and in soul; in time and in eternity. That findeth (has found, and holds possession of) wisdom. Often there is far more gained in the act of searching than in the mere possession. The merchandise of it. It must be gained by labor and cost, as earthly treasures are. It is impossible to impart character or wisdom by direct gift. She is more precious than rubies, which probably includes all precious stones. The things thou canst desire. All pleasures, all delights, all the treasures that men give up their lives to obtain. Wisdom is far above all these. Length of days, a long and happy, useful life, even life forever more. In her right hand, as the best of these gifts. In her left hand As not so valuable as long life. Are riches; that is, all the good things that riches can bring. Agar's prayer, Give me neither poverty nor riches, expresses the best that possessions can do for us. Poverty is not a blessing in itself, nor is immense wealth. And honor, outward respect and love for the people. Her ways are ways of pleasantness; i. e., ways in which one obtains what is agreeable. The very acts of religion are in themselves pleasant. The worship, love, gratitude, benevolence, labors for others are all delightful in themselves. All her paths are peace. Peace with God and with man; peace with one's own soul.

Fredericton Union.

Wednesday, Oct. 28th. This meeting of W. C. T. U. was particularly interesting. Mrs. Gill delegate to Prov. Union gave a very full report of those meetings.

There was a full attendance at the convention, the pleasure of which was enhanced by the presence of Mrs. Barney. Judging from the report the devotional element prevailed and all engaged heartily in the work of the convention.

For the benefit of those who may not know we may say that the Prov. Union was organized a little over a year ago. Previous to that time we had been included in the Maritime. As it was thought by several that better or more work could be done for the Province with a smaller representation, it was thought best to withdraw for a time, and so the Provincial Union was formed. The year seems to have been a successful one. Several new local unions have been organized in different parts of the province, the Yeomans' bands increased, etc. There were reports from the sailors' home, and the children's home, St. John, showing that good work was being done in those institutions. The

prayer meetings before the sessions and the noon day Bible reading kept alive the devotional spirit and inspired the workers with love, hope and zeal.

There were discussions on Narcotics urging an incessant war against the use of them.

How to get temperance legislation also concerning the Sabbath that its sanctity may be preserved. To discountenance the publishing of Sunday papers. Temperance teaching for the children, both in day schools and Sunday schools was emphasized. There was also a talk on how to make a local union interesting. Some of the remarks we note:—Without devotion and self sacrifice there will be lack of zeal. A good strong leader is necessary, not easily discouraged. Always, say we in speaking of the union not they, which puts the responsibility nowhere. A talk on the white ribbon badge emphasizing the importance of always wearing this little token, which may be helpful to others. Incidents were given showing that the door of the heart has been opened to sympathy and help by this simple sign. A memorial service was held in memory of dear Mrs. Yeomans. The meetings throughout were characterized by the utmost harmony, and closed by singing, 'God be with you till we meet again,' and the benediction.

St. Mary's Home, Reigate, is an institution founded by Lady Henry Somerset, in memory of her beloved father, Earl Somers, who left his property to his eldest daughter (the youngest being already provided for as Duchess of Bedford). From this home have gone forth a large number of young women who were utterly friendless and forsaken in the streets of London but for the loving care of our English chief, Lady Henry has been most fortunate in securing as the head of this institution, Miss Hoddinott, one of the most genuine white-ribboners anywhere to be found. A woman of warm, motherly heart, and excellent executive ability, a keeper of the peace, with the rare statesman-like quality of harmonizing discordant elements. St. Mary's Home has become an affiliated interest to the B. W. T. A. and Miss Hoddinott reports at the annual meeting.—Union Signal.

News comes to Headquarters of active temperance work being done on the Isthmus of Panama. Marie Duchatellier, a brilliant Haytian woman sojourning there at present, is doing splendid service for the cause by organizing Loyal Temperance Legio's. She wrote recently from La Boca, which city is at present the center of her operations.

The Christian Endeavor Society of Great Britain and America have set apart the second week in November as a period of universal prayer for Armenia. They urge the churches to take the matter up, and ask that the regular prayer-meeting, and other times during that week, be devoted to petition that God may speedily stay the hand of the great assassin. All religious and reform papers are requested to publish this information, and to do what they can toward securing the cooperation of local Christian Endeavor societies and of pastors. No one knows better than the women of the W. C. T. U. the power of concentrated prayer. They know, too, that while we pray as if everything depended upon God we must work as if everything depended upon ourselves. We believe that Christendom has a work to do in freeing Christian Armenians from Turkish tyranny and barbarity. May He who heareth prayer show us how to work!
