News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A seven-year-old son of John Tait, Shediac Cape was drowned Wednesday by falling from a boat.

John V. Johnston's store at Nashwaak was broken into one night last week and a quantity of goods stolen.

The gold mine at Point Wolfe operated by the Moncton company has been sold to an English company.

Samuel McAleer, a young man from Clarendon, Charlotte county, was drowned at the rafting grounds at Central Blisville last week.

Last week Customs Officers Richards and Vandine of this city made a seizure of smuggled tobacco at J. A. Humble's, Stanley, and another at C. J. Burpee's.

Theodore Reid, of Oak Bay, B. C., was kicked in the breast by a horse Monday afternoon and killed almost instantly. He was 21 years of age.

Three barns of J. H. Scribner at Perry's Point, with their contents, were burned a few days ago. A five-year-old child playing with matches caused the fire.

M. M. Tingley, merchant at Hopeville Hill, a prominent temperance man, is being prosecuted by anti-Scott Act people on a charge of violating the act by selling bay rum.

The store of Miss Hattie Lloyd at Briggs' Corner, Queen Co., was struck by lightning Monday last week and quickly burnt to the ground with all its contents valued at \$1,000. No insurance.

At Newcastle, Miramichi, one day last week Fred Howe's little boy, playing in a neighbor's yard fell over into a barrel of slops sunk into the ground. Life was quite extinct when discovered, and all efforts at resuscitation failed.

The 10-year-old daughter of Mrs. Bourque, widow at Dorchester road near Paines, was run over and killed by the Shediac train Friday evening. The girl was driving her mother's cow across the track at the time of the accident.

A young man named P. S. Iseman in Moncton started to lead a horse to the water with the rope hitched around his thumb. The horse began to back, and the thumb got caught in the door, and before Iseman could extricate his thumb it was torn off.

While Mrs. Ludlow Campbell of Sussex, was visiting George McCain a neighbor, very low with cancer, her little child, five years of age, picked up a box containing two morphine pills intended for Mr. McCain's use, and ate them, which caused death in a very short time. Medical aid was summoned but too late.

Andrew Hinchey, aged 28, of Parker's Ridge, was drowned at Portage Bank, on the S. W. Miramichi Wednesday. Three young men, including two Hinchey's, mounted their horses to swim them down a deep pool. James was first thrown off but was rescued; while his rescue was being effected Andrew was thrown off his horse unnoticed and sank.

Mr. Stephen J. King, post office inspector, was found dead in bed at his home at St. John Sunday last week. He was in his 59 year. He was appointed postmaster at St. John in 1880 and six years later was made post office inspector of New Brunswick district. He leaves a widow and four children.

At Parker's Ridge, York Co. two boys, Herbert, aged 14, and Walter, aged 13 years, sons of Alexander and James McLellan, were driving a span of colts hitched to a wagon loaded with logs. The horses became frightened and ran away, breaking the wagon and throwing the boys off. Walter's head was broken open and he was dead when picked up. Herbert was seriously hurt, the loaded wagon passing over his back.

Nova Scotia.

The Truro Milk Condensing works are running over time.

Mrs. Lovett of Yarmouth has given \$11,000 for the setting up of a Home for Aged Ladies.

Henry Pettis, shoemaker at Parrabec, on Tuesday was robbed of \$377 by John Carmichael, an employee.

The Catholic church at Lingan, C. B. was destroyed by fire on Sunday. It was insured for \$2,000.

The general store of James Highet at Oxford, N. S., was burglarized on Sunday night. A quantity of goods were stolen.

The number of candidates who underwent examination last week for Provincial certificates of scholarship, at the Normal School, Truro, was 266.

The steamboat Hygeia, plying as a ferry boat between North Sydney and Sydney, was burned to the water's edge Thursday morning. No insurance.

The remains of Mrs. Robert Miller of South Unisack were recently found in the woods; the jury found that she had wandered from home while temporarily insane, and that she had died from hunger and exposure.

