News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

It is announced that the erection of permanent structures for stables, etc., at Sussex for military purpose will not be proceeded with the present season.

Harry Dee, a colored tramp, is in jail at Oromocto. He stole two watches from R. B. Smith, Fredericton Junction.

John T. Kelly, of the Inland Revenue department, captured two stills at New Ireland, Albert county.

Sussex ships 6,000 pounds of milk every morning, and 4,000 to 5,000 daily is sent to the cheese factory, making five tons marketed per day.

The Eighth Hussars are to go into camp at Sussex September 29th. The 12th Field Battery, C. A., the Brighton Engineers and 71st Battalion will drill at local headquarters at dates to be fixed.

A few days ago fire broke out in the barrel manufactory of L. Martin, at Gaspereaux. All the machinery was destroyed. Loss estimated at \$1,500 to \$2,000. No insurance.

Shanties are being built along the line of the Woodstock and Centreville railway, and every preparation appears to be made for rushing the work. The matter to be settled before active work may be begun is the right of way.

On Thursday Jack Jonah, alias McDonald, Moncton, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester penitentiary under the speedy trials act by Judge Wells for stealing a wagon cushion.

A Newcastle despatch of Saturday says: "Fire broke out in D. & J. Ritchie's mill here about 11 o'clock last night. The fire was discovered by the watchman about one of the gangs in the mill. He immediately gave the alarm, but within a very few minutes the whole mill was ablaze. The town turned out and did what they could to save the property and most of the lumber on the wharf was saved. Two vessels loading at the wharf, the Valona, belonging to the firm, and the Svea, a Norwegian bark, were towed to safe anchorage by the steamer Rustler, Capt. Russell. The Valona is badly damaged. The two vessels had on board about \$20,000 worth of lumber. The mill and all the machinery was destroyed and considerable damage was done to the wharf. The total loss is between \$40,000 and \$50,000; insurance, \$12,000. The fire throws out of employment about 400 men. The Globe says the insurance is divided as follows: Lancashire, \$2,700; Imperial, \$2,400; Liverpool & London & Globe, Aetna and Northern, \$1,800 each, and Union \$1,500.

George Wilson, clerk in Chesley's store, Amherst, N. S. is badly injured, the result of a collision with another bicycle ridden by Miss Eva Weeks.

The N. S. telephone Co. have completed a new line between New Glasgow, Pictou and Truro where it connects with the long distance line to Halifax. A second wire between Truro and Halifax will be completed in September.

Halifax city council proposes to tax bicyclists 25 cents per year and to number and license them. An indignation meeting of wheelmen has protested against such legislation.

The crop report of the Nova Scotia government gives a cheering outlook as to the probable yield for the present year. Hay on upland is 96 per cent. of a full average crop, on improved dykeland is 97 per cent. and on intervale 100 per cent. Potatoes are 94 per cent., oats 102, buck-wheat 97, and so on, of the apple and plum crop the report is satisfactory, the yield is likely to be above the average.

John Mitchell, a Springhill boy, was killed at Parrsboro, N. S., Tuesday. He was struck on the head by a prop which was knocked down in an unsuccessful attempt to launch the bark Colcium.

Frank Holden, aged 8 years, while playing on the turn-table in the D. A. R. round house at Windsor, N. S., was caught between the revolving and stationary tracks and killed. His neck was pinned between the rails.

A double drowning accident occurred in Halifax harbor, Thursday. Robert Drake and James McLeod went out in a punt to moor a boat. When about 50 yards from shore the punt upset, and both sank before assistance could reach them.

The Carribean House, Granville Ferry, owned by Capt. Hall and occupied by Mr. Fred Hatheway, who carried on a general store, was totally destroyed by fire Friday morning, together with the immense stock it contained. There was no insurance on the building and but \$1,200 on the stock. Mr. Hatheway carried on a large and profitable business. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Other Provinces.

One night last week six thousand dollars were taken from the C. P. R. station at Joliette, Quebec, by burglars. The money was the property of the Canadian Express Co. The burglar knew the combination and was able to open the safe.

Benjamin Atkins, aged 17, son of Howard Atkins, of Montague, P. E. I., was drowned Tuesday while trying to rescue his brother, who had fallen overboard.

At Morrisburg, Ont., eight boats and twelve boat-houses on the beach were destroyed by fire Thursday. Due to lightning striking one of the sheds.

The shipment of apples in Montreal has begun. About five thousand barrels have so far gone out. Shippers expect to send out a good many thousand barrels every week from now until the close of the season.

United States.

