News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

John H. Anderson, aged 66, of Scotch Settlement, while proceeding to his home from a neighbor's Monday night, fell off a small bridge, fracturing the base of his skull. He is in a critical condition and may not recover.

British barks Corona and Norman arrived at Chatham Tuesday. The Corona made the round trip from Miramichi to Belfast and back in forty-four days, which is said to be the fastest on record. She lost a seaman off E. Cumineac. A boat was launched to rescue him, but the attempt failed and the boat could not get back to the ship owing to the strong wind and heavy sea. The boat reached E. Cumineac after five hours' rowing, with its crew of six in an exhausted condition. The lost sailor's name is reported as Carrigan.

Rev. J. J. Teasdale of this city has announced his acceptance of the call extended to him by the Methodist church of Charlottetown. He will assume the charge in June.

All the real estate, including the residence of the late John Edgecombe the carriage factory, buildings and lands owned by John Edgecombe & Sons, were sold at public auction Monday under foreclosure sale upon mortgage held by W. H. Murray of St. John. The property was bid in by Fred B. Edgecombe for \$17,000, the amount of the mortgage.

The Maternity Hospital in connection with the Salvation Army Rescue Home will be opened on Thursday evening next. It is at the corner of King street East and Crown street. It will be under supervision of Ensign Jost.

John Moore of this city who has been ill for some time died at noon on Nov. 6th. The deceased had occupied the position of city treasurer for about fifteen years, and was a most efficient and careful officer. The place vacated by his death will be difficult to fill as satisfactorily. The deceased was seventy-five years old.

Saturday morning while a young man named Dike Fox of the West End, was riding on a team carrying one of the heavy iron pipes for the Spruce Lake main, he accidentally fell under the wheels, which passed over one of his legs. The young man was stunned by the fall and was conveyed to the hospital in the ambulance, where Dr. Maculay found the limb fractured above the knee.

A son of John Kilburn, lumberman, of this city, shot himself through the arm while hunting Saturday. He was attempting to draw a twenty-two calibre rifle towards him by the barrel when the trigger caught and the weapon exploded. Fortunately the bullet did not shatter a bone but merely inflicted a flesh wound.

At Dorchester, Oct. 5, under the speedy trials act, before Judge Wells, Fred Downey of Moncton was convicted of stealing an overcoat from William Barnes of that city and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

This year they will appear mostly north of east. Begin your look out on the 11th, and about 11 o'clock. Another exhibition of meteors is expected on the night of the 27th inst. The latter are the Andromeda meteors; the former the Leopids.

Nova Scotia.

James Innes, the well-known I. C. R. trackmaster at Bedford, is reported to have been left a comfortable fortune by a step-brother at Cambridgeport, Mass., and his son, James Good, a legacy also. The amount left to Innes is said to be \$30,000, and to James, \$5,000. The former has gone to Cambridgeport to look after the estate.

Diphtheritic croup has been very prevalent around Port Williams, N. S., and several children have died.

The cruiser Cordelia, which was to have sailed Thursday for England to pay off, received sudden and unexpected orders to proceed to the coast of Newfoundland again, presumably the French shore.

A miner by the name of Mitchell, from Isaac's Harbor, who has been working on the Hayward mine property, at Montague, fell into one of the shafts recently and was killed. The distance was about 80 feet. There was some eight feet or more water in the shaft, caused by the heavy rain. Whether Mitchell was killed in falling or drowned is uncertain.

Hallowe'en has been an expensive one for Ames Pagley, Amherst, two of his barns, containing about one hundred and forty-five tons of hay and fifteen tons of oats, being completely destroyed by fire. The total loss will be about fifteen hundred dollars, with no insurance. The fire is supposed to have been set, as the barns were completely isolated from any other buildings. In one of the barns was a mowing machine and horse rake belonging to Wesley Doncaster, who will feel the loss severely, having just about completed payment on them.

Charles DeFretas stationer, of Halifax, who assigned on Tuesday, met his death by self shooting at his shop on Brunswick street Thursday afternoon. The weapon used is what is known as a rifle pistol, with a barrel about seven or eight inches long. The bullet entered the head and emerged on the left side. Deceased was about 40 years of age and leaves a wife and five children.

The Robb Engineering Co., Amherst, have received an order from New York parties for two 300 horse power engines for an electric railway in Australia. They are tandem Compound, side crank pattern and the dynamo will be direct connected. This company is working up a considerable export trade, having shipped during the past few months one 300 horse power engine to England, three 250 horse power to the Isle of Man, three 125 horse power to Spain, and one 125 horse power to Newfoundland.

A curious case was decided last week by Chief Justice McDonald. Two steamers collided in broad daylight in mid ocean. When they sighted each other they were 21 miles apart, and still they collided! The ship that lost the case and was to blame was the one that sued for damages of \$15,000. The strange thing is that being on the wide ocean they did not keep well clear of each other.

Immigration business at Halifax promises to be large this fall. The first steamer will be a French liner, which will have 2,000 Doukhoborts, a religious sect of Russia, bound to the Canadian northwest. The ship will be detained in quarantine several days to ensure being free from infection.

The Nova Scotia shore fisheries this season are by long odds the worst for years. This is true alike on the western coast and on the east, except in parts of Cape Breton, and is true both of herring and cod.

Two brothers, Stewart and Howard Richardson of Orl's Head, Halifax county, lost their lives by drowning at Bird Landing, near Big Bras d'Or, C. B. They were out mackerel fishing. When returning, and within forty yards of the shore, a big sea struck their boat, capsizing them. The people on the island were unable to render assistance. Stewart was forty-four and leaves a widow and nine children. Howard was twenty-four and unmarried.

