News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The Gleaner says there is a probability that the Ashland Lumber Co. of Aroostook river will remove their mills to this city next season.

W. P. Fiewelling will succeed the late Andrew Inches as Deputy Surveyor General.

Fire destroyed two barns belonging to Elias Rogers at Indian Mountain, parish of Moncton, a few days ago.

Willard Hanington the 13 year old son of J. H. Hanington, who lives near Moncton, was badly gored in the groin by a vicious bull a few days since.

William Lair, of St. Martins, charged with mutilating a horse by cutting its mane and tail, was given three years in Dorchester by Judge Forbes.

Messrs. Donald Fraser & Sons, this city, are considering the advisability of establishing pulp works in connection with the Aberdeen mills, and are now in communication with parties in Scotland with a view of interesting them in the enterprise.

The school at Jemseg, has been closed on account of diphtheria. Several cases are reported, but none thought to be serious.

At an adjourned sitting of the divorce court Thursday, Mrs. John Hudon (colored) of Lakeville Corner, Sunbury, was granted a separation from her husband on the ground of cruelty. The amount of alimony to be paid her was fixed at \$8 per month, and \$4 per month to her two children besides the costs of the suit.

A young man named Thomas Grono of Halifax, was drowned at Hackett's Cove, Saturday, by the upsetting of a boat in which he and his brother were gathering sea manure.

Dalhousie college had a narrow escape from destruction Sunday. A large quantity of coal stored in the basement for use during the winter took fire from spontaneous combustion and had gained considerable headway. The steam fire engine after playing on it for several hours managed to get it out.

The house of George Tulloch on the Cole Harbor road, two miles outside of Dartmouth, was destroyed by fire Saturday night. Maria Walker, sister of Mrs. Tulloch, and the latter's three months-old child perished in the flames. Mr. Tulloch and his wife were frightfully burned but will recover. They succeeded in saving their two-year-old boy by dropping him out of the window and then jumping.

The St. John ship John McLeod, Capt. Stuart, sailed from Manila, and when almost at the mouth of Halifax harbor was lost, with a cargo worth \$100,000. The John McLeod was owned by Troop & Sons of St. John, was of 1595 tons register, and was built at Black River, N. B., in 1885 by J. & R. McLeod. At three o'clock Sunday morning the ship stranded on Black Rock, one and a half miles E. N. E. of Sambro Island. Fifteen minutes after striking there were eleven feet of water in the hold, and the Capt. deemed it prudent to get boats out and save the lives of the crew. It was no easy task launching boats and getting the 21 men of the ship's company into them, but this was successfully accomplished, except that one of the seamen had his arm broken in two places.

Other Provinces.

The lobster factory of Woodman Bros., situated at Kildare, P. E. I., has been burned; cause unknown.

William J. Dugdale was found dead in his room on King street, Toronto. The man's death was due to starvation. The coroner found a wad containing \$1,310 sewn up in the lining of an old valise.

The business of the Northwest Land Company shows an enormous increase. C. F. R.'s sales last month doubled those last year.

In Toronto, Wednesday, James Hutton was committed for trial on a charge of murdering his son, John Hutton, on Saturday evening last, by stabbing him with a pair of shears.

In Vancouver, Wednesday, the boiler of the Royal City saw mills exploded while the men were eating dinner around it. Several men were killed and many injured. The roof of the mill was blown off and the building wrecked.

The grand jury at Toronto threw out the bill of murder preferred against Hutton, who stabbed his son last Saturday, and brought in one of manslaughter.

In a country district, near Rawdon, Que., about forty miles from Montreal, on Thursday last four members of one family—three girls and a boy, aged 18, 16, 14 and 10 respectively, were murdered. Their parents were absent for the day. The murderer is not known, but it is supposed that a tramp committed the deed.

The murderer of four members of a family in Quebec is discovered to be their brother, a fellow about 21 years old. He seems to have had no motive except that he frequently quarrelled with his sisters. He has confessed the crime.

United States.

Five workmen were instantly killed Tuesday by the premature explosion of black powder at Victor, Cal.

There was a very heavy snow storm in the North Hills, S. D., Friday. Cattle have suffered considerably.

The Georgia Senate on Friday defeated a measure which if passed would have had the effect of making Georgia a prohibition state.

Chickering Hall, New York, was crowded Friday night with enthusiastic Cubans, who applauded when the speakers declared that Cuba would never accept reform from Spain, that peace can only come after the evacuation of the island by the Spanish army, and that the Cuban patriots will fight to the death for their independence. It was stated that during the past month the Cubans of New York had contributed \$27,123 for the benefit of the cause.

A severe shock of earthquake Friday morning was felt from Silver Bow to Montana. Windows rattled, dishes fell to the floor flower pots were thrown from their stands, clocks stopped and buildings were made to sway and crack. At Dillon, the court house walls cracked and the plaster fell from the ceiling.

British and Foreign.

The cases of dysentery in Japan up to the end of last month totaled 64,642. Of these 14,263 proved fatal.

The long expected floating dry dock, built in England and spacious enough to accommodate large ironclads, arrived at Havana Sunday. It crossed the Atlantic without damage.

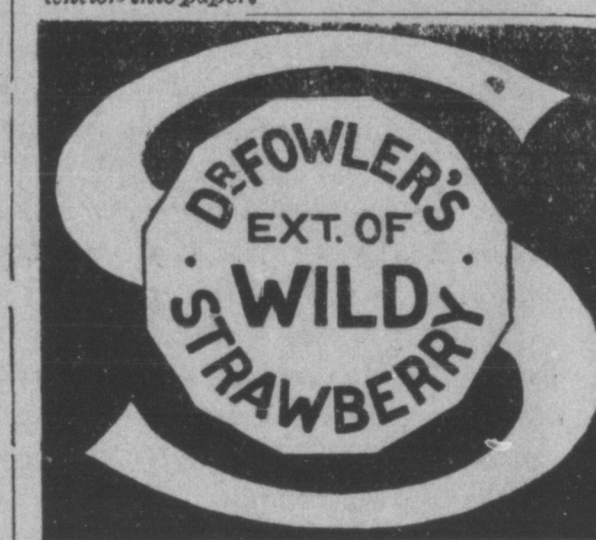

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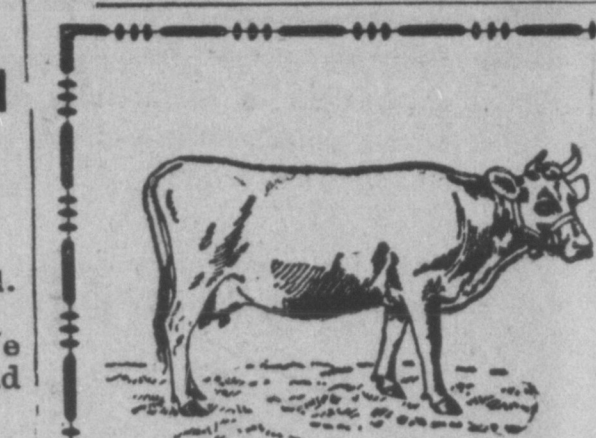
