News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Rumors are current to the effect that a large sum of money will be expended on the Shore Line railroad and its equipment this summer.

The value of goods exported from Fredericton for March was \$10,061, for the corresponding month last year, \$10,890.

Police clerk McDougall, of Moncton, says there has been a great falling off in crime in that city during the past year.

Overseer J. S. Williston reports that 400 tons of smelts were taken in his district during the past season. The aggregate value of these fish on the ice amounted to \$20,000.

Daniel Harrigan, of Indian town, had his left leg broken and crushed above the knee by a log falling on it while working in the woods.

At Waweg, Charlotte county, last week a four-year-old son of Mr. Augustus Trundle was strangled while playing with a young calf. A six-year-old brother had fastened him to the animal.

W. H. Murray, the lumberman, estimates the lumber cut of the past winter on the St. John river and its tributaries from the Nashwaak up to 130,000,000 feet. There are in the Douglas booms at present 20,000,000 feet of logs and there are 50,000,000 feet at St. John, making in all 200,000,000 feet.

The number of patients in the Provincial Lunatic Asylum increases. The total on the 1st November, 1895, when the year closed was 606, 24 more than at the same period of the previous year. Of these it was estimated that 481 were incurable. During the year 152 were admitted, 47 were discharged as recovered, and 27 as improved. There were 45 deaths during the year.

Friday, Michael Harrington, employed in loading birch timber on board the Furness line steamer St. John City, was at work on a raft of timber, which was being hoisted into the steamer, and while a heavy stick was being hoisted up the side of the steamer some of the gearing attached to the derrick broke, and the large piece of timber swinging struck Harrington on the head, knocking him unconscious, off the raft into the water. James Murray, a fellow workman, jumped in after his companion, and rescued him. Harrington was sent to the Hospital. He remained unconscious until death a few hours later.

Michael Windell, was seriously injured Thursday by falling in the hold of the St. John City, loading at St. John. Three ribs were broken, and his back badly hurt.

Fire sometime occurred Sunday morning in the house on Waterloo row this city belonging to David Barker, the lower flat of which was occupied by the owner and the upper part by Mrs. Henry Bridges, mother of Prof. Bridges, and a small house adjoining belonging to Mrs. John Hand, were very badly gutted by flames. Mrs. Bridges and her daughters lost a portion of their clothing; and a piano was injured. The loss is estimated at \$2,500. Mr. Barker has \$800 insurance on his house, and Mrs. Hand \$200. Mrs. Bridges' furniture was insured for \$800.

Geo. Bishop sustained serious internal injuries at his home in Irish town Moncton, Friday, by falling from a staging. It is feared he will not recover.

The wife of Maxime Cormier died at Buctouche on Wednesday as the result of injuries sustained by falling down stairs a few days ago. The woman and her husband had been on a spree.

The Gleaner is authority for the statement that Margaret Boone, aged 65 years, who has lived since childhood at St. Mary's Ferry, a few rods from the St. Mary's end of the highway bridge, has not been in Fredericton for 22 years, although she has all the time enjoyed good health, and been able to move about as readily as any of her neighbors.

Sperry L. Shea, traveller for the Baird Co., of Woodstock, was drowned in the St. John River, in Madawaska, on Tuesday of last week. He was driving on the river when the ice gave way and he and his companion, a little girl went under. The catastrophe was about two miles below Clair at Fish River rapids. As the team went in Shea jumped out on the ice but immediately sank. The little girl who was with him was 12 years old. There seems no possibility of recovering the bodies.

Nova Scotia.

A Board of Trade has been formed at Parrsboro, N. S.

A large four story building is to be erected on Barrington street, Halifax. The front will be of Nova Scotia marble and ornamental terra cotta.

The contract has been awarded for a large addition to the building of the school for the blind, in Halifax, to be completed at the end of the coming summer.

The N. S. provincial exhibition commission is finding a difficulty in finding a site for buildings. The property owners ask fancy prices and the commission threaten to use the old building.

The I. C. R. train ran over a man named Graham Logan, at Truro, Saturday, instantly killing him. The unfortunate was a deaf mute, and was walking on the track to church.

A man named Delahunt met with a terrible death Wednesday in the Taylor rotary saw mill at Canaan, near Parrsboro. His coat caught in the machinery and he was carried round the shaft three times. He leaves a wife and several small children.

The workshop of Simon Sinclair, carriage maker, Goshen, Guysbro Co., was destroyed by fire a few days ago, together with all its contents, wagons, lumber, sleigh, paints and tools. Origin of fire unknown.

