News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

James Fitzgerald, a St. Louis, Kent county, farmer, while shooting Wednesday, accidentally shot himself in the left arm, shattering his wrist and hand so badly that amputation below the elbow was necessary.

A three year old child of Wm. Irving, St. Nicholas River, Kent Co., was butted to death by a ram Tuesday. The child had strayed into the yard and was not missed for some time. When found life was almost extinct and it died in a few minutes.

Messrs. Geo. T. Baird, of Perth Centre; J. E. Stewart and J. Allan Perley, of Andover; Claude Knapp, of Red Rapids; J. W. Tapley, of Riley Brook, and James McNair of Arthurville, are seeking incorporation as the Victoria Telephone Company, Limited. The capital stock of the company is \$5,000.

The Hampstead cheese factory has closed work for this year, which has been the best year in its history, the factory having made very nearly sixteen tons of cheese.

It is said that 3,119 visitors registered at the parliament buildings in this city, during the past summer, as compared with 1,745 during the summer of 1897. Of the visitors this season about 2,000 registered during July and August.

The house two barns and outbuildings of Charles Nugent, on the Hulton road, three miles from Woodstock, were burned to the ground Tuesday night. Besides the buildings, three hogs, over a hundred hens and a quantity of farm machinery, hay, grain and other farm products were burned. No insurance.

Early Saturday morning there was fire in the establishment of J. & A. McMillan, St. John. It was the heaviest fire in the city in three or four years. The building was badly gutted, and the plant and stock of the printing office, book-binding and book store badly damaged or destroyed.

The first meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Falls Water Power and Boom Company was held on Friday for the purpose of electing directors and to transact other business. It was reported that the capital stock of the company had been subscribed; the capital stock is \$1,000,000, and 10 per cent of the same has been paid into the Bank of Montreal. The engineers report showed that the necessary surveys have been completed. Plans for the proposed works, which will consist of the erection of pulp and paper mills, have been approved. The works will cost upwards of \$1,000,000.

A new 600 feet lift is being sunk at the Acadia colliery. This added to its present length will when driven make the total of the slope 5,200 feet—one of the deepest if not the deepest in America.

The Provincial Exhibition in Halifax last month did not pay expenses—the deficit amounting to \$8,061.81.

The Robb Engineering Co., Amherst, is building a automatic steam engine of high speed for Australia. They have sent an engine to the Isle of Man, and one to Spain.

The 44th term of the N. S. Normal School opened on Wednesday of last week. About 130 students were registered. These came from all parts of the province.

The proposed pulp mill at Parrboro will cost about \$100,000 and the capital of the company to operate it will be half a million dollars.

The French schooner Petite Jeanne, seized last week at North Sydney, C. B., was released Wednesday, the captain acknowledging the offence and paying \$400.

Mr. Donald McDonald, Q. C., of Antigonish, has been appointed a commissioner to investigate affairs in connection with Dorchester, N. B. penitentiary.

A man named Gillis, miner in Caledonia pit, Glace Bay, was killed by a fall of coal while at work Saturday. He leaves a widow and eight young children.

Stephen Hubby had both legs badly crushed at Deep Water terminus, Halifax, Tuesday. He got under a car to shelter himself from the rain. A train backed down on him, three wheels going over both legs. The limbs will have to be amputated.

A Middleton letter says that gravestones shipped in cold storage by the St. John City from Halifax to London netted \$2.75 and \$2.80, while some shipped ten days earlier, not in cold storage, but on a more active market, only brought \$1.50 to \$1.75, the fruit arriving in bad condition.

There were heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday morning. In Terra the freshets did much damage, injuring the reservoir and flooding the railway yard.

The North Sydney Herald says that over \$83,000 have been expended in the erection of new buildings in that town during the past six months.

Clark's Harbor has imported 5,000 barrels of herring this season for lobster bait.

Lunenburg has seventy schooners in the fishing business. The summer's catch averaged 1,200 quintals per vessel.

Thursday noon about five miles north west of Sodus, on Lake Ontario, the three masted schooner St. Peters, sank with all on board, save one, the captain, who was rescued in an unconscious condition.

At Vancouver, Wednesday the saw mill, of the Royal City Planing Mill Company, with a capacity of 90,000, 000 feet per year, one of the most complete on the Pacific coast, was almost totally destroyed by fire. The loss will reach several hundred thousands of dollars.

The centre building of the old Upper Canada College buildings, Toronto, now occupied by the Macdonald Manufacturing Company, as a tinware factory, was badly damaged by fire Friday. Loss \$50,000. Insured. Over a hundred men and women are thrown out of employment.

Frederick Beatty and Wm. Cox at Goderich, Ont., on Wednesday quarrelled. Cox shot Beatty, who died half an hour later.

A collision on the Union Pacific near Omaha, Neb., Wednesday resulted in the death of three men and the serious injury of one other.

Thomas S. Boyce and James Craig, two carpenters, were thrown from the top of a four story building in Walden, New York, Tuesday, by the fall of a scaffold. Both men died.

Seventeen negroes were killed in the Harperville, Miss., race riot.

In a fire at Texas, Friday Wm. Johnston and two children were burned to death.

In Haverhill, Mass., Friday two four story wood-n buildings occupied by Jacobs & S. M. dry goods Edward A. Mitchell, druggist, and other firms, were burned. Loss about \$50,000. Insured.

British and Foreign.

The German bark sank during the recent gales in the North S-a. The captain, his wife and the crew of nine were drowned, being all on board except a boy who was saved.

A late report says the overflowing of the Yellow River in Shantung province has caused the most appalling disaster of modern times in Central China. Villages were swept away by hundreds. One hundred thousand people are ruined and homeless, crouching along the river banks in the rain. Two thousand were drowned.

It is now recognized at St. Petersburg that the epidemic prevailing at Samarkand is the true plague. The mortality is high.

Sunday a great fire in Serinsagar, one of the capitals of Cashmere, in the Vale of Cashmere, destroyed all the public buildings and many residences. One man was killed. The damage is estimated at ten lakhs. (\$500,000.)

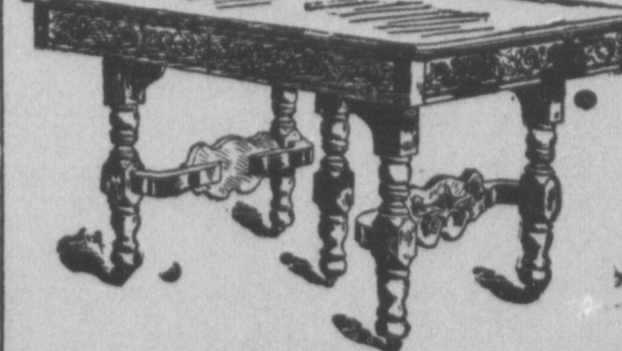
