News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

A new sardine factory at Letang has just begun operations.

Advice from Grand Manan for weeks past have been to the effect that the catch of herring has been light. Now comes the word that they are very scarce.

The house of William Riley, Tatamagouche, was burned to the ground Tuesday morning. The furniture was saved. No insurance.

While John W. Baxter of Milltown and his family were absent from home on Tuesday, a thief walked off with fifty dollars worth of clothing.

A house at Red Head, near St. John, owned and occupied by Mr. Geo. Fitzpatrick, was burned early Friday morning. Mr. Paul Kingston aged 69, was burned to death.

Thursday, while loading plaster cars for the Albert Manufacturing Company, Albert Steeves, of Hillsboro, met with a painful accident. His foot got caught between the platform and the car and the bones were broken and the ankle joint torn open.

Word has reached Bathurst of the death of Frederick Bishop, oldest son of Samuel Bishop, merchant of Bathurst, at the hospital, Dawson City, on Sept. 16th. The young man was 21 years of age and died of typhoid fever.

W. A. Fillmore, Amherst, has an order for 20,000 fruit trees from an Ontario nursery firm.

The house of the late David Hall, opposite the Episcopal church, Lunenburg, has been sold for \$630, though built 120 years ago.

A few days since a man, 66 years of age, was sent to Dorchester from Nova Scotia, to serve out a sentence of nine years in the maritime penitentiary for stealing a piece of meat.

It came out at the Yarmouth town council the other day that a man was undergoing twenty days' imprisonment for not paying his dog tax.

The barn of Dr. L. R. Morse, Lawrencetown, N. S., containing 35 tons of hay, farming implements, three horses and two head of cattle, was destroyed by fire Wednesday. Loss about \$2,000.

At Liverpool, Wednesday, a large warehouse and contents, owned by John Millard, was totally destroyed by fire. The loss is partly covered.

A new market has been found for the products of Lawrence town creamery. Mr. James of Bermuda, has taken \$1,000 stock in the business and agrees to take all the output of both cheese and butter.

A statement was published Saturday night showing that one hundred and thirty Halifax men are worth an aggregate amount of \$12,400,000. William Roche and Senator MacKeen are down as the richest men in the city, with \$400,030 each.

The military authorities at Halifax, were informed by cable Wednesday, that the steamer Gallia had been chartered to leave England Dec. 10th with 203 men for the Linaster Regiment and sixty Royal Artillery for this station. A large number of rifles and heavy guns will come by the same steamer.

The public schools at Maitland, N. S., are closed on account of diphtheria.

A joint stock company is to establish a tannery at Bridgewater, N. S.

Between 200 and 300 tons of coal are being raised daily from the Joggins mines at the present time.

The body of Daniel Burns, aged 35, was found in a swamp near his home Sunday morning, and foul play is suspected. An investigation is being commenced. The deceased leaves a wife and three children.

Nova Scotia shippers of potatoes to Havana have received returns showing the gross receipts to have been \$5.50 per barrel. This gives a good margin for the shippers.

A Westbrook, N. S., letter says: "Mrs. Nelson, who recently heard from her husband, after a silence of 25 years, has since received a handsome check from the absent lover, who expresses his intention of coming out for her in the spring. Mr. Nelson went to his office in Truro a quarter of a century ago and disappeared as completely as if the earth had swallowed him. He reports that he has accumulated wealth in South Africa to the amount of \$100,000. The faithful wife has always believed he would return."

On Monday of last week, near Trenton, Ont., on the Grand Trunk R. R. a collision occurred between a freight train and express train, resulting in the killing of twelve persons, and the injury of several others. A mistake in changing a switch was responsible for the catastrophe.

British and Foreign.

The frozen vessel of the river Suchona, at Veltostok, Russia, broke Wednesday while a number of people and vehicles were crossing the stream. Twenty persons were drowned.

In a large fire, which completely destroyed an extensive timber shed in St. Petersburg, Friday, ten persons were burned to death.

Rev. D. Kne, rector of Christ's church, Belfast, and grandmaster of the Belfast Orangemen, died Sunday from apoplexy.

