News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

At Canterbury station one day last week a cow owned by William Jamieson was found dead in the same field where the others were poisoned. This makes seven cattle poisoned there in this last year.

Tuesday evening a special C. P. R. freight train near Hartland, run over and killed Edward Culbert, a boy about 15 years of age. He had sat down to rest and fell asleep on the track. The body was terribly mutilated.

Capt. Bloomfield Douglas, R. N. R., went to Grand Manan, Friday, to pick out a site for the lifeboat station, select a coxswain and crew and arrange for the construction of the boat house.

The Fredericton Boom Company rafted during the season 43,335 joints, containing 127 tons of timber, 16,980 superficial feet of hemlock, 4,341,090 pine, 7,466,300 cedar and 106,782,744 of spruce; total, 118,807,144 feet.

A disastrous fire occurred at Appleton, York county, on Saturday night a week ago, when the home of Benjamin Appleby was completely destroyed, together with two barns and their contents. All the household effects were lost.

Lulu, the ten years old daughter of Rev. A. G. Downey of Somerville, Carleton Co., ran against the handle of a broom in another little girl's hand while they were playing together. The end of the handle struck her in the eye completely destroying the sight.

Thomas A. Buckley, brakeman on the northern division of the I. C. R., met with an accident in the Montserrat yard Wednesday that resulted in his death a few hours later. His right foot caught in a frog and he was run over and his right leg and the lower part of his body was badly mutilated. He was about thirty years of age.

Last week the residence of Dr. H. B. Hay at Chipman, Queens county, was discovered to be on fire, and the house was considerably damaged.

Alfred Buckler, farmer of West Dalhousie, died Wednesday from a gunning accident. The contents lodged in the lower part of his leg and foot. Mortification set in with fatal results.

Michael Burns was badly scalded at the Mar time Sulphite Fibre company's works, Carleton Place, Saturday morning. He was breaking a joint in a hot water pipe, when the water was turned on in the engine room. He heard the rush of water coming and only had time to grasp a pipe and hold himself up half way from danger, when the water struck him and scalded his legs very severely.

The plebiscite taken on Monday in Fredericton on the question of granting the new shoe company a bonus of \$10,000 and tax and water exemptions was carried. The vote cast was 662 and only forty were marked "No."

The case against George F. Simon for shooting at some boys at Campbellville was dismissed on application of A. W. Macrae, who contended that the papers and proceedings were faulty.

John McEchern, of Bridgeport, C. B., committed suicide by hanging Monday, while temporarily insane.

A truckman ran over a ten-year-old son of James Hunt at Halifax Monday evening, and he died in half an hour.

Mrs. Patrick Connolly of Canoe, who died last Friday, had reached the advanced age of 99.

There has been considerable cattle stealing at Weymouth. Maynard Jenkins, a colored man, is suspected of being implicated in the thefts.

A cablegram says a picture of Halifax in 1750 has been discovered in the British Museum.

The Londonderry Iron Co. shipped in August, 700 tons of cast iron water pipe.

Nova Scotia captured the majority of the prizes for beef, dairy and grade cattle at the St. John Exhibition, securing 42 firsts, 32 seconds and 21 thirds.

It is stated that coal mining is to be resumed again at Port Morien in a few days. A mine is to be opened at False Bay beach. The people of Port Morien are to be congratulated.

C. T. White is about to rebuild his mill at Apple River, Cumb. Co., destroyed by fire last spring.

Buyers of apples are purchasing great quantities in the region of Canoe, paying for them, delivered at the warehouse, at the rate of \$2.00 per barrel.

At Little Glass Bay C. B., Friday morning a house occupied by Miss Mary Kilday was discovered on fire. After considerable furniture had been saved Miss Kilday returned to the burning building, and being overcome by fire was burned to death. She was an elderly lady.

The provincial exhibition was formally opened Thursday. Speeches were made by Governor Daly. The live stock exhibit is fully equal to the past, the main building is better than before, and machinery and horticultural halls are well filled. The fruit exhibit is the best ever seen in Nova Scotia.

The wheat crop of Manitoba is now estimated to be 32,000,000 bushels.

The most destructive storm of the year swept over Montreal Sunday of last week, causing thousands of dollars' damage to windows and skylights. Hail stones the size of pigeon's eggs fell in abundance and the death is reported as indirectly due to this cause. A trolley wire was broken during the height of the storm and struck a passer-by, instantly killing him.

