News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Leo Richard, son of Hon. A. D. Richard, Dorchester, while playing with a loaded cartridge was badly hurt about the face and, it is feared, will lose one eye.

The report has reached this city of the drowning of three men on Kilburn's drive. Thirteen men in a flanger attempted to run the Priestly rapids, when the boat sank. The tow boat crew succeeded in rescuing ten, but three were drowned. Two of them were named Martin from St. Basil.

The dates fixed for the International Exhibition, St. John, are from Sept. 13 to 28.

The Advertiser says that in the fire that consumed his buildings Leonard Doucette of Knowltonville, C. Co., lost a threshing machine, reaper, mower, two horse rakes, sleds, pump, harness for four horses, feed mill and a fanning mill. Also a large quantity of hay.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries is making arrangements to place a life boat at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, in accordance with a request made by the St. John Board of Trade last year.

Fulton Beverly, St. John, who some time ago was placed in the provincial lunatic asylum by relatives for treatment, died Sunday week, from the effects of poison administered by his own hand. He was 52 years of age.

At Cummings brickyard, near Moncton, Thursday, the boiler exploded, and a son of the proprietor was badly scalded. The boiler eighteen feet long and six feet in diameter, was shut through the top of the building, and the pieces flew in all directions. The largest portion landed on the marsh two hundred yards off. The building was wrecked and a quantity of machinery destroyed. Damage two thousand dollars; no insurance.

Wm. Fx, the lad charged with breaking into Harrison's store, Main street, St. John, in March, with intent to steal, was tried before Judge Forbes Thursday morning. He was sentenced to five years in Dorchester penitentiary.

The capacity of the Dominion Pulp company's mill at Chatham is to be doubled, so that it will within a short time turn out 30 tons of pulp per day.

Alexander McDonald of Cape Breton, who ten years ago was sentenced to a life term at Dorchester penitentiary, has been pardoned by the minister of justice.

The Merchants Bank of Halifax will erect a \$20,000 building at Moncton.

The inquest Thursday at the Provincial Asylum into the death of Isaac D. R. derick, resulted in a verdict of death from natural causes.

A fatal accident happened at O. Neil's mill, Quaco, Thursday. Mr. McComber, who was working in the mill, stumbled over a belt, was caught and quickly hurled into the machinery. He was rescued as soon as possible but lived only a short time. He leaves a widow and large family.

W. A. Connolly of Jackson town, C. Co., lost his house and barns by fire Thursday. The fire occurred from a supposed defective flue. One barn was saved. Mr. Connolly lost a large quantity of grain and most of the furniture in his house. His loss is considerably above the insurance.

On Saturday the rumor was again revived here that Harvey Lawrence and a party of seven, including his two sons, who left Kewick in March for the Klondike, had all been drowned on a stream near Chilkoot pass, with the additional fact that Elisha Gilpatrick of Danforth, Me., was the only survivor. Telegrams to Danforth and Houlton did not confirm these rumors, and it now hoped the whole story is without foundation.

A large deposit of plumbago has been discovered near West Bay. The mineral is said to be superior to any found in Canada. There is an immense quantity, and within half a mile of the railway. For years the farmers used to plow it up, but thought it of no value and took no notice of it until recently.

Dr. Jane Heartz, a Nova Scotian, will begin the practice of her profession in Halifax.

Mackerel have set in large quantities off Yarmouth and the boats and traps are making great hauls. The Yarmouth boats are averaging 600 barrels a trip.

It is reported that the British government proposes before long to fortify Sydney and Louisburg harbors. Should hostilities occur between Great Britain and France, these two places being two very important coaling stations, would probably come in for a fair share of powder and shot.

Nova Scotia has 20 creameries and cheese factories. During 1894, 9,817, 126 lbs., of milk were received and 365,670 lbs. cheese and 192,887 lbs. butter made. It required 10.2 lbs. milk to make 1 lb. cheese and 22.15 to make 1 lb. butter. The average price received for cheese was 9.3c. and for butter 19.23c.; the total value was \$73,118. It was nearly all made for local use.

Other Provinces.

A hospital at St. Hyacinthe, P. Q., was burned Monday of last week, and fourteen lives were lost.

At Joliette, Que., Friday, Tom Nulty who murdered his three sisters and young brother in October last, was hanged.

Contracts have been let for the construction of a railroad from Skagway to Luke Bennett via the White Pass. It is said the work will begin at once.

Hamilton, Ont., had a \$40,000 fire on Thursday. The offices of the Canadian Express and the Northwestern Telegraph Companies were destroyed. Insurance about \$0,000.

There has been an outbreak of diphtheria at St. Isidore, P. Q. Over fifty cases are in the convent a day amongst the nuns and pupils. There is only one doctor in the place, and he is ill.

Several thunder and lightning storms passed over Tignish, P. E. I., Friday morning, and struck a barn belonging to E. P. Crawford, killing a horse and setting fire to the barn.

During a thunder storm at London, Ont., Thursday, lightning struck the residence of J. B. Alleyby, and he was killed as he lay asleep in bed. The deceased was one of the oldest and most respected business men of London.

At St. Marie Beauce, P. Q., Thursday, Ernest Pange, a young man, was ploughing with four oxen when they took fright and ran away. Pange was caught by the plough in endeavoring to stop the animals and dragged a considerable distance and killed, his body being terribly torn and mangled.

At Winnipeg a girl of seventeen was being forced to marry a widower of thirty and objected, maintaining her independence even until she was taken to the altar. The priest, however, sided with her and refused to marry them.

United States

The wheat crop in California is a total failure. Fruit prospects are better than last year.

