The Sabbath-School.

INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

Fourth Quarter—Lesson V.—Oct. 31

PAUL'S VOYAGE AND SHIPWRECK—Acts 27:13-26.
Read Chapter 27.
Commit Verses 21-25.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*Be of good cheer: for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me*—Acts 27:25.

THE VOYAGE AND THE SHIP.—As soon as a sufficient company of prisoners bound for Rome could be gathered to go under one military escort, Paul was sent with them. This required about twenty days. The prisoners were under the charge of Julius, a Roman centurion. There was no ship to take them directly from Caesarea to Rome, so they embarked on a vessel which coasted along the shores till they came to Myra in Lycia, Asia Minor. Here they found a ship on its way to Rome. It was a large ship, having on board 276 persons besides the freight. After they had entered the ship, the voyage was southwesterly, and slow, because the prevailing winds were from the west, and therefore against them. They reached Fairhaven, on the south of Crete, about the 26th of September, the season of storms on the Mediterranean. The dangerous season for navigation lasted from September 14 to November 14, when all navigation on the open sea was discontinued. The centurion trusted the opinion of the master of the ship in preference to Paul's and they set sail on a calm and pleasant day for Phenice, a more commodious port of Crete.

THE HURRICANE.—Vs. 13-20. When the south wind blew softly. Nothing is more treacherous than the sea, except it be life. The south wind was favorable for reaching Phenice, as they proposed. A tempestuous wind. A whirlwind or cyclone. Called Euroclydon. The wind was East-Northeast. The similar wind is now called the Levant. When the ship was caught. Implying that the wind seized hold of the ship, and whirled her out of her course. Could not bear up into the wind, as let her drive. Literally, having given up to it, we were borne along. A certain island which is called Cnidus. The suddenness and fury of the blow left the sailors not one moment to unfurl the mainsail, or to do anything but leave the ship to be driven before the gale, until after a run of twenty-three miles, they neared the island of Cnidus and ran in under its lee. To come by the boat. To bring upon deck the small boat which was usually towed astern the ship. They used ropes, chains, any apparatus they had. Undergirding the ship. By ropes, or chains passing around the vessel. The vessel was probably springing a leak. Lest they should fall into the quicksands. The Syrtis Major, on the coast of Africa, a long distance away, but the wind was blowing them directly towards those dangerous shoals. Strake sail. They lowered the sail. Lightened the ship. Began to throw the freight overboard. Cast out with our own hands, that is, of the passengers, the tacking, the furniture, of the ship, beds, tables, chests. A striking picture of a growing panic. When neither sun nor stars... appeared. Before the invention of the compass the sun and stars were the only guides of sailors out of sight of land. In many days. The storm lasted fourteen days in all. All hope... was taken away. The strain both of mind and body, the incessant demand for the labor of all the crew, the terror of the passengers, the hopeless working at the pumps, the laboring of the ship's frame and cordage, the driving of the storm, the benumbing effect of the cold and wet, made up a scene of no ordinary confusion, anxiety, and fatigue.

PAUL BRINGS GOOD CHEER.—Vs. 21-26. After long abstinence. There were no means of cooking, no fire could be lighted, the provisions had probably been spoiled by the waves; indeed, with death staring them in the face, no one cared to eat. Paul stood forth in the midst of them. Sailors, soldiers, and passengers now willingly crowding round him. Ye should have hearkened unto me. Paul recalls to mind their former mistake in disregarding his advice. Harm and loss. The harm was to their persons, the loss to their property. I exhort you to be of good cheer. It is the prisoner who trusts in God. There stood by me this night the (an) angel of God. To reassure Paul.

THE WRECK AND THE ESCAPE.—On the fourteenth night of night of the storm, and the shalowing of the water, they learned that they were near some land. Anchors were cast out of the stern, keeping the bow of the ship toward the shore in case they should drift upon it. This is contrary to the usual method of anchoring, which is by the bow, but these were peculiar circumstances. They had drifted about four hundred and eighty miles toward Malta. Some of the sailors were acting meanly, trying to escape themselves, but leaving all

the others to their fate. But Paul said, "Except ye abide in the ship ye cannot be saved. A good illustration of God and man working together for salvation.

Finally all, at Paul's suggestion, took food, after he had blessed it. The ship drew near to land, and, caught in the sands, began to go to pieces; but by swimming or by clinging to the wreckage which was being blown toward the shore, every one escaped safely to land, which they discovered to be Malta.

So how in the world can you say disagreeable things about people to a woman who always knows some nice little speech to make about them, even if it is only to praise the perfect taste with which their chicken coop is painted?'

'Miss Harris taught me another thing about cordiality the other day. All my life I have been meeting people on the street whom I was not quite sure I knew. Many a time I have half spoken, so that if I ought to have spoken they would take it as a bow, while, if I was mistaken, they would think I was suddenly interested in a bug on the pavement. You know how I mean?'

