News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The Fredericton soldiers who were at Halifax returned home Wednesday evening.

Mr. Weatherbee, architect, has been in Fredericton inspecting the military buildings, with a view to some improvements.

A few days ago the residence of Alfred Brooks, on the Necopis road, one and a half miles from Gagetown, was destroyed by fire. The family had a narrow escape.

The Fredericton Deaf and Dumb Institution was totally destroyed by fire Monday night of last week. The institution was located beyond the fire limit, and the department was powerless to render much assistance. The loss is a serious one. Insurance \$6000.

One of the girls employed in Ungar's laundry named Oram was badly injured on Tuesday afternoon, her hand being drawn between two hot rollers. The fingers were crushed and burned.

During the tempest of Monday night of last week the barn of Capt. Sadler, at Mapleview, Tobique river, was struck by lightning, and two barns, containing forty tons of hay, and farm implements were destroyed.

The new Str. "Victoria" made her first trip to Fredericton on Friday. She was 5 hours and 40 minutes coming from St. John to this city. She was much admired.

Wednesday night the office of Rankine & Sons Biscuit factory, St. John, was entered. The safe was open and between \$300 and \$400 in cash and a lot of cheques, bonds and deeds, post office orders and insurance papers were taken.

The delegates of the Provincial Government purchased in Ontario 125 head of cattle and 160 sheep for the province. The cattle are Herefords, Holsteins, Durhams, Jerseys and Ayrshires. The sheep are principally Cotswolds, Shropshires, Dorset Horns and Leicesters.

Mr. H. Beverley Campbell of Sussex N. B., who recently graduated from the musical Department of the School for the Blind, at Halifax, sailed for London on Thursday last. Mr. Campbell who is a young man, of undoubted ability, will for the next two years continue his musical studies in one of the celebrated Conservatories of music in Leipzig, Germany.

At Dalhousie, last week, the body of Joseph Hargrave, jr., aged twenty, was found floating near Moffatt's wharf. The young man had been missing since Aug. 28, and when last seen alive was in company with two sailors who have since sailed from this port. Medical testimony showed that his nose had been broken, some teeth knocked out and other wounds given before death by drowning. The verdict of the jury was that he came to his death by a blow or other injuries at the hands of a party or parties unknown.

Mr. Frank Vail, of Brockway, York county, had his barn and a considerable quantity of hay and grain destroyed by fire on Wednesday evening. The fire was started by some children who were playing in the barn.

Nova Scotia.

A few days ago, Thomas Welton, of Parraboro, had one of his eyes destroyed recently by an arrow striking it.

Sir. Wilfred Laurier is to be in Halifax on Thursday and Friday of next week.

The admiral and officers steward of H. M. S. Crescent, at Halifax, disappeared leaving behind nearly three thousand dollars worth of unpaid bills. He has victimized the officers of the ship to a large sum.

Two of the warships in port at Halifax are ordered to Bermuda and three others will come north from Bermuda to meet the new flagship. The Newfoundland division of the fleet will rendezvous at Halifax in October, as well as the West Indies division, and the combination will make the most formidable array of modern warships of any one nation ever seen in western seas.

A shark thirteen feet long was killed Monday in Bedford Basin.

The Behring sea commission, sitting in Halifax, will probably terminate its labors this week.

The Halifax Board of Trade favors Railway extension from this city to Yarmouth along the Atlantic Coast. This enterprise ought to be encouraged and pushed to completion.

The Renown, the finest ship of war that ever crossed the Atlantic, arrived at Halifax last week. Her passage from England was very rough, but in the face of gales and storms she made good speed. She is the "Admiral Ship" on the North American Station, succeeding the Crescent which sailed for England on Wednesday.

The Provincial Exhibition at Halifax, on Sept. 28th, and succeeding days will be opened by Lord Aberdeen. Hon. Mr. Laurier and the Minister of Agriculture will also visit the Exhibition and address the people. The Exhibition is bound to be a grand success.

Other Provinces.

A despatch from Vernon River, P. E. Island, says, a daughter of Alex. Fraser, of Curville Road, was standing near the R. C. Chapel at Vernon River, Sunday, when one of the ornaments from the turret fell, breaking her skull and causing instant death.

United States.

A tornado, terrible in its velocity, the wind blowing at times eighty miles an hour, struck Port Arthur, Texas, a week ago. Six people are known to have been killed, while many others are injured.

After nearly three months' idleness between 15,000 and 16,000 coal miners in the Pittsburgh district went to work Thursday. The remainder of the 23,000 miners of the district will be at work in a few days. It is estimated that the strike, which lasted sixty-five working days, cost the people of Pittsburgh district from \$5,000,000 to \$7,000,000. Of this amount the miners lose \$2,250,000 in wages.

British and Foreign.

The Duchess of York will shortly issue an appeal for the Irish who are threatened with famine.

Twenty-four persons, mainly spectators of a great blast at Panueta quarry, on the Vera Cruz railway, Mexico, were instantly killed Saturday. The blast went off and the people rushed forward to see the effects, when the air ignited, causing explosion with terrible results. Many people were wounded.

Typhoid fever is prevailing to an alarming extent in several places in Germany. The Berlin health authorities have issued a special warning to the public against the use of unboiled milk.

Two steamers, the Tsarevitch and the Maipitka, collided, Thursday in the river Volga near Astrakhan. The former sank and while she was going down her passengers, panic stricken, jumped into the river. Many of them succeeded in reaching shore, but forty persons were drowned.

AN ENTOMBED TOAD.—A few years ago a toad was found alive encased in a stone in Egypt, where it must have lived for two or three thousand years. A similar instance has been noted at Bristol, Pa. An old moss covered vault in the old St. James's Episcopal churchyard was opened a few days ago by the sexton, and in the interior was found a live toad. The most recent date on the vault was "William Henry, 1793." There seems to have been no possible way by which the toad could have entered the tomb after it was sealed.

ROMAN HOUSE UNEARTHED.—The spade of the antiquarian has been turning up some curious as well as valuable things lately. Among these is the Roman private house discovered on the grounds of a manufacturer at Treves, which it is said will excite the interest of antiquarians almost as much as did the unearthing of the famous public buildings at Augusta Trevirorum.

A Berlin correspondent of a London paper describes the building at Treves as follows:

The front of the house lies parallel with the principal street of the old Roman city. A number of blocks which served as pedestals for the wooden or stone pillars of a portico still remain. The entrance is distinctly recognizable between two buttresses and an immense heap of stones. A long entrance hall running right through the house, from front to back is intersected by another corridor, so that the gigantic building is divided into four parts. Side corridors lead into the rooms. Of these the marble tessellated bath rooms for hot and cold water and warm air lie side by side, and deserve special mention. The two latter were supplied with warm air through subterranean passages. The escape of the smoke was effected by means of hollow tiles laid on one another. The southwestern rooms have cellars under them. In a light court in the same part of the house there is a well-preserved window, the first ever found in a Roman building. The most interesting thing, however, is the magnificent and richly colored mosaic floor, a rarity of the first order. Experts assign the building to the first half of the fourth century, when Augusta Trevirorum attained the zenith of its splendor under Constantine and his sons.
