News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Mayor Robertson of St. John is a Candidate for re-election. Messrs. McLaughlin, Hall and Baskin are also mentioned as probable candidates.

A few days ago, a small child of Alexander Linton, of Castalia, Grand Manan, while trying to kindle a fire, was so badly burned that it died in a few hours.

Elisha Brownell, merchant of McAdam Junction, dropped dead while in the act of boarding a car at Amherst one day last week. He had been on a visit to friends in Cumberland County.

The six-year-old son of John Hall, of St. Mary's, while playing about a C. P. R. box car which some section men were moving, got one of his legs caught under one of the wheels and badly cut.

The remains of an infant were found on the ice out on the river at Woodstock Thursday afternoon. The body was in a small box and wrapped up in a copy of a newspaper of the 6th instant. It had evidently been thrown off the bridge.

A milk wagon was struck by an I. C. R. express Saturday about two miles out of St. John. John Stephenson aged 36, and Robert Carson aged 12, were killed, and Allen Carson had his leg broken.

In Moncton, Saturday a runaway, E. W. Givran's team, collided with William Wortman, aged 70, breaking his left thigh and probably fatally injuring him.

Upper Woodstock was visited by a disastrous fire Tuesday afternoon, in which Chestnut & Hipwell's carriage and furniture factory, Rev. Geo. Hartley's store and house, and a house owned by J. Crawford and occupied by John Chestnut were burned to the ground with most of their contents. The fire originated in the engine room of the factory. Chestnut & Hipwell estimate their loss at between \$6,000 and \$7,000. They have \$2,000 on the buildings. Mr. Hartley had \$1,000 insurance.

Nova Scotia.

D. J. Kirk's residence at Antigonish was destroyed by fire Sunday.

Nellie Thomas, aged 72, widow of Peter Thomas, the Indian Half-breed so well known in Halifax succumbed by cutting her throat with a razor Wednesday. She complained of pain in the head the previous day.

John Mailman, who resides at Gloucester, Mass., but who has been on a visit to his sisters at Liverpool, N. S., for the benefit of his health, committed suicide Tuesday by shooting himself through the heart.

A peculiar form of eye disease is prevalent in Halifax. It will go through whole families. It is not serious, but painful, and lasts for eight or ten days.

Dennis Sullivan, Thursday, was found dying in a barn in Halifax. He has been sleeping in the barn for years. He was 55 years old.

There was a sixty thousand dollar fire at John Davidson & Sons' warehouse, stables, etc., were destroyed with several other buildings.

There is trouble in the Victoria Hospital, Halifax. The house staff, including Drs. Holmes and Shaw and Messrs. Ross and McEwen, have resigned, and fourteen nurses have drawn up their resignations. Their objection is to Dr. Reid Superintendent.

Steamer Alpha, which brought forty five Italian paupers from Jamaica, to Halifax, is liable to a penalty of \$100 for each of them. One of them who fell on the street in a starving condition is at the poor house, where his clothing was found to be so filthy that it had to be destroyed.

John Wilson, of prissonette, was found dead in the Halifax dock. He was 55 years of age, was idle for some time, and is supposed to have committed suicide.

Other Provinces.

The Salvation Army barracks at Cornwall, Ont., and contents were destroyed by fire Friday. It is believed the fire was incendiary. The building was a valuable one.

Three hundred settlers for the North West arrived at Halifax on the *Parisian* last week.

There is trouble in the parish of St. Constant, La. Prairie county, Quebec where 108 heads of families refuse to pay the parish priest the new tax of ten cents per ton on hay, which the archbishop levied.

Holmes, the condemned murderer, now awaiting execution in Philadelphia has, it is said, confessed that he has committed twenty-seven murders, and that he had six others under consideration when arrested.

British and Foreign.

Europe's population has increased by 29,923,000 in the last ten years, nearly half of the increase, 12,510,000 being in Russia, while France has remained stationary, her total increase being only 67,000.

The reports from Turkey continue to be extremely distressing and heart-rending. Sometimes we hear of peace and order, mercy and relief. Then suddenly come reports of assassinations, burnings, robberies, massacres, the most hideous and horrible crimes. Forced conversions are numerous. The Sultan has ceased to protest against the Sudan expedition.

Advices from Corea state twenty-four Japanese fishermen who landed at Phong Hai were attacked by Corean rebels in overwhelming numbers and fifteen fishermen killed. The assassinations of Japanese are taking place throughout the Korean provinces. Rumors circulated that parties of Russians are travelling throughout the peninsula in fanning the anti-Japanese feeling.

The *Paris Journal* says the English are erecting barracks at Malta capable of accommodating 30,000 men. This increase of capacity, the paper says, is being made in anticipation of events in the Mediterranean affecting British interests.
