INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Third Quarter—Lesson XI.—Sept. 13.

DAVID'S GRATITUDE TO GOD.—2 Samuel 22:40-51.

Read Chapters 22 and 23:1-23. Commit verses 47-50.

GOLDEN TEXT.—The Lord is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer.—2 Sam. 22:2.

DAVID'S LAST CHARGE TO HIS SUCCESSOR.—1 Kings 2:1-11.

First. A charge to show himself a man.

Second. To obey God and keep his commandments, the only necessary condition of a successful life.

Third. To do some disagreeable duties, which for various reasons David could not do, but which ought to be done. David's dying request was to reward a good act and to execute two men. Such a death bed request seems strange.

He laid upon Solomon the execution of Joab, the general of his armies; this was not revenge, but a duty, which David felt that he had neglected. Joab had deliberately and treacherously murdered two of the chief men of Israel. There is no sign that Joab repented of his two murders. Moreover, he had joined in Adonijah's attempt upon the throne, and would be a dangerous and evil element in Solomon's kingdom. Shimei, who had cursed David so bitterly, was also to be punished as Solomon deemed best. He was another unpunished rascal, full of danger to Solomon's kingdom.

LAST WORDS OF DAVID.—2 Sam. 23:1-7. This is a short hymn. It was his last public utterance.

THE DEATH AND BURIAL OF DAVID.—1 Chron. 29:26-30. David died at the age of seventy. He was buried at Jerusalem, in the tombs of the kings cut in the rocks under Mount Zion. No trace of his tomb now remains, although it still existed in the time of Christ (Acts 2:29).

A BACKWARD LOOK. The portrait in 1 Chronicles 29:29 is a true picture of David's life as a whole. It was like a day in June, with some cloud-shadows floating over the landscape, and with one terrible storm in which we hear the voice of God's wrath against sin, the storm cleared away, and the "sun of righteousness, with healing in his wings," shone over all.

Practical. (1) Imperfect men can do great good, if they repent of their sins. (2) We are to judge of a man by his whole life, and not by some small portion of good or evil.

A LOOK FORWARD. All the ages since his time have been better because of what he was and what he did. His kingdom is the only one that has survived through all changes. His royal line, the only one that has had no end. Through him came the Messiah.

DAVID'S SONG OF PRAISE. With minor variations, this song is the same as Psalm 18. *Thou hast girded. As warriors bind up all their garments and fortify their loins, that they may be fitted for strenuous effort. With strength to battle. No small portion of David's life was a warfare against the enemies of God, of his people, and his truth. We see the great dangers to which he had been exposed in verses 1, 4, 7. That I might destroy them that hate me.... I beat them as small as the dust, to be scattered to the four winds; as the mire of the street, useless and defiling. To understand David's feeling in uttering these expressions, we must put ourselves in his place. If we were defending ourselves and our families against robbers; if we were defending our country against foreign invaders; if we were fighting for liberty and religion, then we would feel that the prayer for the destruction and scattering of our enemies was holy. However, for the most of the time we must translate these feelings into terms of spiritual warfare, and desire that corruption, and tyranny, and intolerance, and the whole host of sins should be scattered to the winds. Heroism, courage, patriotism are as real, and living, and growing amid the temptations of civil life as on the field of war. So in the church the truest preparation for bearing bravely the cross of Christ in times of persecution is to bear the cross Christ gives us day by day. Strivings of my people. Internal dissensions, of which David had not a few at first. A type of the complete triumph of Christian unity over all the dissensions of the kingdom. A people which I know not shall serve me. The surrounding nations, of which David had no previous personal knowledge, attacked him, were defeated, and came under his sway. This is a type of what Christianity is doing. It is making things unknown in the earlier days to become servants and helpers of the kingdom of God. The Lord liveth. He not only exists, but lives; is alive to the needs of his children, is quick to see their needs, to hear their prayers, and to extend help. My rock. The personal pronoun all through this song and through the psalms is very*

instructive. It speaks to the heart. It signifies a very close and definite relation. It expresses God's care for each individual. He calleth his sheep by name. *My rock.... the God of the rock of my salvation.* He seems to have a difficulty in finding any one word which would adequately express all that Jehovah had been to him, so he heaps one term upon another, calling him a rock, a fortress, a deliverer, a shield, a high tower, a horn, a refuge, and a Saviour. *It is God that avengeth me,* by punishing his enemies. David does not claim the victory himself, but attributes it to God. He could have done nothing without God. It was because he identified himself with God's cause that he would triumph. He that identifies himself with irreligion and sin must fail in the end. The least one can do who has received benefits is to express his gratitude.

