News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The People's Bank of Halifax has opened an agency in Hartland, C. Co.

J. Tilley estimates that between 105 and 110 tons of cheese have been made in Carleton county this season.

St. Stephen had an incendiary fire Thursday night, which burned the barn of John McCombey. No insurance.

Mrs. Samuel Moffat, who so mysteriously disappeared from her home on the Oak Bay road, Charlotte Co., on the night of September 10th, has been traced through Eastport to Boston, where she is now at work.

At Sackville, Tuesday evening, Charles Fawcett's barn was burned. It contained about 150 tons of hay and a large quantity of grain. Supposed incendiary. No insurance. Loss about \$5,000.

The mail stage running between Harcourt and Chipman it is said was held up Wednesday by three tramps between Harcourt and Gaspereaux, and the driver threatened with his death if he refused to give up the mails. The driver succeeded in evading the tramps.

The four-year-old daughter of William Steen, Cardigan, was fatally burned Monday. She was playing about a small fire which her father started to burn some rubbish, when her clothes caught. She was instantly enveloped and all her father could do to extinguish the flames was to partly bury the little one in loose earth. The child was so badly burned that flesh dropped off in many places. She died in a few hours.

Last week forest fires did much damage in Yarmouth county. Two houses at Wood's Harbor and a house and barn at Shag Harbor were burned. The railway fence was burned for miles. Nine houses at Acadian settlement on Comeau's hill were consumed.

Fire broke out Sunday afternoon in the lumber yards of the N. S. Lumber Co. at Sherbrooke, N. S. All the lumber in the two upper yards was destroyed. The new mill took fire twice but was extinguished. The Nova Scotia Co. lost 1,100,000 feet of lumber; no insurance. James Miller lost 150,000 feet; partly insured.

Other Provinces.

The Toronto city council, Tuesday evening, unanimously voted \$1000 to the Windsor fire sufferers, \$1000 to the Russell county sufferers, and \$500 to those who lost their lives by the Manitoba prairie fires.

United States.

In the case of Luetgert, in Chicago, charged with murdering his wife, the jury disagreed.

It is said that the good price paid to farmers for potatoes will lift a lot of mortgages in Aroostook county, Maine, this year.

Reports from Fort Kent, Maine, indicate that the diphtheria scourge has grown beyond control. There were on Saturday in the town more than 100 cases under treatment, and patients are increasing at an alarming rate.

Mrs. Walter Gaskell, on the way from Boston to her home in Calais, died suddenly in the waiting room of the steamship company on Thursday at Eastport, while awaiting the arrival of the Calais steamer.

A train of cars, including a number of sleepers, in the New York Central Ry. were precipitated into the Hudson on Sunday morning, through a gully away of the soil beneath the track. Twenty eight lives were lost.

British and Foreign.

A petroleum spring at Romany, a suburb of Baku, Russia, caught fire Sunday night. The fire spread quickly to other springs in the vicinity until the whole valley was a sea of flame. The losses are enormous.

The city of Kuang Yang, in Hunan province, China, has been captured and its inhabitants massacred by a band of rebels, part of a rebel army which is devastating southern China. The number killed and injured exceeded 14,000. The insurgents numbered 15,000 men, half of them armed. Their avowed object is to destroy the existing government in southern China.

A despatch received from Leyte, one of the Philippine Islands, says that place has been almost devastated by a cyclone; that many persons have been killed and that the damage to property is incalculable. It is estimated that 400 persons lost their lives. Late advices from Manila say the cyclone occurred on Oct. 12 and that Burgo, on the eastern coast of Leyte, was wiped out, and that an immense wave swept inland, swamping villages. Several thousand natives perished at Tagloban. The cyclone also swept the island of Samar. The full extent of the catastrophe is not yet known.

CANADIAN CHILD SAVING WORK.

During the eight months of the present year some 53 children have been rescued and sent out to good homes in various parts of Canada. This work is carried on by Christian ladies in Brighton and Toronto under the superintendency of Rev. C. W. Watch of Brighton. It is sustained by voluntary offerings. There are some 20 awaiting homes in the temporary shelter awaiting homes. These are mostly young and suitable for adoption. Their ages run from 2 months up to 8 or 9 years. Curious Facts about the Toad

The toad lived from ten to forty years, says the Galveston News, and it can lay over 1,000 eggs a year. It has lived two years without food, but cannot live long under water. It never takes dead or motionless food. It takes its food by means of its tongue alone, and it operates this so rapidly that the eye cannot follow its motions. It captures and devours bees, wasps, yellow-jackets, ants, beetles, worms, spiders, snails, bugs, grasshoppers, crickets, weevils, caterpillars, moths, etc. The stomach that does not flinch at yellow jackets, wasps, blister-beetles and click-beetles or pinch-bugs, would seem to be prepared for anything in the insect line, and it doubtless is. In twenty-four hours the toad consumes enough food to fill its stomach four times. A single toad will in three

months devour over 10,000 insects. If every ten of these would have done one cent damage, the toad has saved \$10. Evidently the toad is a valuable friend to the farmer, gardener, and fruit-grower, and can be made especially useful in the greenhouse, garden and berry-patch.

A SCIENTIST SAVED.

An Interview With a College President.

THE RETURN OF THE PENDULUM

In 1892 the prosperity of the commercial schools was at its flood. Desiring to find some expedient that would render them still more prosperous, the proprietors of many of these schools abandoned methods that had produced excellent results and adopted others which were wholly experimental. It may safely be said that in most cases the change was not made with the expectation that the schools would be strengthened educationally, but that the new ideas would have greater advertising value. But a reaction has set in. The conclusion has been forced upon thoughtful teachers that the school that educates its pupils best advertises itself best; that a device which may attract inexperienced boys and unthinking parents, may not commend itself to the class of people whose friendliness and patronage must be secured and retained as a basis of permanent prosperity. These schools which adhered to the tried and approved methods, which gave their pupils solid and symmetrical knowledge, which steadily refused to be carried off their feet by patented systems of education, are now reaping the benefit of their wise conservatism. Such schools have not the task before them now of repairing the damage done by experimenting with one or another of the new schemes are realizing that their reputation for real efficiency has been injured, and are seeking their more conservative coworkers for aid. Only a small proportion of the larger schools swung off in '92 and some of them retreated as soon as the character of the road they were travelling was discovered. When prudence will pass for performance, and when clasp-trap will be accepted in lieu of genuine educational advantages, then perhaps, the public will take kindly to patented systems of education.—Progress, Rochester, N. Y.

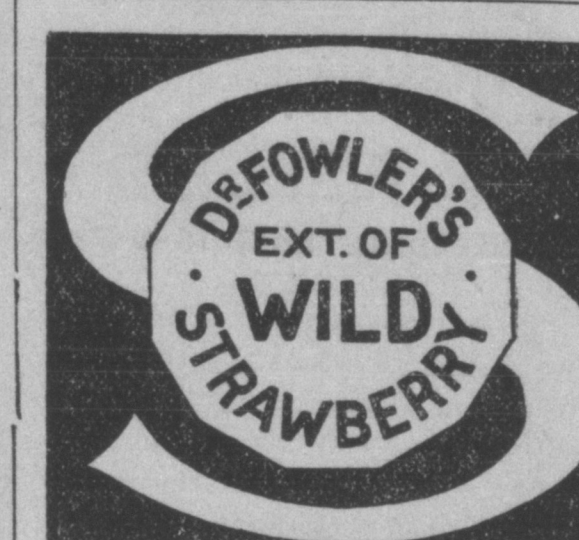
