News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Mr. Jas. Kay has been appointed to the office of police magistrate of Moncton, rendered vacant by the death of Mr. Wortman.

Dennis O'Leary, a city laborer, was found dead upon the sidewalk on Regent street this city, early Tuesday morning, having fallen out of the window.

During a thunder storm, lightning struck the house of Gilbert Brown, Newburg Junction, Carleton Co., demolishing one of the flues and partially unroofing the building.

George McEwan, of Kingsclear, and Solomon McFarlane, of Southampton, have been appointed fishery guardians. Their duties are to patrol the St. John river from Carleton county line to Crook's Point.

Robt. Smith, of Blissville, Sunbury Co., thinks that somebody tampered with some chewing gum he had in his pocket, filling it with strychnine. Fortunately he discovered what had been done, and thus saved his life.

Peter McSweeney's establishment Moncton, was burglarized Friday night and the cash drawer rifled of \$7. Some goods were also stolen.

Mrs. Sarah Rayworth, Port Elgin A. Co., Wednesday while driving home from prayer meeting collided with a team going in the opposite direction. The shaft pierced Mrs. Rayworth near the groin, inflicting a terrible wound which caused her death.

The Local government has appointed Hon. L. P. Faris, Mr. Smith, M. P. P. for Carleton, and Thomas Peters of Hampton, a commission to proceed to Ontario to purchase cattle. The amount set apart for this purpose is \$30,000. The commission will go some time in August.

A depth of over 550 feet has been reached in the artesian well at the Lunatic Asylum grounds, but no water has been struck. The boring will continue.

Fire occurred in the dwelling house of Albert Hayden, Woodstock, Friday morning, and it was badly gutted. The building is insured for \$1,000; there is \$750 on the furniture.

The saah and door factory of H. & F. Swin, Doaktown, was destroyed by fire Friday. The factory, a large quantity of lumber and the greater part of the machinery are in ruins. Among the lumber burned was 100,000 of pine. The loss is estimated at between \$15,000 and \$20,000. No insurance.

William Pond's residence Upper Durham, York Co., was destroyed by fire Friday morning. Several members of the family narrowly escaped. They had no time to save even their clothing. The house was new. Loss \$2,000, insurance about \$600.

A man named John Geldart, 25 years of age, was drowned in the pond at Wright's mill, Salisbury, Friday afternoon. He was working on the logs, and fell in. He leaves a widow and two children.

Mr. Ira Cornwall, a well known St. John business man, was drowned near Westfield on Saturday week. His body was found on Monday. He was stopping for the night at Water's Landing. He had been in poor health for some time. Being unable to sleep he went out in the night to walk, it is supposed, and in the darkness fell off the bridge. The coroner's jury gave a verdict of found drowned. Mr. C. was an energetic business man, much respected.

A tenement house on Gifford St., Carleton, St. John, owned by Mr. C. B. Lockhart, was struck by lightning Sunday afternoon, and considerably damaged. The occupants had a narrow escape.

Nova Scotia.

It is stated that a rich lead of copper has been struck at Feron's, Pictou.

It is reported that 600 artillerymen are to be added to the Halifax garrison. The fortifications are to be further strengthened.

Lightning set fire to a barn owned by George H. Burrill, of Brooklyn, Yarm. Co., Thursday totally consuming it with its contents, 40 tons of hay, implements and some live stock. Loss \$1,300; insurance, 150.

About 4,500 shad were taken in the weirs at Scott's Bay one night recently. The fish are reported as of the best quality, fully two-thirds being No. 1's. This is reported the largest single catch at that place for twenty-six years.

It is stated that Engineer Ross, whose body was found in Bedford Basin recently, was murdered. The police authorities do not believe the story.

The lunatic Beveridge, who killed Bain, another inmate of the Annapolis county asylum, on the 9th ult., has been taken to Annapolis jail charged with murder.

Sydney Marsh, of Five Islands, N. S., was drowned in Southampton river while bathing. Marsh got beyond his depth and being unable to swim sank. His companions could render no aid. Mr. Marsh was 28, and was married last December.

Schooner Lakota, caught in the Parrish river, Saturday night, and when the tide left her fell off heavily, starting several blanks and opening her so that she filled next tide. Insured for \$3,000.

The schooners Ocean Belle and Rising Sun were seized recently on charges of infractions of the customs regulations. The fine in each case is \$400.