Other Provinces.

Major General Hutton has inaugurated a system which will enable an officer who has removed beyond the limits to retain his connection with the militia. An "attached list" is to be established.

Four men lost their lives in Sunset No 2 mine Rossland, B. C., last Tuesday night. Wm. Cain and Patrick Nolan were ascending from the shaft when they were overcome by smoke and fell from a ladder to the bottom of the shaft. The necks of both men were broken by the fall. Fred Holt was also overcome but saved by the heroic exertions of Geo. Drury, engineer of the hoist. Jim McCarty and Pat Quinlan, also employed in the mine, descended the shaft to recover Cain's body and both were suffocated by gas.

Elzear Mann was Friday morning found guilty of murder and sentenced to be hanged on December 16. The crime was committed last June, when as a result of a family quarrel, the accused shot and killed his mother-in-law and wounded his wife. The mother-in-law, Mrs. Desjardins, was attempting to shield her daughter, whereupon Mann shot her and then shot his wife. The latter ran out on the street arousing the people in the vicinity. She was removed to the hospital, and has since recovered.

On Saturday afternoon a man named McCrea, of P. E. Island, who was in the employ of the Redbeach Granite Company, at the border, was badly injured by the premature explosion of a blast in the quarry there. The man had just touched a match to the fuse and shouted "Fire," when his comrades were horrified to see him thrown into the air quite a distance and landed in a ravine twenty-five or 30 feet below the bluff where the blast was placed. They hastened to the spot expecting to find him dead, but he was breathing although unconscious. He was carried to his boarding house where a physician made an examination which showed the loss of one eye, face badly disfigured, but did not think he would die unless hurt inwardly. McCrea was over 50 years old and intended to quit work and return home after the 10th of November.

United States.

Benjamin Haskell, a Gloucester, Mass., grocer, was instantly killed at his store Monday night by a barrel of molasses falling on his head and crushing it almost to a jelly.

Daniel C. Wyman was caught in a dryer at the Bannington Falls pulp mill at Middle Falls, Vt., Wednesday, and so badly injured that he died in a couple of hours. He was prominent in the Masonic fraternity.

Adam Rowe, a prominent Ohio politician, was fatally shot near Ridgeville Wednesday night by Wm. Smith. Rowe had been out electioneering and upon his return, it is alleged, while under the influence of liquor, went to Smith's house and attempted to kick the door in. Smith opened fire on Rowe with a shot gun, inflicting wounds which will prove fatal.

After a chase across two continents, Lambert Wilt, controller of the Bangla Savings Bank at Bangkok, Siam, with his wife and her aunt, was arrested in St. Louis, Mo., on the charge of having absconded with 109,000 guilders (\$41,420).

Miss Jennie Davidson, a Samerville girl, employed by the Clinton Manufacturing company on Franklin street, Boston, was crushed to death by an elevator Friday afternoon. The girl was looking over the gate into the well when the elevator came down upon her without any warning, crushing her head and shoulders.

British and Foreign.

In the Cape colony assembly Wednesday the Hon. W. P. Schreiner, the premier, introduced a bill proposing an annual contribution by the colony of £30,000 to the British navy.

The Daily Mail announces the appointment as governor of Khartrun of C. L. Kitchener, brother of the soldier, Gen. Lord Kitchener.

The announcement of the intentions of the United States regarding the Philippines has greatly excited the public in Madrid. It is generally recognized, however, that it would be absolutely futile to appeal to Europe, which has abandoned Spain to her fate. The newspapers protest vigorously against the "incredible cynicism and abuse of strength of the Americans." The ministerial El Globo exclaims: "Europe and America seem determined to sanction by cowardice and selfishness a crime that will be a blot upon the history of the century."

THE BLIND.—A Russia medical journal has just published a series of statistical articles showing the number of blind persons in Europe. French scientists, while not doubting the truth of the figures, consider them somewhat remarkable; of the 302,000 totally blind persons in Europe, 192,000 are in Russia—that is to say, one out of every 500 subjects of the czar is blind. It is believed that this unfortunate proportion is equalled by no other country in the world. The proportion in France, England, Germany, Italy and Spain is recorded as a little less than one to every 1,000 of population. The Russian physicians, who compiled the statistics attribute the great number of blind persons in Russia to the hygienic state of peasant life, to the intense cold, and to the glare of the sun on the snow, which the Russian rustic takes pride in facing. It is reported that the total number of blind persons in the world is 2,000,000.

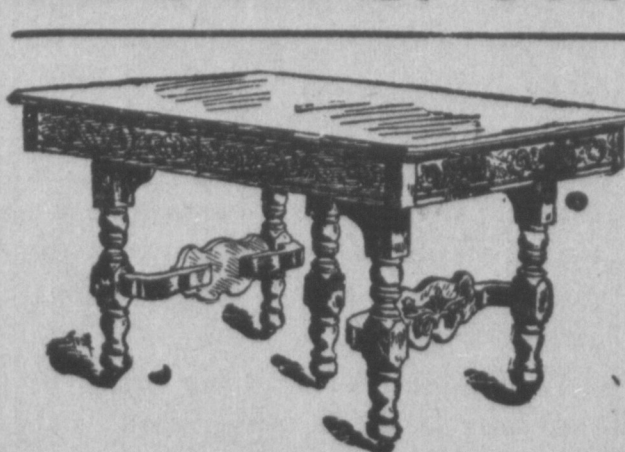