The powder mills at Goes, Ohio, blew up with a terrific shock Wednesday morning. Several men were killed.

At Bar Harbour, Me., the house of Wm. Dodge was burned, the family escaping with difficulty.

All departments of the Spang Steel and Iron Company's work at Sharpsburg have been shut down indefinitely, throwing idle about 700 men.

Baring, a village on the Maine side of the river four miles above St. Stephen, had a bad fire Wednesday night. It consumed Belyea's shingle mill and the box shuck mill of Granville Chase.

Ontonagon, Mich., was wiped out by fire Tuesday. The fire has left absolutely nothing of the town. Two thousand people who were made homeless and without shelter or food. The ruin involves an extensive lumber and box manufacturing plant, an establishment worth upwards of \$100,000. Ontonagon has a population of about 2,000.

A wreck on the Pittsburgh & Western railroad at Valencia, 22 miles west of here Monday, resulted in the destruction of three passenger coaches, 15 freight cars, and the injury of 25 passengers—five of whom will probably die.

Four of the largest manufacturing establishments in Buffalo, employing nearly 2,000 men, have shut down owing to lack of orders.

British and Foreign.

The London Daily News, says that Dr. Nicolalde, the official representative of the Cretan reform committee, now in Berlin, asserts that the diplomatic representatives there will verify the assertion that 6,000 Christians have been murdered in Crete with revolting barbarity.

Consul O'Hara reports the details of serious floods along the Mosquito coast in the neighborhood of Bluefields, Nicaragua. The town of Rama was completely submerged, the water rising to the roofs and sweeping away many houses. The British steamer Hawk, which went to the rescue was carried out to sea by the force of the flood waters, and was with difficulty rescued. The dock at Rama was carried away entirely.

ROYAL TEMPLAR RESOLUTIONS.—The Grand Council of Royal Templars, at the Annual Session, in St. John, a few days ago, adopted the following as to the proposed plebiscite: We are opposed to a plebiscite on the ground that the liquor traffic can only be abolished effectually by a prohibition law enacted by a party in sympathy with such law, and whose tenure of office depends upon the success of enforcement, yet as the plebiscite evidently stands between us and any advanced legislation from the federal parliament, pressure should be brought to bear to have the popular vote taken as soon as possible, and then get it out of the way. When such a vote is taken all Royal Templars should make it as large as possible for prohibition.

Its view of the new features of the New Brunswick license Law are expressed thus:

The New Brunswick legislature has taken a backward step in assuming the control of the license machinery, and we urge all delegates for some more advanced legislation at the earliest opportunity to aid in this direction. We recommend that the executive appoint a delegation from their number to wait upon the leader of the government at the coming session of the legislature at Fredericton, and the other temperance bodies be memorialized to also appoint delegations to act in conjunction with our own.

POLITICAL NEWS.—It is stated that all the P. E. Island election petitions have been withdrawn; three of them were against Conservatives, and one against a Liberal.

E. Thibideau, merchant of Montreal, has been appointed to the senate.

The liberal conservatives have made Sir Mackenzie Bowell their leader in the senate.

Dalton Mc Carthy has resigned his seat for Brandon.

On Tuesday of last week—Mr Blair was elected in Sunbury Queens by 600 majority, Mr Patterson in North Grey, Ont., by 400 majority.

Mr L. P. Ferris M. P. for Queens has been made a member of the N. B. government without office.

It is reported that Mr. Sifton will run for Brandon, Manitoba, and will enter the government.

It is rumored that Sheriff Perry will be the government candidate in Queens to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Blair's resignation.

At the Conservative caucus Thursday, Sir Charles Tupper was chosen leader.

A SERMON FACTORY.—There is a syndicate in Ohio which has conducted a large traffic in sermons and orations of all kinds for many years. The traffic is carried on in an obscure way. Sermons sell from ten to twenty-five dollars each, according to the oratorical style and the vigour of rhetoric.

The syndicate is conducted by two college graduates, who describe themselves as "journalists, essayists, and authors." They employ several accomplished hack writers besides. They are prepared to undertake anything from a funeral oration to a few choice remarks at a wedding. In their circular they request a trial of their merchandise. Ministers may send their own texts or indicate the general tone of the sermon which is desired. For example, if the preacher sends, in an order for a brief, curt, and epigrammatic exhortation to his congregation requesting them to contribute more liberally, one of the staff sermonizers will select some suitable text as "And the copper-smith did us much injury," and rear a light and airy structure thereon. Sermons containing philippics and invectives are the highest priced.—Can. Presbyterian.
