PROHIBITION CONVENTION.—There are indications that the Prohibition Convention to be held in this city on Wednesday and Thursday of next week will be well attended, and that all sections of the Province will be represented. Already a good number have sent word that they will be present.

For a short time payment of arrears will be taken at the rate of \$1.50. But after a reasonable time has been given to square up the accounts, all who remain in arrears will have to be charged at the rate of \$2.00 a year, which is the announced price for those not paying in advance."

DIED IN THE PULPIT.—The Rev. T. B. Hargrove, pastor of the Methodist church at Coldwater, Miss., dropped dead in the pulpit, while exhorting his congregation to "believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and be saved." These were his last words.

AN OLD RESIDENT.—Mr. Calvin L. Goodspeed, an old and much respected resident of Nashua, died at the home of his son, Luther Goodspeed Esq., on Wednesday. Rev. Dr. Goodspeed, of McMaster University, Toronto, is his younger son.

FARMERS' ASSOCIATION.—The Provincial Farmers' Association was held in this city last week—Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Fisher.

CANADA'S RAILWAYS.—The report of the department of Railways, presented to Parliament a few days ago, shows that the number of railways in actual operation last year, including the two governments roads, the Intercolonial and the Prince Edward Island railways was 138. Some of these, however, are amalgamated or leased, making the total number of controlling companies 74, not including the government railways.

The number of miles of completed railways was 16,091, an increase of 323 miles, besides 2,054 miles of sidings. The number of miles laid with steel rails is 15,745. The gross earnings amounted to \$46,785,487, a decrease of \$2,777,041, and the working expenses aggregated \$32,949,669, a reduction of \$2,468,764, compared with the previous year. The number of passengers carried was 13,987,580, a reduction of 474,918, and the freight traffic amounted to 21,524,421 tons, an increase of 803,305 tons. The total number of miles run by trains was 40,661,890. The accident returns show that nine passengers were killed.

The Intercolonial railway system, 1,142 miles in operation, earned \$2,940,717, and the working expenses aggregated \$2,936,902, leaving a profit of \$3,815. The Windsor branch shows a profit of \$24,437.

The Prince Edward Island railway, 211 miles long shows a loss of \$83,250. Deducting from the profit made on the Intercolonial and the Windsor branch the loss on the Prince Edward Island railway, the net loss was \$64,997.

A GREAT RIVER.—The Mackenzie, the principal river of the Dominion, is 2,500 miles in length and drains an area equal to one-half of the United States.

Some Dont's For Correspondents.

The editor of *The Wesleyan* has been giving his correspondents the following hints, which, with slight changes, we pass along for the information and help of INTELLIGENCER correspondents.

DON'T stick cuttings from newspapers on post cards. We are charged four cents postage on such cards. Put your clipping in an unsealed envelope, mark it "printed matter" and you can send it for a cent.

DON'T put private notes with matter intended for the press and send at press manuscript rate. It is not honest. There should be nothing sent with press matter unless the envelope is sealed and letter rate fully prepaid. If you have a private message to send with your manuscript, write it on a post card.

DON'T send communications or obituaries at the last moment and expect them to be inserted "in next

issue." They will not be. The paper is not elastic. They will be inserted in due course. Don't write on a wretched paper, in a wretched scrawl, with a wretched pen and wretched ink, and then blame the editor if he fails to make out what you have written. Write plainly, and compositor and editor will have far less labor.

DON'T expect the editor to see every little item about you or your church that appears in your local paper, and reprint it. Among the editor's many excellencies, omniscience is not included. If anything is desired to be reprinted in the church paper, clip it out and send it yourself to the office.

DON'T mix up the matter you send for publication with other matter. Write business and matter for publication on separate sheets.

DON'T forget about simple suggestions or find fault with the editor for making them. If carried out, things will go more smoothly and comfortably all around.

The February number of *The Homiletic Review* surpasses itself in fulfilling the promises made with the opening of the year.

There is the first of several papers on Nelson's naval victories, dealing with "Nelson at Cape St. Vincent," which is illustrated. The month's instalment of Prof. Sloane's "Life of Napoleon" treats of the meeting of Napoleon, Alexander I. of Russia, Frederick William III., and Queen Louisa of Prussia, at Tilsit. For range and readability the number challenges attention.

In a dainty cover, typifying midwinter, the February *Ladies' Home Journal*, resplendent with illustrations, and varied in its literary features, is unique. Just a faint suggestion of approaching spring is given in an article, descriptive of a blooming garden. James Whitcomb Riley sings of "Little Maid-O'-Dreams," a fanciful little poem. Ex-President Harrison's paper discusses the "Presidential Office." An article upon "The Little Queen of Holland" tells of the young sovereign's daily life, her pastimes, toys, pets and studies. Edward W. Bok discusses women and their work, and expresses satisfaction at the changes in "The Mourning Customs." Rev. Charles H. Parkhurst, D. D., addresses himself forcefully to young men, in "The Stuff that Makes Young Manhood" and emphasizes the supreme necessity of "beginning right" in life. The discussion of household and culinary matters, entertainments, dress, woman as hostess, etc., unite in making the February *Ladies' Home Journal* attractive, entertaining, instructive.