Reports from Acadia Mines say that the iron works are operating throughout the entire system and that the condition of business at the works never was better.

John Stapleton working on the roof of a house in Halifax a week ago, when a gust of wind blew off his cap. In reaching to catch it he lost his balance and fell to the ground. He died Friday from the injuries received.

Saturday evening a fire in the big dry goods store of Barnstead & Sutherland, on Barrington street, Halifax gutted the establishment. The stock, valued at \$40,000, was destroyed. It was insured for \$8,000. A damage of \$10,000 on the building is covered by insurance. Shaefer's jewelry store was also practically destroyed. Loss, \$10,000; small insurance.

United States.

A cloud-burst in Kentucky a few days ago did much damage, and sixteen persons were drowned.

Fire at Brunswick, Ga., Thursday night destroyed half a million dollars worth of property and one human life.

Mrs. Olga Deuss, of San Francisco, killed herself and three children, the eldest eight years, Monday night, by gas asphyxiation. She was jealous of her husband, who went out early in the evening and did not return until three o'clock in the morning, when he found his family dead.

W. J. Wood, formerly of St. John, N. B., a farm hand, employed by C. A. Thompson, of Dedham Me., committed suicide Wednesday by shooting himself through the heart.

Fire destroyed a Brooklyn, N. Y., tenement house early Wednesday morning and ten of its occupants were smothered in their beds. There bodies were burned. They were Italians.

British and Foreign.

A black plague has broken out in Yokohama, Japan, thousands are dying many are leaving the city. All the foreigners will flee.

The filibustering steamer Bermuda has been seized at Puerto Cortez by the Honduras government with all the munitions of war aboard with which she sailed from New York for Cuba.

The French Senate on Friday, by a vote of 157 to 77, expressed want of confidence in the government and adjourned until April 22. The Chamber of Deputies passed a vote of confidence the government will not resign, and have informed the President accordingly.

A terrible fire has occurred at Manila, in the Philippine Islands, by which 4,000 houses were destroyed and 3,000 people left homeless. Manila, is the capital of the Philippine Islands and has a population of 100,000, or, with the suburbs, 160,000. It is one of the great emporiums of the east.

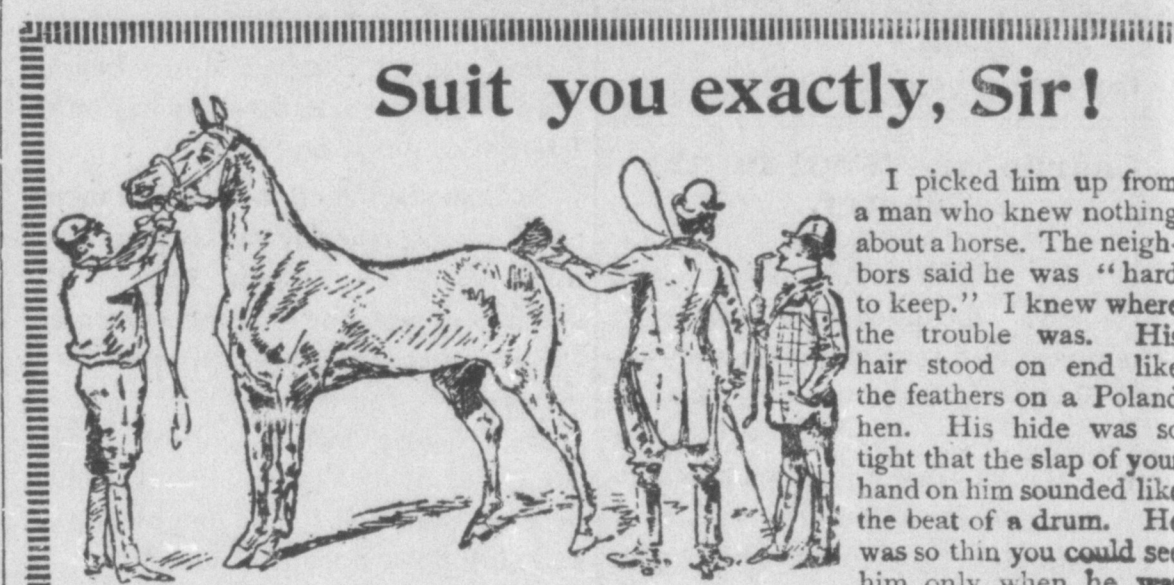