United States.

Eight persons were cremated and eight more fatally burned Tuesday night in the most disastrous fire that ever occurred in Toledo, Ohio. The spontaneous combustion of dust in a grain elevator caused the disaster.

No less than 182 people were killed by the heat in New York city alone, during the last heated term of six days in September. Besides those killed, there were 600 prostrations that were not fatal. Taking the whole country, the deaths from the heat must have exceeded anything ever known in the United States.

Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota have produced this year crops the value of which is estimated to be \$150,000,000. The three states have raised 200,000,000 bushels of wheat, 75,000,000 bushels of corn, 90,000 bushels of oats and several million bushels of barley, flax, potatoes, a large crop of hay and several million dollars' worth of hogs, cattle and horses.

An explosion of fire damp occurred at the Empire coal mines near Brownsville, Pa., Friday. Fifty miners have been entombed. Two have been taken out dead. There were 130 men at work at the time and all but fifty escaped without injury. Five men are believed to have been killed and a large number are still entombed.

In New Orleans Wednesday, William Daughine while attending a theatre got into a violent fit of laughing. The laughter passed into convulsions, and an ambulance was summoned, but he died before it arrived.

British and Foreign.

An electric street car was derailed descending a hill at Bradford, Eng., one day last week. Fifty persons were seriously injured. Several of them are dying.

The French wheat crop is estimated at 123,000 hectolitres, the largest since 1874, when the yield was 136,000,000 hectolitres. This will render France independent of foreign importations of wheat.

Australian advices tell of a daring bank robbery at Penhurst, about 200 miles from Melbourne. An unknown man entered the branch of the Bank of Victoria and covering the manager with a revolver bound and gagged him and stole £600 in notes and gold.

THE TYPEWRITER AN INNOVATION.—An English legislator recently presented a typewritten petition in the House of Commons, and created quite a sensation. It is a rule that all such documents must be presented in written or lithographic form, and the speaker decided that typewritten manuscript was a violation of the rule and a blow at the dignity of Parliament. A newspaper says of this curious decision:

The same rule applies to all of the official departments of the British government. All documents that emanate from the various branches of the Ministry are still written in longhand upon the same kind of paper that has been in use for several centuries, and that is manufactured expressly for them. No private individual is allowed to use official paper for any purpose whatever. Quill pens are still the ordinary instruments of literary labor in the executive departments, as they are in the universities, the courts, and in the old-fashioned lawyers' offices. We visited an examination room in one of the colleges at Oxford the other day, where a number of students had just finished the examination known as the 'Great-go,' which comes at the end of the college year, and upon the table in the center was a large box filled with several hundred quill pens, which had just been discarded by the students and were being gathered up by the janitors. It was only recently that steel pens were allowed in the Bank of England. A typewritten communication on official subjects would not be received in some of the British offices nor in the courts; but in America are almost as far behind the times, for it is only since the Harrison administration that typewriters have been used in the State Department at Washington. Even now all communications to the foreign legations of the United States and the diplomatic representatives of other governments at Washington have to be written in longhand. Our Ministers abroad are still required to use the same method in preparing their dispatches to the government. Mr. Blaine was the first man to introduce the typewriter, and if he had remained in office several years longer that convenient instrument would have been furnished to all the foreign representatives of the United States.

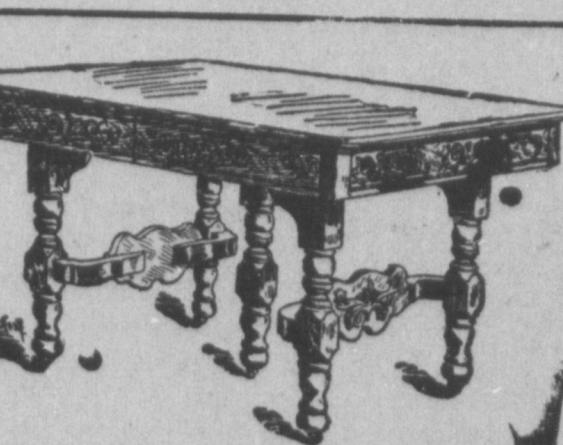