1. All people should praise God from their hearts.

2. They should praise him with their voices and with their lives; in public and in private, in form and in spirit.

3. He that hath a praising spirit will always find something to praise God for.

4. A praising spirit is the sign of a right heart.

5. A praising spirit is the way to become better.

6. A praising spirit is one way to a happy life.

7. Praise is the precursor of brighter blessings.

8. Songs in the night are a sign of the morning.

Work Ended.

MRS. LETITIA YOUNG DIED AT HER HOME, SATURDAY, JULY 18. SHE RESTS FROM HER LABORS AND HER WORKS DO FOLLOW HER.

Though the illness of Mrs. Letitia Young, the pioneer of the W. C. T. U. movement in Canada has been long continued and painful, yet when on Friday, July 17, the Ontario Alliance Convention adopted a resolution expressive of its appreciation of her indefatigable and valuable labors in the cause of Prohibition, not one of that vast audience anticipated that the end would come so soon. It was the following evening, at her residence, 19 Metcalfe street, Toronto, that this devoted worker received her release from the militant hosts of Prohibition and passed over to join the noble band, including such names as Mary T. Lathrap, and our own Mrs. Ella F. M. Williams, of Montreal, late president of the Dominion W. C. T. U., who are entered into their reward. The cause of death was inflammatory rheumatism, to which the deceased lady had been a martyr for some months, and which ailment caused her much suffering. This, however, was born with exemplary patience, and, fortified by the religious belief to which she had devotedly clung from her youth upwards, she met the dread summons with perfect resignation. Her death will cause a feeling of deep regret not only throughout Canada, but in Great Britain, and in fact every British colony where she was known, either by her speeches or her writings on the subject of temperance reform.

The opportunity to take up the cause of temperance reform came with the adoption of the Dankin Act in Prince Edward county, and the late Mrs. Young prominently identified herself with the movement. She took an active part circulating petitions and delivering addresses. Subsequently she was present as a delegate from Prince Edward county at the Montreal Conference, and her speeches on that occasion were listened to with much interest. On the occasion of the union of the British and British-American Order of Templars, Mrs. Young delivered an address at Cobourg. Her abilities received speedy recognition. At the next meeting of the Grand Lodge of the order she was selected as superintendent of the juvenile work of the association, and was given a place on the editorial staff of the "Temperance Union," the organ of the society. Going to Toronto for the purpose of organizing a Women's Christian Temperance Union, she succeeded in arousing public sentiment by addressing meetings in various parts of the city, and visiting the prisons and hospitals; finally setting on foot the presentation of petitions to the Ontario Legislature for the restriction of the liquor traffic. From that time onward she gave herself up to the work of forming women's unions throughout the province. For five years she acted as president of the Ontario Provincial Women's Christian Temperance Union, and in October, 1893, on the formation of the Dominion Union, she was elected as its first president. In company with Sir Leonard Tilley, Mr. G. W.

Ross, G. M. Rose and others, Mrs. Young represented Canada at the World's Temperance Congress in Philadelphia.

In the advocacy of temperance reform she travelled from end to end of the United States, and her services were everywhere welcomed and appreciated. The passage of the Scott Act in Canada afforded her an excellent opportunity, and she spoke and worked hard in its favor with much success, not only in Ontario, but other parts of the Dominion. At the request of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Alliance, the late Mrs. Young went to that province to inaugurate the work of the W. C. T. U., and was instrumental in forming eighteen unions. In May, 1882, she visited England as a fraternal delegate to the British Women's Temperance Association, and she was persuaded to address large gatherings in many important towns in the United Kingdom. Wherever she went she never failed to produce a most favorable impression. To Sunday school work the late Mrs. Young gave considerable attention, and in this she was equally as successful as in the temperance movement. Her position as president of the W. C. T. U. corresponded with the position at one time held by Miss Frances Willard in the United States, and by Lady Henry Somerset in England. Both these ladies were advised by cable on Monday of Mrs. Young's death.

Impressive memorial services were held in Cobourg St. church. The remains were interred at Pictou, Prince Edward county. The remains were laid away in her beautiful plot in Glenwood cemetery. Delegates from the W. C. T. U. of Belleville and other points attended the funeral. A large number of beautiful and costly wreaths and flowers were laid out around the coffin.—Royal Templar.

Sir Robert Peel's Daughter.

Society has a way of avenging itself for the wrongs committed on the lowest of all its members. Sir Robert Peel gave his daughter a magnificent riding habit on her nineteenth birthday, and attired in the embroidered gown she rode side by side with him in the parks of London. The poor seamstress, in a garret in one of the slums, while she was embroidering that garment, looked upon a husband snoring in the paroxysm of chills, and she took the half finished garment and laid it over him; and the garment took up the germs of fever, and conveyed them from the hovel of the poorest to the palace of the statesman. And so we are bound together in one bundle of social life; and if we neglect the poorest and lowest, society will avenge itself in the destruction of the highest and the richest and most cultivated.
