News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

As the five year son of Mr. Douglas Hannah, Moncton, was playing with a pair of scissors, last Saturday evening, he accidentally drove the points into one of his eyes destroying the sight.

The survey for the Woodstock and Centreville railway is being pushed forward vigorously.

D. W. Hoegg & Co. are to erect a new two-story wooden building in this city, for the manufacture of pickles.

Daniel Sweeney and Edward Armstrong, on trial at Dorchester for receiving stolen property, were last week found guilty.

St. Croix valley was visited by a heavy rain storm commencing Saturday and continuing several days. The most of the snow has disappeared. The ice has gone from the river. The extremely high tide on Monday carried all the loose ice down stream. A great many of the wharves were covered and the workmen were kept busy looking after the lumber. On the Saint Stephen side the top part of one of the wharves was loosened and floated down river.

Amos G. Sharp, of Queens county, has instituted divorce proceedings. He was married in 1881 to Miss Rosella Vanwart of Wickham. The plaintiff claims to be able to prove that his wife, who is now living in Upper Canada, has been twice married since leaving him and that both husbands are living, one of them with her and the other in an insane asylum.

There is talk of bringing out a pronounced temperance candidate for mayor in St. John.

Murray and Emery Scott, of Douglas, York Co., have been summoned to appear at the police court on the charge of assaulting their mother, Mrs. Benjamin Gilbert, whose husband is now awaiting trial on the charge of bigamy. It is said that the Scott brothers, a short time ago, attempted to force the old lady to make over her property to them, and because she refused to comply with their wishes they committed the alleged assault.

Colin McRae, a tailor, living on an island off Marble Mountain, C. B., suicided Tuesday by hanging. McRae was married and had six children.

John Verge was killed at East River, Sheet Harbor, N. S., Tuesday. He was in the woods as a chopper, and met his death by a large limb from a tree falling on him. He was 19 years of age.

A week or two ago, James Seabury of Jordan Falls, N. S., while returning from prayer meeting became suddenly blind. He was assisted home by friends and since then day for night is all the same to him. Some years ago the unfortunate man lost the sight of one eye.

James Newham, aged 18, lost his life at Woodland Ont., Friday by falling on a circular saw, which cut off one foot and almost severed the body.

A boy named Leon and Mr. Casey, were filling bags with sawdust at Klock's mills, Aylmer, Que. The frozen top of the heap undermined and fell in. The boy is dead and Casey in a critical position.

Ed. Griffin, who sold his farm at Truro, arrived at Montreal Friday en route for the west, and with \$2,500 stitched in the lining of an inside coat, went out to see the town. He became sleepy in an east end saloon and using his coat for a pillow, went to sleep. He woke and found his coat and the price of his farm gone. A detective found that the garment had been sold to a second-hand dealer for 75 cents. Buying it back for \$1, the Nova Scotian's little fortune was found intact.

At Penetanguishene, Ont Sunday a fire took place in which three children were burned to death. The mother locked the three children in the house and went off to her mother's on some errand, and it is supposed the children must have been playing with the stove and set fire to the house. When the neighbors came they could hear the children crying, but could not get near them.

United States.

The date of the execution of H. H. Holmes, the convicted murderer, has been fixed for May 7.

In the case of H. H. Holmes, sentenced to death for murdering Benjamin F. Pictel, the judgement has been confirmed. The Governor, it is believed will fix an early day for the execution. Holmes has lately been making preparations for the gallows, and is said to have sent for a Catholic priest.

Fifteen buildings in the centre of Danbury, Conn., was burned on Tuesday. Loss, \$150,000. Fire in the buildings of the hardware plant of the Russell Erwin Manufacturing Co. Britain, Conn., Tuesday, did \$300,000 damage.

Governor Greenhalge, of Massachusetts, died on Wednesday last.

Maine papers tell many stories of adventure, escape, loss and disaster by the great freshet of the past year. A bridge between Gardiner and Randolph, carried away by the flood, was 900 feet long and had stood since 1853.

Lewiston, Me. had two fires on Wednesday. The grist mill and grain elevator of J. B. Ham & Co., in the Grand Trunk yard, and almost at the same time in the beef warehouse of Ferd Penley. Both buildings were burned to the ground with their contents. The Ham mill lost \$10,000 on building and \$25,000 on stock. The Penley warehouse contained \$5,000 worth of meat about 100 tons of ice, valued at \$10,000, and valuable refrigerator, which will bring the loss up to \$10,000.

British and Foreign.

A serious outbreak of yellow fever has occurred in Rio Janeiro. Of the crew of the Italian warship Lombardia, numbering 230 men, 225 have been attacked by the disease and 84 have died.

An uprising of Mopleh fanatics in the Madras district, India, has assumed serious proportions. The British attacked a large party of them on Sunday and are said to have killed one hundred.

