New Brunswick.

Mr. John Wisely, died at Lincoln Thursday aged 93.

Rudyard Kipling is at the North Shore on a fishing trip.

Thomas Casey, of Port Elgin, was upset from his boat a few days ago and was drowned.

It is proposed to build a new bridge at St. Joseph W. Co., at a cost of \$20,000.

A row took place at Doherty's mill at Campbellton Wednesday resulted in the death of James Ritchie.

A very sad drowning accident occurred at Lincoln Thursday. The victim was Fred B. Smith of that place.

Richard Allen, son of Ezra Allen, Port Elgin, eighteen years of age, was drowned at the North Shore a few days ago.

Arthur Butt, of St. John, has been sued for breach of promise. Miss Ferris, of Chamcook, is the plaintiff. She claims \$1,000 damages.

Two barns belonging to Mr. Calvin Boice at the Keswick were totally destroyed by fire Friday. It is supposed the flames originated from a spark from the flue of the house. The loss is quite a severe one.

A number of Prince Edward Island \$5 bills are now being put in circulation around St. John. There is as yet no clue as to who is circulating this worthless money.

At an adjourned sitting of the Sunbury circuit court held Thursday the judge made an order rescinding the respite of sentence of Grass and ordered the prisoner removed to the penitentiary to serve out his sentence of three years for abducting Hattie Higgs.

Nova Scotia.

The ratepayers of Parraboro, last week, decided to authorize the Town Council to borrow \$40,000 for the purpose of putting in water supply.

The new dwelling of Frank Goodick at Sand Point was destroyed by fire at an early hour Sunday morning. The building was insured.

The mill of James T. Strang at Port Clyde was burned to the ground several days ago. No insurance, and the loss is heavy.

Lieut. Peary has chartered the whaler Hope at St. John's for his next Greenland Expedition. Sydney C. B. will be his port of departure. He starts about the middle of July, and expects to be absent two years.

The estimated cost of the new building and equipment, for the Halifax School for the Blind, is \$22,500.

Pro. Faville, of the Nova Scotia School of Horticulture, Wolfville states that he has just received word from England that owing to droughts and late frosts the apple crop there will probably be very light. The indications for a fine crop in the Annapolis valley were never better.

Drs. Angwin and Hamilton of Halifax intend opening a children's hospital for those whose parents are unable to pay a physician. Children too ill to be brought, will be called upon at their homes.

J. M. Corrie's furniture store and A. D. Taylor's dry good store, at Amherst, were badly damaged by fire early Wednesday morning.

The death occurred on Saturday of Father Carmody, vicar general of the diocese, and one of the best known priests of Halifax. He was chaplain to her majesty's forces on that station.

King's College Windsor was closed Tuesday.

The regular millinery department is enlarged. The magazine has been given a new cover; its make-up is changed and it is printed on finer paper. Woman's Opportunities are considered; and the pursuit of literature as a profession is given exposition. There is a paper on the furnishing and decoration of dining rooms, and the usual departments devoted to tea-table chat, seasonable cookery, household sanitation, fancy stitches and embroideries, lace-making, knitting, tatting, etc. The subscription is one dollar a year. Other Provinces.

Hon. John Beverley Robinson, ex-Lieut. Governor of Ontario, died as he was stopping on the platform of a political meeting in Toronto, at which he was to speak in the interests of Sir Charles Tupper. He was born in 1820, and was a son of a former Chief Justice of Canada. Mr. Robinson was one of the most widely known of Canada's public men.

After careful investigation into the Queen's Birthday accident at Point Ellice bridge, Victoria, B. C., the coroner's jury returned a verdict holding the Consolidated Railway Company directly responsible for the disaster by which fifty-five lives were lost, the City Council being arraigned as guilty of contributory negligence. It was found that the bridge was safe for ordinary traffic and the accident would not have occurred but for improper over-crowding of the fatal car, although the bridge was found not to have been constructed according to original specifications.

British and Foreign.

Bernard's brewery at Edinburgh was burned Saturday night. Loss \$400,000.

At Bow street police court London, Dr. J. S. Jameson, Major Sir. John Willoughby, Col. R. Grey, Major S. White, Col. H. F. White, and the Hon. Henry F. Coventry, the prime movers of the Transvaal raid, were committed for trial. The other accused persons were discharged.

Reports of the loss of life by the recent earthquakes and tidal wave in the northern provinces of Japan show that 10,000 persons were drowned by the tidal wave which accompanied the shocks.

The Venezuelan government has received reports of an encounter between the Venezuelans and British settlers at Barana, a frontier station in the disputed territory in Guiana.

The British steamer Drummond Castle, with 350 persons on board, was sunk near Ushant, the most western of the islands of the coast of Brittany, France. Two of the ship's company were picked up by a fishing vessel.

Shocks of earthquake accompanied by a tidal wave have ravaged the northern port of Japan. The entire town of Kamaishi has been destroyed and 1,000 persons killed. During twenty-four hours there were 150 distinct shocks of earthquake.

The territory in dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela has been entered by a force of troops of the latter country. The Venezuelan soldiers compelled a party of British surveyors, who were at work in the district, to suspend operations. The surveying party retreated and appealed to the authorities for support.
