News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The house of Wm. Arnold, Dutch Valley, K. Co., was burned Monday. No insurance.

The residence of George Seord, two miles below Apohaqui, was totally destroyed by fire Monday of last week. His barns caught fire, but were saved. Insurance \$1,000.

Anselme M. Legere has been appointed collector of Customs at Shediac N. B.

Samuel Melanson, Bathurst, has been appointed Registrar of Deeds for Gloucester, in place of F. J. McManus, deceased.

A man named George Beattie, hostler at Doone's hotel, St. Mary's, committed suicide by taking carbolic acid, last Thursday. He had been somewhat melancholy lately.

Sunday of last week a 7 year old daughter of Howard Thompson, at Morrison's Cove near Chatham, was burned to a crisp. The child was playing with her brother and the children of a neighbor who had been burning brush in his field. The children were near the fire, which was smouldering. The fire caught on the child's pinafore. Her brother endeavored to tear the pinafore off his sister, but she ran screaming away. The children ran for help. When found, the child was dead, burned to a crisp.

Point du Chene was visited again Tuesday night by fire. Nearly the whole block on the river's front was burned to the ground. Following is a list of the buildings destroyed: Point du Chene hotel, Sea Side hotel, Mrs. Johansen's store. Loss \$10,000.

The total attendance at the recent exhibition was 40,708, against 41,053 in 1896 and 52,674 in 1895.

Gus Wentzell and Walter Stewart were out boat sailing in Digby basin a squall struck the boat and capsized her, both were thrown into the water. Stewart managed to get hold of the boat to sustain himself. Wentzell was drowned.

New Glasgow seems to be invested by a gang of thieves. Two stores were entered.

Vaccination is to be attended to in Halifax. There are cases of small pox at Montreal, Toronto, and Hamilton. None are yet heard of in the maritime provinces, but it is well that early precautions should be taken.

A large illicit still was seized in the mountains of Glendale, Cape Breton, Wednesday, by an Inland Revenue officer from Toronto. A quantity of whiskey was seized. This makes three illicit still-seizures in Inverness this year.

It is stated that the Halifax Exhibition, which opens this week, will be by far the best ever held in Nova Scotia. The exhibits are expected to occupy all the space available, some classes being greatly crowded. Rules give specially reduced fares so that a large number of visitors may be expected.

On Saturday afternoon the mail carrier, between Black Rock and Brookfield, a few miles from Truro, discovered the body of a man lying dead by the roadside. It was that of an Armenian peddler, and an envelope in his pocket bore the address, "Musfud Koory, Amherst, N. S., Canada." He had been shot from behind, the bullet entering two inches below the scapula.

There were also shot marks, showing that the gun had been loaded with a double charge of bullet and shot. Two packs lay beside the body, one untied and the other opened by the force of the fall. There is no clue to the murderer. Three boys say they saw a man in a gray suit come out of the woods and turn a corner in the road, and that soon after they saw the peddler follow him. Then there was a report of a gun. The boys made no search, and not long after the mail driver made his ghastly discovery. A coroner's inquest was held, and a verdict was returned that the man was murdered by a bullet fired by some person unknown.

Other Provinces.

The Ottawa city assessors believe their returns will show a population of 53,000, an increase of 2,000 for the year.

Hurdman's mill at Hull, Que., was totally destroyed by fire Monday night. The loss is \$150,000. Between five and six hundred men are thrown out of employment.

The Newfoundland legislature was dissolved last week. October 28th is the date for the election of the new parliament.

The residence of Leandre Gatin at Sturgeon Falls, Ont., was destroyed by fire Monday morning and three daughters, aged thirteen, ten and eight, burned to death.

MacIntosh, Clark & Jarvis, barristers, of Toronto, have completed negotiations for an English syndicate to invest \$5,000,000 in Canada. The syndicate will export food products, chiefly fruit and meats, to Great Britain, and will have three immense warehouses in Canada, one in Montreal, one in Toronto and another in a city yet to be selected.

The McKay Milling Company, Ottawa, last week filled an order of the Russian government for three hundred sacks of the best Canadian oats. The grain has been shipped direct to St. Petersburg.

Fire at Toronto on Friday did \$30,000 damage to the wholesale grocery house of H. P. Eckhardt. Rats nibbling at matches was the cause. In the same city in the evening the Musee theatre was badly damaged by fire and smoke. A jet of steam shot out of the safety valve of a fire engine with a loud explosion. This frightened the horses and they ran away down the crowded street. The heavy engine ran over Bertie Escot, eleven years old, killing her instantly. Seven firemen were so badly crushed between the engine and a wall that they had to be removed in ambulances to the hospital. Half a dozen citizens were also more or less injured.