The longest telegraph line in the world above ground and without a break has just been completed in Australia. It runs from Rockhampton in Queensland, to Brooms, in Western Australia—a total length of over 6000 miles.

Gen. Baleissara, the newly appointed commander-in-chief of the Italian forces in Abyssinia, has asked the government to send to Africa at once additional artillery men and munitions of war. He also reports that of the 18,000 men who were missing after the battle fought at Adowa last Sunday 7,000 have returned to the Italian camp and others are arriving daily.

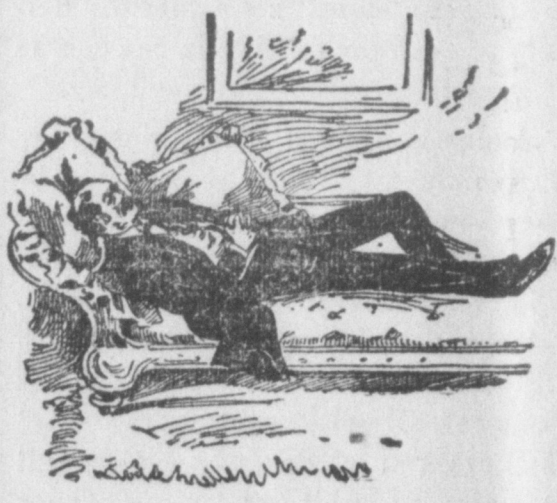

N. B. Legislature.

Monday.—Mr. Blair committed a bill consolidating and amending the several acts relating to payment of succession duties.

He said the bill was largely a consolidation and codification of existing acts. There was no change in the rate of taxation, a portion of the bill, however, was new, relating to procedure. The government had been experiencing a good deal of difficulty in getting at the actual value of some estates, and there had been developed a disposition to make disposition, before death of property in order to evade this tax. In order to make the act as thorough as possible in its operation it was proposed that as respects procedure it should be retroactive in its operation so as to be applicable to all estates from the time the act of 1892 was passed. Progress was reported with leave to sit again.

Mr. Dibblee committed a bill amending the law incorporating Hartland village for water and fire purposes. Agreed to with amendments.

Mr. White introduced a bill imposing a tax on dogs and for the protection of sheep.

Mr. Blair committed a bill incorporating the Grand Temple of Honor of Temperance of New Brunswick and subordinate temples. Agreed to.

Tuesday.—Dr. Stockton moved the motion of which he had given notice regarding probate fees returns.

Mr. Mitchell said all possible information would be furnished without the formality of an address.

Mr. Beveridge committed a bill incorporating the village of Andover for fire and water purposes. Progress was reported.

Mr. Howe committed a bill authorizing the York municipality to issue debentures to pay outstanding temporary loans. Agreed to.

Mr. Black committed a bill authorizing York municipality to issue temporary loans. Agreed to.

The house went into further consideration of the bill relating to succession duties. Agreed to with amendments.

Wednesday.—Mr. Porter committed a bill to revive, continue and amend an act incorporating the town of Grand Falls. Progress was reported.

Mr. Emmerson committed a bill to amend chapter 115 con. stats. of sewers and marsh lands.

Mr. Lewis said the manager of the Albert railway had told him that that road might be seriously affected by the passage of the bill.

The bill was agreed.

Mr. White committed a bill imposing a tax on dogs, and for the protection of sheep.

Mr. White said the bill was in the interest of the sheep industry, which had suffered much through the ravages of dogs. It was proposed that an annual tax be imposed of \$1 for every dog and \$5 for every female dog throughout the province. The taxes would go into a fund to meet losses of those who might have sheep destroyed after the passage of this bill.

It was not proposed to pass the bill regardless of the will of the people. Section two provided if a petition of rate-payers, being householders, to the number of 15 in each parish of a municipality outside of the limits of any city or incorporated town, shall be presented to the council of the municipality, such council may, by-law, provide that the said tax shall not be levied.

The house divided even on the section imposing a tax of \$5, on female dogs, and the chairman decided in favor of the yeas.

After the passage of several sections, progress was reported.

Thursday.—Mr. Barnes committed a bill exempting butter and cheese factories from taxation. Agreed to.

Mr. Emmerson committed a bill to enable the municipality of Albert to issue debentures.

Agreed to.

Mr. Dunn committed a bill to authorize the trustees of Main street Baptist church, St. John, to issue debentures. Agreed to.

Friday.—Mr. Killam, from the public accounts committee, submitted a report.

Mr. Porter recommended a bill to revive and continue an act incorporating the town of Grand Falls. Agreed to.

Mr. Dibblee committed a bill providing additional sewerage service for the town of Woodstock.

Agreed to.

Mr. Blair committed a bill amending an act respecting assignments and preferences by insolvent persons.

Agreed to.

Mr. Blair committed a bill further amending the registry act. Agreed to.

Saturday.—Mr. White recommitted a bill imposing a tax upon dogs and for the protection of sheep.
