Parliament.

Monday.—The first half of the sitting was devoted to public and private bills. Mr. Laurier asked if it was the intention of the government to have the report of the commissioners laid upon the table of the house at once. He was informed that it would be.

The house went into committee on the Remedial bill, and discussion was resumed on Mr. McCarthy's amendment to the fourth clause.

Mr. Dickey said the wording of the clause was exactly the same as in the old act.

Mr. McCarthy at great length replied, giving his views on the unconstitutionality to legislate.

The discussion was continued by Messrs. Martin, O'Brien, Wallace, and others for several hours, when the first subsection of clause 4 was declared carried. Mr. McCarthy's amendment having been voted down.

On sub-section "B" the objections were renewed.

Mr. McCarthy moved to strike out the provision regarding the examination on religious topics. At two o'clock in the morning Mr. McCarthy's amendment was lost, and then sub-section "B" was declared carried.

At 2.30 about forty members were in the house, an all night session evidently being in store.

Tuesday.—There was an air of weariness over the house this morning at the hour at which members general-

ly put in their appearance for a day's work. Members were reclining listlessly in their chairs listening in a half sleepy manner. Thirty-two members represented the commons of the dominion in attendance on parliament. About 9 o'clock W. F. MacLean protested against the prolonged sitting, urging that the house should adjourn till the report of the Winnipeg conference was presented to parliament. It would not be possible for the bill to be passed this session, and passed or not passed, the question would be an issue at the coming election.

Sir Richard Cartwright entered and got the floor. He said he had been looking after his own constitution and was now prepared to look after the constitution of the country. He proceeded to denounce the disgraceful orgies of the last all night sitting, when he remarked, "I verily believe led to the death of one member of this house within a few days." He warned parliament that if these orgies were repeated every member taking part in them would be exposed, and the question might arise as to whether or not the bar in the restaurant should be abolished. He thought that a fair time should be taken every day for discussion of this question, but physical force should be met by like force. Dr. Weldon addressed the house for about an hour. He believed that all the troubles of the present position were due in a large measure to Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper. He was impulsive, impetuous and excitable, and a young man with such a disposition was not fitted to take charge of a department requiring coolness, learning, judgment and openness of mind.

Shortly after three o'clock in the afternoon Mr. Laurier rose. He said reluctance on the part of the members to sit after 2 o'clock in the morning was a reasonable one. He suggested that an agreement should be reached to sit ten or twelve hours a day, that time being as much as the country could expect any men to remain in the chamber.

Sir Charles Tupper said Mr. Laurier's proposal was a reasonable one, and personally he was prepared to concur in it. He would point out, however, that parliament stood in a peculiar position. Mr. Laurier knew the danger of the house getting out of a committee. The open and constant obstruction which had taken place was calculated to convert the proceedings of parliament into a farce. If the bill was worthless and would accomplish nothing, why not let it go through? The government would be prepared to take all responsibility and risks. He urged that the measure should be passed, the estimates voted, half a million of public money saved to the people and then an opportunity at an early date to take the verdict of the country. It seemed, however, to be the intention to obstruct this measure. Under the circumstances the house could not go out of committee. Mr. Powell suggested that the clause be altered to read that the Catholic board of education be empowered to select all books, maps and globes to be used in the schools under its control, provided, however, that no book, map or globe other than the books on history, morals and religion shall be selected unless such book, map or globe has been authorized for use in the higher public schools of the province. The amendment carried. It was decided to leave over for further consideration this sub-section upon which the committee had been engaged for over twenty hours.

Wednesday.—The night and day were spent in talk, more or less irrelevant. Whistling, song-singing, trumpet blowing, story-telling, joking, snoring, reading from all kinds of books etc., filled up the time. No progress was made with the remedial bill.

Thursday.—Up to six o'clock tonight the house had been in session for seventy-seven hours. Since three o'clock on Wednesday morning Mr. McNeill's motion that the committee rise and report progress has not been disposed of. A motion of this character permits members to talk on any subject under the sun, and they did it. At 8.30 after forty-eight hours talk, the motion for the committee to rise was negatived and the committee settled down to the consideration of the bill.

Clause seven was passed. Clause eight caused a lengthy discussion.

The whole of clause eight having been disposed of, the committee diverted to clause 4, sub-section C of which had previously been allowed to stand.

Mr. Dickey submitted an amendment providing that any school books used in any province in Canada might be used in Manitoba.

This amendment was adopted. Then the committee took up clause 9.

Mr. McCarthy urged that the house should adjourn.

Sir Charles Tupper said in view of the state of public business it was impossible to accede to the request.

Friday.—A motion that the committee should rise was made by Mr. Fraser shortly after two o'clock this morning. Sir Richard Cartwright took the floor. The discussion on it continued all day, and till 10 o'clock at night, when the motion was negatived, and consideration of Sec. 10 of the Remedial Bill was begun.

Saturday.—The talk went on till within a few minutes of midnight when Sir Chas. Tupper laid the report of the Winnipeg school conference and the supplementary estimates on the table. He then moved the adjournment of the house. In doing so he said that when the house meets again on Monday the government will ask it to again take up the remedial bill.

The house adjourned at five minutes to midnight and the longest continuous parliament sitting in this or any other country came to a close. The house had been steadily in session since last Monday.

POLITICAL NEWS.—Col. Tucker has been nominated as the liberal candidate in St. John, in place of the late Mr. C. W. Weldon. Mr. Ellis is the other liberal candidate.

Mr. Keefe who, at first, declined the nomination of the Halifax liberal party has since accepted it. The ticket is Keefe and Russell.

Sir Charles Tupper is to be in Winnipeg on a political mission immediately after the close of Parliament. It is hinted that he may be a candidate in Winnipeg. If he is, the liberals talk of running Mr. Laurier against him.

It is reported from Ottawa that opinion is divided among the members of the cabinet as to the date of holding the general elections. Some are in favor of selecting a day about the 26th or 28th of May, others about the middle of June. Under any circumstances it is thought polling will not be later than June 11th.

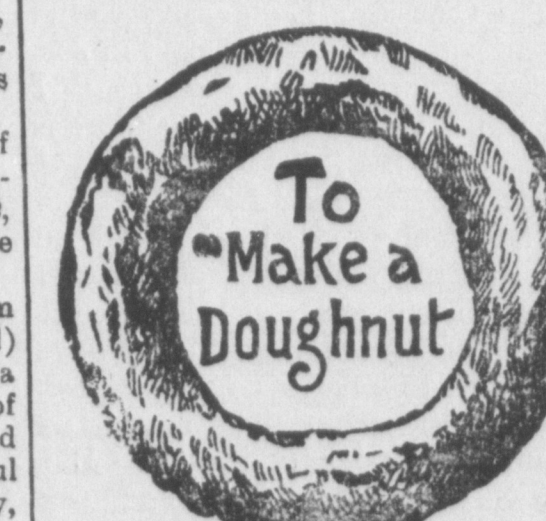
