The building was begun during the pastorate of the late Rev. Wm. Downey. He was very anxious to have a church there, and to his earnest efforts the undertaking was due. He lived to see the work well begun. At the services on Sunday, Mrs. Downey was present, interested in the completion and dedication of the church which her late husband was instrumental in beginning.

The offerings on Sunday amounted to about \$60.00, which will go towards removing the small debt against the church. It is to be hoped the brethren will speedily have it entirely free from debt. We trust the occupancy of the new church may be the beginning of increased christian activities in the community, and that much blessing may come to all.
