News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The Fredericton City Council has declined to accept Mr. John H. Reid's settlement proposition at about \$3,000.

A Joliette farmer told the Sackville Post that it would not pay him to dig his potatoes.

The seven Jersey cattle imported from Quebec, by the Local government, were killed at Driscoll's slaughter house.

Wednesday while Gregoire M. Boudreau was hauling potatoes from his home in Barachois to Shediac he fell from his wagon and was killed, the wheels having passed over his body.

The St. Stephen people have been aroused by the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Jennie Mowatt, wife of Sam Mowatt, of St. Davids. The general opinion among the neighbors is that Mrs. Mowatt is not living, or something would have been learned as to her whereabouts ere this. The husband is apparently unconcerned as to his wife's whereabouts.

The New Brunswick Telephone Company's line from Fredericton to Woodstock is now in working order.

The coroner's jury on the death of John Meshan at St. John have returned the verdict that the man was murdered by John Walsh, who is under arrest.

At Stewarston, Kings county, on Tuesday evening the 11-year old son of George McKnight tied one end of a rope around a cow's horns and the other about himself, to lead the animal. It ran away and the boy was dragged over rough ground, receiving injuries that caused his death.

The outbuildings connected with the Episcopal parsonage at Centreville, Carleton county, were destroyed by fire on the 11th inst.; caused by children playing with matches.

Deputy Sheriff Wm. Robinson of St. Stephen captured the horse and wagon which was stolen at Salisbury some days ago. The rig was found at Dunbarton. The thief escaped.

A prisoner named Reid, working in the piggery at Dorchester, mid, his escape Friday morning. Reid escaped once before and was given two years additional.

Mrs. Mowatt, whose sudden disappearance from her home on the Bay Road Ch. Co., has given rise to some suspicions of foul play, has, it is now said, been seen on the International steamer going from Eastport to Boston.

The C. P. R. has completed arrangements for the erection of a number of cottages at McAdam. Considerable land has been laid out in town lots. The company will build ten pretty cottages for workmen, and it is expected fully as many more will be built by workmen themselves.

Nova Scotia.

The grand jury at Antigonish, N. S., found a true bill against Davidson who emptied the contents of a shot gun into young McKinnon, killing him at a picnic at Tracadie in August.

Quarter Master Hancock of the Royal Berkshire Regt. who decamped from Halifax with about \$1000 with which he was to pay off the men, was caught at Augusta Me. Hancock will be brought back and court martialled.

The Nova Scotia herring fishery was a failure, but mackerel are striking in large numbers.

The Nova Scotia Development company has entered into a contract with Townsend & Co. to build another twenty mile section of the Coast Railway, extending from East Pubnico to Barrington Passage.

At the Antigonish court, Thursday, in the case of Henry Davidson, charged with the murder of William Bowman, at Tracadie, the jury returned a verdict of guilty.

The 2nd Battalion 100th Royal Canadian Regiment, of Ottawa, has been ordered to Halifax to take the place of the Royal Berkshires, who are going to Bermuda.

An illicit whiskey still was captured at Bridgewater Friday by Officer Dugan, of Yarmouth. The still was in the cellar of Alonzo Zwickler, and was in full blast when the officers made their appearance. S. Crowell ran from the house but was captured and is believed to be the owner of the still. Three hundred and sixty gallons of wort were destroyed, and twenty gallons brought to Bridgewater.

Two children lost their lives in a burning house at Preston, seven miles from Halifax, at midnight. The house occupied by Peter Downey, a colored man, took fire while the family were asleep. Mrs. Downey was ill, and it was a difficulty to get her and her children removed. There were two others

in the house at the time, nephews of Downey—Arthur and Harry Willis—eight and ten years of age. They were removed last of all, but when taken out were found suffocated by smoke, and nothing could be done to restore them.

The Pictou Charcoal Iron company has leased its furnace to a New Brunswick syndicate. The capitalists from the sister province are engaged in mining manganese, and are shipping it to Nova Scotia for smelting purposes. The Pictou company will still continue operations and will ship their ore to one of the New Glasgow steel works.

An order-in-council has been passed merging the districts for weights and measures of Annapolis, Digby, Queens, Shelburne and Yarmouth into the Halifax district. The Cape Breton district, of Richmond, Inverness and Victoria have also been merged into the Halifax district.

Windsor, one of the most beautiful towns in the provinces, was devastated by flames Sunday morning. For six hours, beginning shortly before three a. m., the fire raged with a violence rarely so fierce that the local fire department was helpless to cope with it, and within half an hour after its discovery the mayor began to call for outside assistance. Long before noon the town had been almost completely eaten up, the area covered by the flames being almost a mile square, and of the four hundred or more buildings occupying this section, barely half a dozen scorched structures remain. All is a waste of ruins. The buildings that escaped include the Windsor Coal Factory, King's College, the Anglican church, Edgehill School for Girls and Dufferin hotel. No Nova Scotia town has ever been visited by a conflagration of such dimensions. Of the three thousand five hundred people inhabiting the place there are very few who have homes of their own now. The homeless have been taken in by the residents of the surrounding country and neighboring towns, while some have gone to Halifax or are sheltered in army tents erected in the vacant lots by a detachment of British troops from Halifax. The losses estimated at between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000. Insurance perhaps a half million.

Other Provinces.

A Winnipeg woman and her six children are reported to have perished in prairie fires.

The Ontario government has voted a grant of \$5,000 to aid sufferers from bush fires in Russell and Prescott counties. The Toronto Globe has given \$500.

The schooner Blood Hound is a total wreck near Cape Pine, New Brunswick. Her crew of seven perished.

Col. Bliss, of the Militia department, Ottawa, was seriously injured in a runaway accident Thursday afternoon. Mr. Bliss was driving with his two children and a nurse girl when the horses took fright and ran away. Mr. Bliss dropped his children out of the carriage, but with the nurse he remained in it. The carriage overturned and Mr. Bliss and the nurse suffered frightful injuries. Mr. Bliss may recover, but there is no hope for the girl.

At Stittsville, Ont., near Ottawa, four people were killed by a collision on the Canadian Pacific Railway Thursday. The east bound express and a western freight were to cross. The freight was broken in two on a grade and only the first part came into the station siding. The express pulled out and ran into the cars for which the freight engine had returned on the grade. The killed are two tram and Engineer L'Archeve and Postal Clerk Peden of the express.

A great enterprise has just been completed in Newfoundland—the completion of the Trans-insular railway, extending completely across the island from St. John's on the east to Port au Basques at the extreme southwest, fifty miles from Cape Breton. The total mileage is about 615 and the cost is \$15,600 per mile, a total of \$9,554,000. The Gazette's Newfoundland correspondent says: The opinion of those



best qualified to judge is that the shortage in the cod fishery this year will be not less than 400,000 quintals, comparing it with the good average fishery of other years. The entire catch will probably reach a million quintals, a good average being 1,350,000 quintals. The Labrador fishery is one of the worst for many years.

United States.

The Maine Central restaurant and contents at Mr. Desert Ferry were destroyed by fire on Tuesday. Loss \$6,000.

Tuesday afternoon, within twelve miles of Austin, Texas, the south-bound Cannon Ball train was held up by four men and robbed. The passengers were relieved of some \$200 in money. The bandits attempted to ride the safe in the express car, but were unsuccessful.

Evidently the Maine lobster industry is not quite extinct when 73,000 are brought into Portland in one day.

Ezekiel Keefe, of Embden, Maine, was feeding a young bull Friday when the animal turned upon him, knocked him down, gored and trampled upon him. Keefe was terribly lacerated and soon died.