Friday was a day of interest in Yarmouth and along the South shore. The coast line railway was officially opened and the event was celebrated by an excursion over the completed part of the road in the afternoon, and a banquet in the evening.

The present indications for crops in general throughout the Annapolis Valley with the exception of hay, are very encouraging. The apple crop has but fairly set, and if conditions are favorable, the quantity for export can scarcely reach 300,000 barrels, against the 500,000 barrels of last year. There will also be a shortage in small fruits and in cereals as compared with last year.

At Old Bridgeport, C. B., Wednesday evening J. M. Wilson, W. L. Gouthro and Jack Scott were bathing from a boat one hundred feet from shore. Scott was apparently seized by a cramp and was drowned, in four feet of water.

Robert R. Robertson, Compton, Que., has it is stated, been appointed manager of the government experimental farm at Napan and will assume charge at no distant date.

In the apportionment of the I. C. R. coal contracts, Springhill's share has been cut down to 45,000 tons of screened coal and 5,000 tons of slack. Last year Springhill supplied 72,000 tons to the I. C. R.

A young man named Ruggles was drowned in Bedford Basin Sunday. He rose in a boat to put on his coat, lost his balance and fell overboard.

At Bridgetown, N. S., Wednesday, the eighteen-month-old child of Mr. Lee Foster was kicked by a colt. Its neck was broken and it fell dead at its mother's feet.

It is reported that the D. A. R. and the Yarmouth Steamship Company will unite their steamship business, making daily trips between Yarmouth and Boston.

The East End abattoir, Montreal, was almost completely destroyed by fire a few days ago. Loss over \$100,000.

A big strike of petroleum was made on the 21st inst., in Galt township, Gaspe. The flow is at the rate of 5,760 barrels a day.

Full returns of the vote taken on the petition in favor of the Scott Act in Portneuf county, Quebec, are in and show a majority of 545 votes against the petition.

Dr. Smith, superintendent Lazaretto at Tracadie, N. B., is visiting the Icelandic settlements on Lake Winnipeg in quest of leprosy cases. It is said he has not discovered any.

There are a great many counterfeit 25 cent pieces in circulation in Toronto. The imitation of the real article is a good one, but the metal is soft. Several street railway conductors have lately been made victims.

United States.

Fire at Yonkers, N. Y., Tuesday, destroyed two large factory buildings. The loss will probably reach half a million dollars, and eight hundred people are thrown out of employment.

The main building of the Peoria-graph Sugar Co., at Peoria, Ill., was completely destroyed by fire last week. Loss \$500,000.

Friday evening a dreadful explosion occurred on the steamer Nutmeg State, at Bridgeport, Conn., and four men were killed, three others fatally injured and a number more are in a serious condition.

The plant of the Badger Paper Co., Kakauna, Wis., was totally destroyed by fire Monday. The loss will be \$25,000; insurance \$200,000.

At Middletown, Conn, Friday a dam forty feet wide, confining water from which three factories got power, burst and was carried away. The huge stone with which the dam was built crashed into the factory of William Wilcox, and the lower floors of the factory were flooded. Forty workmen were compelled to flee for their lives.

A destructive hailstorm passed near Sioux Falls, S. D., Saturday, destroying absolutely everything in its path. It is estimated that fully 1,000,000 acres of crops were destroyed.

A cyclone swept across San Jose, Ill., Friday night. Seven persons were killed outright and three seriously injured.

British and Foreign.

News has been received at Madrid of the flooding of one of the mines in the Balearic Islands by the sea. Nine of the men employed in the inundated workings were drowned.

A severe shock of earthquake was felt Wednesday at Pontedera, Italy, and other places in the Arno valley. Many buildings were wrecked, and a large number of persons are reported to have been injured.

Almost 300 miles of railroad have been completed in China, and construction work goes on steadily. It seems clear that the beginning of a really great Chinese railway system has been witnessed, and the Chinese Government shows no disposition to grow weary of its work in providing modern means of transportation in its empire.

The trial at Buda Pest, of twelve women and two men, charged with wholesale poisoning, was concluded last week, and sentences were pronounced upon six of the prisoners. Four of them were condemned to death, one to penal servitude for life and one to a term of six years' imprisonment. Of those under sentence of death one was found guilty of having caused the death of four persons by administering poison; another was convicted of having poisoned two persons, the third of having poisoned one, and the charge of murder was proven against the fourth.