A bad smashup occurred Wednesday on the railway to Pictou about three miles east of Oxford. The engine and seven cars of the Pictou express left the rails and rolled down a steep embankment. Driver A. Scott was killed and Fireman Richard Almour severely injured. None of the passengers were injured.

The announcement is made that a new steamship line from Yarmouth, to Boston, has been established by the Dominion Atlantic Railway Co. A new nineteen knot steamer, the Prince Edward, just completed in an English shipyard, will be ready for sailings in a few weeks.

The Herald says a very large find of gold is reported from Renfrew. Four young men of the place, are the discoverers. The find is a new lead with only a few feet of surface over it. There is estimated to be \$4,000 worth of gold in sight in the quartz blown out by one shot.

The Halifax Recorder states that in the last eight years, ending June 30th 28,404 carloads of deals have been shipped from the wharves at Richmond deep water terminus. During the last fiscal year the quantity shipped was 5,540 carloads, compared with 3,590 cars the previous year. There were at the end of last week 306 cars of deals at the wharves, with three or four vessels loading. These deals all go to Halifax by rail from interior points.

Another important move is, according to reports, to be made, to further improve the defences of Halifax. It is said that a powerful electric search light is to be placed in the fort at York redoubt at the entrance to the harbor and that a new battery for quick firing guns is to be constructed at Point Pleasant, making four batteries with in gunshot of each other though hidden in the woods of the Public Park. The searchlight at York redoubt would be capable of searching the open ocean for miles in clear weather.

Other Provinces.

Two small-box cases have been discovered in Montreal. One of them, H. J. A. Goddard died.

W. G. Murdoch, a lawyer of Toronto died Saturday in hospital. About a week ago Murdoch and a friend were playfully feuding with umbrellas when the point of his opponent's umbrella entered Murdoch's eye inflicting the injury of which he died.

Three men named R. bert H. Moore, Chas. Beatty and James Carroll were suffocated in a well at Pense station, Manitoba, a few days ago.

John C. Gibson, secretary and treasurer of the O.K. Cafe Brewing Co., Toronto, pleaded guilty to embezzling \$5,000 of the Company's money and was sentenced to three years in Kingston penitentiary.

In Montreal, Thursday the thermometer registered 91 in the shade. The sky was cloudless and the heat almost intolerable. The deaths directly caused by the hot wave number seven. Many horses and dogs succumbed.

Never before has heat been so felt in Quebec. Several horses have dropped dead on the streets. Streets factories and lumber mills in the city and suburbs were closed because of the prostration of workmen. Farmers are unable to work in fields.

United States.

Burglars blew open the safe in the liquor store of Donovan & Co., Boston, Monday morning and took about \$900 in cash. After the explosion the store took fire, and much damage was done.

A freight train on the White Mountain division of the Boston and Maine railroad was wrecked by a washout near Woodsville, N. H., Tuesday, and three men were killed.

Eight persons died from sunstroke in Cincinnati, O., Thursday. This swells the number of fatalities in the past five days to forty-four.

Tuesday the thermometer registered 102 degrees in New York. There were three deaths and fourteen prostrations.

The strike order of the executive committee of the United Mine Workers of America was obeyed by from 10,000 to 15,000 of the 21,000 miners in the Pittsburgh district Tuesday. Sixty-two railway mines are idle and twenty-six are still in operation.

Martin Thorne has been arrested as the murderer of Goldensupples, and has made a confession to acting Inspector O'Brien of New York, which confession implicates Mrs. Nack.

Fourteen people were killed by cyclone and cloudbursts in Minneapolis Tuesday and Wednesday. Every railroad in the state has had some damage to the tracks and rolling stock. The damage will probably exceed \$1,000,000.

In Chicago, Thursday, the fierce heat continued, and three deaths were caused by it. There were seven prostrations, which are likely to result fatally, and twelve not so serious. There were 145 deaths in Chicago on July 5, the largest that ever occurred in one day. The heat through out Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska was intense.