United States.

With the exception of one store the entire business portion of Wilmore, Ky., was destroyed by fire on Sunday. Loss \$50,000.

Monday night Ahumada, Texas, was visited by a flood. Men, women and children were driven from their beds and had to take refuge on the high ground with their household effects. There was not a place to shelter them. Many houses tumbled down and many more are expected to collapse. The country was flooded for miles around.

Everett P. Willis, who attempted to rescue his brother, a life prisoner, from the state prison at Charleston, Mass., recently, and in doing so shot a fireer,

was on Wednesday sentenced to the state house for a term not exceeding 20 nor less than 15 years. The brother died of injuries received in the scuffle.

An explosion occurred in a coal mine near Marion, Ill., on Friday. Fifteen wounded miners, two of whom have since died, were rescued. Five or six men were left imprisoned in the burning mine.

Capt. Beckman, of Bucksport, Me., the inventor of a barrel boat, started early Monday morning from South-west Harbor with his ten-year-old son, for Rockland, Me., in order to prove the practicability of the invention. On Tuesday a heavy gale swept the coast, but Beckman and his boy were rescued five miles off shore by the steamer Pentagot.

British and Foreign.

The price of all kinds of food is rising rapidly in Spain, owing to the growing depreciation of silver and paper currency.

China advices per Express of China, which arrived at Victoria, B. C., Tuesday night, report that this year's freshet was lower by more than a foot than those of preceding years, but in spite of this 100,000 people have been rendered destitute and the damage to property is estimated at about \$1,000,000.

The latest health statistics from Bombay show that the bubonic plague is again active, having crept unobserved from hamlet to hamlet until a wide area is afflicted.

While a battery of artillery was passing through the town of Pitesti, Roumania, an ammunition wagon exploded. Four men were instantly blown to pieces and eleven injured so seriously that three have since succumbed.

Typhoid fever is causing ravages among the Turkish troops in Thessaly. Six thousand men have already been invalidated home and 4,000 others are awaiting transportation back to Turkey.

Owing to the floods having washed away a bridge of the Bangalore-Mysore railroad, near Maddur, India, an engine and five cars, filled with passengers, have been precipitated into the river. There has been great loss of life.

A Strange Religious Sect.

In all the world, probably, there is no body of religious enthusiasts whose regimen is so severe as that of the Aubins of Montreal. Deprived of every suggestion of comfort, they sleep at night, not in beds even of the hardest sort, not on a pallet of straw, nor even a bare board, such as pious monks of the Middle Ages used, but in coffins—narrow and grim and black. These ghoulish resting-places are not cushioned, or even lined, and year in and year out the devotees occupy them, for the betterment of their souls and a more thorough forgetting of the vanities of the world.

They subsist upon bread and water, and to vary the weird monotony of such living, they spend hours of each day bent in prayer about an altar in a darkened chapel, their necks laden with chains of great weight. The austerities prescribed by the rules even of the Carmelite nuns are trivial compared with what these women undergo.

This strangest of all religious companies was founded by a Dr. Jacques, a graduate of the Victorian School of Medicine. Years ago, when the small-pox epidemic killed off hundreds of the people of Montreal, Dr. Jacques had among his 1,500 patients the family of Aubin. They were persons of good social standing, but after the disappearance of the small-pox they set about the fulfillment of vows they had made during sickness. Father, mother, and five daughters, they withdrew entirely from the world, and live now in the house of Dr. Jacques, who himself is the head of the company.

The upper floor of the house is divided into rooms or cells, bare of carpets or of furniture, save the unsightly cinder, plain, unpainted tables, and tin wash basins. There is not a single article of bedding, or of raiment, and no ornamentation, except the images, to which prayer is said. In the room used for the purpose of regular worship there stands in the shadow of the altar a post with heavy chains hanging from it.

The prime motive of these recluses is to intercede for the souls of their sisters of the world whom destiny has thrown in the way of temptation. So, when the social season arrives—when parties, balls, and festivals are in progress, when the world comes to them from the outside world that the spirit of carnival is abroad, and temptation and danger go hand in hand to waylay and destroy the souls of men and women—there, in the Aubin household, all the rigorous and deprivations of monastic life are redoubled, and the cloistered family, with their learned preceptor, Dr. Jacques, fast faithfully and spend hours of each day upon their knees in urgent prayer, their necks weighed with the heavy chains, in exaggerated token of humility and self-abasement. Even in the cold of winter they have no fires in their cells.—New York Journal.