Admiral Dewey has informed the navy department that he has contracted a Hong Kong firm of wreckers to raise three of the Spanish war vessels sunk in the battle of Manila last May day. The cost of raising the ships and putting them in thorough repair will be \$500,000. It has also been found practicable to raise the former Spanish cruiser Reina Mercedes, sunk on June 3 near the entrance of Santiago harbor. Lt. Young has found that she had been sunk by open her sea valves.

The armored cruiser Maria Teresa, the sunken Spanish warship which was raised by Lt. Hobson and was on her way north, has been abandoned and lies a wreck off Cat Island.

In Brown Rock and Dixon counties, Nebraska, thousands of acres have been swept by prairie fires and much grain, many barns and several houses destroyed. In Gregory, Todd and Tripp counties, South Dakota, the range is on fire, and many cattle are reported lost. Settlers are fighting the flames with poor success.

The court of claims at Washington on Thursday rendered a judgment of \$1,961,400 in favor of the New York Indians who entered suit against the United States to recover the value of certain land donated to them in Kansas, as a reservation, but never occupied by them and subsequently disposed of by the United States.

Eleven men were killed and six were injured Friday morning being struck by a Pennsylvania train east of Hackensack river. They were employees of the railroad and were hit by the train during a thick fog.

Train hands on the 8.50 p. m. train from Boston report that a member of U. S. Battery K, of Portsmouth, fell from the train while it was crossing the high bridge over the Merrimack river at Newburyport Sunday night and was drowned. The battery reports that one of its members, Michael Kelleher, 26 years old, was visiting friends in Newburyport and was to have returned to duty Sunday evening. There seems no doubt that Kelleher was the unfortunate man.

At Cleveland, O. Sunday John Stefanien was shot and killed and John Fodorico mortally wounded by Sam Carr, a colored man from North Carolina. Carr entered Stefanien's yard in an intoxicated condition. Stefanien attempted to put him out. A quarrel ensued and Carr pulled a revolver and began firing. Carr was arrested.

A special from Perry, Iowa, says at midnight Sunday the business portion of the city of Perry is burning and the fire is beyond control. Several large brick blocks are already gone and the fire department is helpless to stay the progress. The Des Moines fire department is coming on the Rock Island road. The fire started in a large livery barn and was soon communicated to the Grand Lumber department store across the street. It then swept down the main street and over the residence district. The Methodist church and the Citizen's Bank are among the doomed buildings. The loss at present is about \$500,000.

Sr. Sebania plying along the Maine coast from points between Calais and Rockland, ran into the light house at Hancock point Friday afternoon and was beached to save her. The few passengers and mails aboard were taken off by the steamer Hector. The Sebania was of 89 tons register. The damage to her is not yet known.

Two masked men entered the residence of Asa M. Woodbury, on School street, about 6 o'clock Friday evening, and seizing him by the throat robbed him of a pocket book containing about \$50 and his silver watch, then hastily decamped overlooking a roll of \$200 in bills which Mr. Woodbury had in another pocket.

Claims for pensions on account of the Spanish war are now coming in rapidly. The total on file up to Friday Nov. 18th, is 1,947 for war service and 178 for naval service, exclusive of the claims of the battleship Maine victims.

Seven buildings in the John H. Starin shipyards at West New Brighton, S. L., were burned Friday morning. The loss is \$400,000. The building 72 and 74 Broadway New York was damaged by fire to the extent of \$75,000 early Friday morning. The occupants were broke-brake firms and their losses were not heavy.

LOBSTERS.—An order in Council has been passed suspending until 1900 the recently promulgated order preventing the taking of lobsters of less size than 10 1/2 inches, and restored the size limit to 9 1/2 inches.

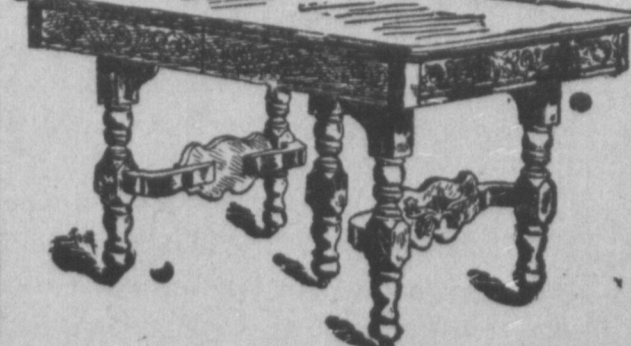
