News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A gentleman from Rhode Island has been looking over the timber land owned by a State of Maine syndicate in Grand Manan, with a view to erecting and operating a steam mill of the portable stamp.

The Moncton Transcript says: A counterfeit ten cent Canadian piece is in circulation. The coin is well made and hardly can be detected from the genuine except in the "jingle." The counterfeit seems to be composed of lead and tin.

The life crew at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, will be Messrs. Burton Henry and Grover Cook, Coleman Green, Harry Harvey, Colman Ingersoll and Capt. Frank Benson, coxswain.

At Edmundston, Thursday, fire consumed the dwelling of George Guerette. The greater part of the furniture was saved, as was also the store, situated a few feet away. Loss, about \$1,000; insurance, \$400.

D. B. Brownell, I. C. R. conductor on the night freight between Moncton and Campbellton, was badly injured at Gloucester Junction Friday night by being run over between the cars.

At Cherryfield a few miles from Moncton a ten year old boy of John Bulmer died of poisoning. Young Bulmer took a dose of Paris green so he would be sick and not have to go to school. He had some trouble with his school teacher and did not want to go to school.

In the aldermanic election for Carleton ward, in this city, last week, M. S. Hall defeated John McKnight by one vote. The total was: Hall, 218; McKnight, 217.

Fire destroyed the two story wooden building at South Bay known as the boom house and owned by Hon. James Holly. The house was occupied by two families, Joseph Arthur and Alexander Long. Very little of the furniture was saved.

In Woodstock, on Monday of last week, Thomas Lynch, clerk in the custom house, was drowned. He had been drinking heavily.

Wednesday morning the steamer Olivette, of the Star Line, lying on Hildyard's blocks, St. John, was burned to the water's edge. Insured.

On Friday evening David Gay, of Tabusintac, aged 75 years, while endeavoring to get his horses out of the barn, which was on fire, was himself burned to death. The crops and farm implements in the barn were all destroyed. Mr. Gay leaves a widow and one son.

A Point de Bute correspondent writes the Sackville Post as follows: The papers frequently contain paragraphs referring to very old citizens in the neighborhood. I wish to show what this place can do. Wm. Tingley, of this place, had a family of twelve children, one of which died in infancy; the others lived to a remarkable old age. John, died in his 81st year. Harris, died in his 81st year. Joshua, died in his 100th year. William, died in his 69th year. Caleb, died in his 70th year. Ann, died in her 83rd year. Mary, died in her 83 year. Joshua, died in his 76th year. Isaac, died in his 76th year. Healer is still living in his 90th year, as is also Margaret, who is between 80 and 85.

The storm of Sunday of last week did a good deal of damage to boats and houses at Grand Manan. One boat went ashore at Bencroft's Point, two fishing vessels ashore at Woodword's Cove, Capt. W. Cheney's new boat went ashore and was badly damaged. Newton's Licks and Guttridge's skiffs, of Grand Harbor, were blown to sea and lost. W. R. Green's and L. Henderson's boats were driven ashore and destroyed. Geo. Cheney's and H. Green's boats were driven ashore with little damage. The Flora and Nattie Gaskill are ashore at Grand Harbor and damaged. Twelve boats belonging to White Head are reported to be lost. J. G. Fraser's boat was driven to sea from Two Island Harbor; Arthur Green's boat, Eugene Wilcox's skiff and S. Chase's boat are ashore at Two Island and slightly damaged. The oldest inhabitants say they do not remember such a November storm. A foot of snow fell.

A reign of terror exists in St. Stephen among housekeepers on account of the prevalence of troublesome tramps. On Friday evening two called at C. F. Beard's residence while Mrs. Beard was alone in the house. When she went to the door they demanded admittance, and were attempting to force an entrance when Mrs. Beard's screams attracted the attention of a gentleman who was passing. When he arrived the tramps made a hasty departure. The police captured them a little later, and in the morning the police magistrate gave them fifteen minutes to get out of town. They had been operating during the previous day as umbrella menders.

Nan Cushing, the little daughter of Mr. Alston Cushing, was quite badly bitten Friday by a dog owned by Mr. Wm. Mellday, of St. John. Dr. J. H. Scammell was called and dressed the wounds on the child's arm and leg. The dog was ordered shot.

The inmates of the Barker House received somewhat of a shock Saturday morning by an explosion of acetylene gas, which shook the entire building. The new light was put into the hotel a few days ago. The generator had been placed in a room on the ground floor of the el. but on account of the odor from it reaching the office was being removed to another place when the explosion took place. The men had disconnected the generator from gas pipes and had the apparatus removed from the room. They returned with a lantern to cap the pipe. No sooner had they entered the room than a big flame spread through the room, followed by a report that shook the entire building, as above stated. Strange to say, neither of them scarcely felt the explosion. The glass in nearly all the cellar windows was broken. It is believed that only the fact that two or three doors were open in the rear saved the building from greater damage.

On Saturday night Martin Hansen was viciously attacked by two strangers on the street leading from the bridge in Calais. Hansen received a cut on the arm from a razor which nearly severed the arm, only the bone remaining. Hansen will probably lose his arm. It is presumed the men who committed the deed are two who have been tramping in this vicinity and from whom a stolen valise with ladies clothing was taken a short time previously. They probably thought Hansen one of the parties who took the valise and for that reason attacked him. No arrests have been made as yet.

Two former residents of Kent county went down in the steamer Portland. Lewis Nelson, the second pilot, resided there until eighteen years ago, when he removed to Portland, Me. Shortly after he secured a position on the steamer. The deceased was a native of Norway. He leaves a wife and family. The other victim was Fireman Allan Carter of Kouchibouguac. He also leaves a wife and family in Portland, Me.

In Halifax, Friday, Alexander R. Staylor was knocked down on Cogswell street by a frightened horse and rampled by the iron hoofs. He had his skull fractured and may die.

Another new industry has started in Yarmouth—the shipment of spruce Christmas trees to Boston.

The Dominion Coal Company, Cape Breton, reduces the pay for cutting coal 20 cents per ton.

Wife of Captain J. A. Scott, of the steamship Sual, died at Shanghai from hydrophobia, resulting from a bite received in protecting her children from a mad dog which entered the house. Capt. Scott belonged to Yarmouth county.

The C. P. R. express from Halifax, Friday morning ran into a loaded team one mile from the station. The driver of the team, named Sweeney, had both legs broken, and the wagon was smashed.

The Amherst Press says on Saturday last Capt. Dunn Wood and family and others left Shuley for Avonport in a schooner and have not been heard of since. They would be out in the storm of last Sunday, and enquiry fails to locate them up to the hour of going to press to-day. Capt. Wood belongs to River Hebert.

Alex Stater, who was run over Saturday in Halifax by a runaway team, died in the hospital Sunday.

At Lincoln, Neb., Thursday, fire destroyed the main building of the university. Loss, \$100,000; insurance, \$50,000.

In New York, Thursday, a seven-story building on West Third street was almost totally destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$150,000; partially insured.