In Attleboro, Mass., Wednesday, the manufacturing jewelry business, which is the chief source of income

hundreds of residents of that place, received a staggering blow, when a fire destroyed \$750,000 worth of property, including four factories occupied by sixteen firms, with their contents.

A destructive tornado swept over the western part of Kingman Co., Kansas, Tuesday night. The town of Cunningham was almost demolished. There are only five houses left standing. The track of the storm was two hundred yards wide and everything was swept clean.

Passengers on board the steamer Morgan City, which arrived at Seattle from Copper River, Alaska, report two large slides occurred on Valdes glacier April 30 and May 1, in which about one hundred people were caught. Only three persons were killed.

A violent tornado devastated a wide district along Republican River in South Central Nebraska, Tuesday night. It swept rapidly northward, devastating farms, groves and cattle ranches. The forest growth along the River lies prostrate and tangled. The telegraph wires and poles along the Burlington Road are broken off, for half a mile. Six farm houses were torn to pieces, together with out-buildings.

Over a score of lives were lost and thousands of dollars worth of property destroyed by a tornado which swept Clinton and Jackson counties, Iowa, Wednesday afternoon. No towns were in the path of the storm, but farmhouses and barns were torn to pieces by the force. The clouds were seen approaching by many farmers and they sought refuge in their cellars. At least twenty-five were killed, being unable to find shelter, and probably as many more were seriously injured by flying timbers. The path of the storm varied from forty rods to eighty feet. Roofs of farm houses were carried half a mile and hurled against big stock barns killing hundreds of cattle, which had taken shelter in the sheds. Half a dozen school buildings are known to have been destroyed, but it is not thought that any of the pupils perished, most of them having just about reached home when the storm broke.

British and Foreign.

Twenty-seven thousand tons of coal were shipped from Sydney, N. S. W., to San Francisco last month and arrangements have been made for the delivery of 150,000 tons.

A cyclone has destroyed a great part of Bima, a seaport town of the island of Sumbawa, Malay archipelago. The shores of Sumbawa Bay are covered with the bodies of thousands of victims.

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The e was a violent earthquake in Sicily on Saturday morning, extending northward from Mount Aetna and reaching to Mino, 30 miles southwest of Catania. A number of houses were wrecked at Biancavilla, on the declivity of Mount Aetna, and at Bompasio. Other shocks followed.

Friday, an explosion occurred at Cateau San Julian, Spain, in a projectile factory. Five soldiers and five workmen were killed outright and sixty-two persons severely injured. The explosion was accidental.

The Metlakahla Mission and Its Trouble.

An effort is made by speculators to have Annette Island, Alaska, on which the Rev. William Duncan's Christian Indian colony of Metlakahla is established, restored to the public domain, and a bill has been introduced in Congress to that effect. Mr. Duncan, a clerk in a business house, became interested in Missions forty years ago, at a meeting held in the church he attended, and offered himself for service under the Church Missionary Society. He went to Fort Simpson, British Columbia, where the Indians around him were living in most savage heathenism and cannibalism. He opened a school in June, 1858, in the house of a chief, with twenty-six children and fifteen adults, which soon grew to be one of one hundred and forty children and fifty adults, with a special building. The heathen Indians became hostile and attempted to murder him, and he removed his school and started a settlement in the woods, which became the home of about twelve hundred Indians collected from a dozen different tribes.

The laws of British Columbia failing to protect the titles of the Indians to their property, this settlement was removed in 1887 to Annette Island, where the new Metlakahla was built. Here is a population of eight hundred religious, Sabbath-keeping, church-going people, taught in the mechanical and useful arts, with a church that will hold a thousand persons; peaceful, industrious, strictly temperate people, enjoying all the advantages of civilization. These are the people it is proposed to expel from the homes they have made, in order to gratify the greed of gold hunters.—N. Y. Advocate.

SUNDRIES.—Paris policemen now carry pieces of chalk, with which to mark the clothes of the roughs who bustle them or attempt to rescue their prisoners. When reinforcements arrive the assailants are readily identified.

An ordinance has lately been promulgated in Japan exhorting the people to eat more freely of meat, with a view to increasing the average height of the race. One of the most famous man-eating tigers in India was killed not long ago by the Maharajah of Sidhar. The tiger was an enormous brute and had killed eighty people.

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WANT TO EMIGRATE.—A large number of the Dakhobors, who have been suffering such persecution at the hands of the Russian Government, have been trying to secure permission to emigrate to America; but the Russian Government has replied that those can go who are not at present liable to conscription, or will not be liable within the next three years. They must also give a written statement relinquishing all claims to the land once held by them, or to any other possessions which they may leave behind them. The matter has been referred to the members of the community for final action. It is said that in all probability about 2,000 will emigrate either to Argentina or to the United States.

PATRIOTIC CARDS.—We are in receipt of advance proofs of three Patriotic "Private Post cards" in colors, issued by J. C. Wilson & Co., Paper Makers, Montreal. The first card represents Britannia with 'trident,' and Columbia with olive branch, sitting with the lion and eagle at their respective feet. The Union Jack, and Stars and Stripes crossed, the pole of which are joined and below the flags two hands clasped. A Globe between the flags, with the mottoes "One aim, one goal, Anglo-Saxon, Gloria Mundi." The second card represents the mail figure of Britannia with 'trident' sitting with the crouched lion at her feet. In the distance a battleship, and the old motto "Britannia rules the waves" &c. The third card represents the Union Jack with the words in the Union Crosses, "The flag that braved a thousand years, the battle and the breeze." These cards are sold to the trade at \$2.50 per thousand. They can be had retail from Stationers and Booksellers in Canada and the United States.
