

General Religious News.

—Rev. D. L. Moody continues his work of putting literature into the hands of prisoners throughout the country. Thus far 130,000 volumes have been placed.

—Rev. Alberto J. Diaz, M. D., has entered the service of the Publication Society, and is just starting on a tour in the chapel car "Good Tidings" through Texas and Mexico. His labours will be chiefly among Spanish-speaking people.

—Jerusalem has to-day seventy synagogues. Of the twenty-four religious sects represented in the city, twelve are Christian. Among the inhabitants the Mohammedans are already in a minority, which is constantly growing smaller.

—A Japanese mission is to be established in Los Angeles by the M. E. church. There are between four and five hundred Japanese in the city. A native Japanese is looking after the work. He intends opening a home in connection with the mission.

—A poor congregation was endeavoring to build a small chapel. One workman brought all his three months' earnings. "Can you spare so much?" he was asked. Tears of gratitude and love fell from his cheeks as he replied, "My Saviour spared not himself, but freely gave his life for me; surely I can spare one quarter of a year's earnings to extend his kingdom on the earth."

—The Bible Society Reporter says: "From the British Bible Society warehouse between 6,000 and 7,000 volumes go out daily. This, however, represents only part of the output, as a great many volumes are printed in China, India and elsewhere. The daily circulation is about 13,000. Of the annual output of about 4,000,000 volumes, it is estimated that from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 are in English."

—Returns at the last General Conference (1894) of the Methodist Church of Canada, showed a ministerial roll of 1196, a membership of 260,953, with seating capacity in our churches for nearly 800,000 adherents. We had at that date 252,546 scholars in our Sunday Schools. The missionary income was \$249,000. Book and publishing houses property was valued at \$342,196, and college property was estimated to be worth \$13,194,973.

—Here is a striking contrast, showing the superiority of Christianity over all other religions: "Mohammedanism has a history of thirty centuries. It has won 200,000,000 followers, and its degraded and wretched myriads are confined to Southern Asia and no other Africa. Christianity, after nineteen centuries of life, has won 400,000,000 followers, and with the exception of China and Turkey, its happy and enlightened people rule the world."

Rev. A. J. Diaz, speaking on his work in Cuba at the Baptist Conference, said that fourteen years ago there was no Bible and no Protestant organization. Now 2,700 have been baptized, not one of whom has been excluded. Great care is exercised in admitting converts. The church members observe Sunday, and do not attend the theater. Two of the generals in the insurgent army and a thousand of the rank and file are members of Mr. Diaz's churches.

Home Religious News.

—The new Main St. Free Baptist church, St. John, is to be dedicated this month, probably, on the 20th inst.

—Mr. Asa Dow, Canterbury, recently gave \$100 to the building fund of a new Episcopal church at Andover, V. Co.

—The Baptist Young People's Union of St. John was organized on Thursday. The societies represented in it have 650 members.

—Rev. P. C. L. Harris, Congregational, of Halifax, has accepted a call to Vancouver, B. C.

—The Christian church, Main St. St. John, has a new pastor, Rev. C. Appell. This new church is arranging to build a house of worship on Douglas Avenue.

—Rev. W. B. Ward, an evangelist connected with Tremont Temple, Boston, is in St. John this week, and is giving daily Bible readings in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, in the afternoon. Each evening he addresses a meeting in one of the churches.

FROM REV. JOHN PERRY.—When I left the pastorate at Wickham, Q. Co., a number of the friends requested me to write them when I got home, and now I comply by writing in the INTELLIGENCER. After preaching two years and a half for the church at Lower Wickham, and two years for the other churches of the pastorate, I resigned my labours with them. We got along very harmoniously, and I left them with the best of union in the churches and outside. They found no fault with me, as far as I know, and I am sure I found no fault with them. We did not see all done which we desired and hoped for, but we know the word preached shall not return void etc. I went to the Narrows, stopped two weeks, and had a cancer drawn out of my nose by Dr. Malcolm McDonald, who is a gentleman of the right stamp. He has a large practice, and is highly esteemed as a Christian, a gentleman and a physician. I have been acquainted with him and his good wife from their childhood; he is a brother of Rev. A. B. McDonald, who is one of the ablest Baptist ministers I am acquainted with. I wish to say to any one who is afflicted with cancer that Dr. M. McDonald can take it out and cause very little pain, and will cause it to heal in a few days, leaving no scar. I left the Narrows Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 3rd, drove to deacon Thomas Bridges; stopped all night, drove next day to brother Slipp's eighteen miles above Fredericton. I stopped at Fredericton for dinner; took dinner with my old friends, brother and sister Ludlow Yerxa, where I always find a good home; and called a few minutes on Dr. McLeod. I left brother Slipp's early Thursday morning. I met with an accident, not a very great one, but quite painful. The spring under the front of my cart broke, I got off to tie it up, the horse stepped, I spoke sharply to him, he backed and my finger got caught between the wiffletree and cross-bar and was mashed so that the nail was loose. I wrapped it up the best I could and drove to my old friend's, John Anderson ex-M. P. P. He and his family were very glad to see me, but no gladder than I was to meet them. I got my finger dressed. It looked very much like rain; I did not want to get wet, but I thought if it didn't begin at twelve o'clock it would not that day; so after twelve, I started; but when I had gone about two miles the rain began. It was twenty-five miles to brother Leonard Slipp's and by the time I got there my fur coat and sleigh robe were soaking wet, and I was cold. I found a good home at brother Slipp's, as every one who calls on him does. I met brother Noble on his way to Eel river. I said to him, "I thought you were going to lay by this winter, from what you told us at Conference." He replied that he had thought he would, but he saw so much to do that he felt he could not stop. I told him I had about decided not to do anything this winter, but if he were going to work I should do so, too. Next afternoon I arrived home. Since then I have spent one Sunday at Tracey Mills and Knoxford; one Sunday at Bath, where Rev. S. J. Perry is labouring, he is doing well; one Sunday at Upper Wicklow. I expect to engage there and at River de Chute. I now stop lest I weary the patience of the editor and readers of the INTELLIGENCER.