'Yes, indeed; as John says he does when he puts up his hand to take off his hat, and then tries to pretend to scratch his ear when he fails to get the bow he expected.'

'Well, Miss Harris spoke in her most cordial manner the other day to a passing stranger, and then said to me she thought she had made a mistake. But, she said, I always speak, if I speak at all, as though I was sure I knew the person; for no one is deceived by half recognition and every one resents it; while, if you bow heartily to the wrong person, he realizes instantly that you have made a mistake.'

The Temper.

FOR MOTHERS.

A little boy of considerable intelligence had been well trained, but almost exclusively by his mother, as he had not quite reached his

fourth birthday. He had inherited a considerable amount of will-power from his parents, and exhibited it in a variety of those awkward and unpleasant ways with which those who have to do with healthy boys are familiar. The common idea in such cases is to whip the wickedness out of him. But this is a most serious, and may even be a fatal mistake. You do not want to take the decision of character out of him. It is a most valuable force, and it only wants putting under wise restraints and into proper channels.

One day this boy was going to visit his grandfather, but his violence and mischievousness were such that day that it seemed as if his mother would be obliged to punish him by leaving him at home, even at the expense of such a scene as the mothers of high spirited boys can readily imagine. But instead of punishing him on that occasion, she took him on her knee, and explained to him in the simplest possible language, so as to make him fully understand, that this Mr. Tempter, that was inside him, was always making him want to be disobedient, and now wanted to make him naughty that day, so that he might not go to grandpa's and have nice fruit and game and enjoy himself. She persuaded him to stamp on Mr. Tempter, and not let him prevent his visit to his grandfather.

These high-spirited boys have an innate love of conflict, and by tact and explanations suited to their childish comprehension, that feeling can be made available in teaching them to overcome their evil propensities, especially if you can make them see what they lose and what they suffer if they do not overcome them. The little hero in this case stamped his foot and said Mr. Tempter should not have his way, and he would be good so that he might go to grandpa's, and he went.

Grandpa, who was privately let into the secret, took up the parable in a discreet way, and said how glad he was that John did not allow Mr. Tempter to make him naughty, so that he could not have come; and he went to a drawer in which he kept things to present his grandchildren, and there he found a book full of pictures such as the little ones love that he presented to Master Jack as a reward for his victory over Mr. Tempter. Sometimes the boy would come and say that he had mastered Mr. Tempter, and sent him to wild lands where the wolves might eat him up; but the grandpa carefully explained to him that he would have to fight Mr. Tempter all his life; that, though it was hard work for a little boy, it would become easier and easier the more patiently and perseveringly he stuck to his task. Jack was thus taught practically the sweet results of self-restraint and obedience, and the bitter consequences of self-indulgence and wilfulness.

When the idea of self-conquest gradually dawns upon the youthful intellect, and the work of self-conquest is begun in good time, steadily continued, and intelligently fostered by maternal and other influences what suffering and disappointment the child will be spared!

The Delinquents.

Perhaps not enough attention is given to the scholars who drop out of our Sabbath-schools. There is an enthusiasm about the work of getting new scholars, but it is the ordinary humdrum of work to keep them after they have been gotten. Our schools need to adapt to their work the old adage, 'A penny saved is a penny earned.' And that kindred homely old saw, 'A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush.' It may be that the wanderer is the product of a start for thorough systematic work in your community. A few were brought in by the House-to-house Committee. They showed interest for a few Sabbaths, or as long as the novelty lasted and the new was on; but later they went back, and the teacher showed but little interest in getting them into the class again. There is an entire volume on soul-winning packed away in the one living sentence, He went after until he found it. You will bear in mind that the words 'lost' and 'found' in the Bible have a meaning of greatest depth. To go after until one finds means to keep going and going and going and going, and then going until the effort ends in putting the soul of the scholar down at the feet of Jesus Christ. The trouble with most of our Sabbath school work is we slump too soon. Let us look up the rolls of our classes, and go after the delinquents until we find them.

A Question of Personal Duty.

While we are thinking about giving, it is well for us to proceed a step farther. After all, giving, as it is generally understood, is but a small part of our duty. The very least thing we can do is to give money. The thing which God asks of us is to give ourselves. To every young heart the first question should

be, what is my own personal relation to God's work in the world? Everybody should hold himself in readiness to obey God's call to personal service. If he hears the divine voice calling him to enter the mission field, whether this be at home or abroad, he should stand prepared to give an immediate and cheerful response. If he is convinced that God wants him to spend his life in some other field or service, he should set himself at once to work in the place to which he believes himself to have been appointed.

In a word the question of personal duty is one we ought not to dodge. It is a question of the first importance. Until we decide it we float on life's ocean like a boat without compass or rudder.

Noah, A Girl's Name.
