

The District Meeting recommends that each church take at least one collection for the purposes of the Plebiscite Campaign; that the pastors speak frequently to their people of the importance of rolling up a full vote in favour of prohibition; and declares it the duty of every church member (being a voter) to vote for prohibition, and of all members (whether voters or not) to do their utmost to bring about the delegatization of the liquor traffic, and, eventually, its absolute annihilation. A motion to change the time of beginning the District Meeting from Saturday to Friday was discussed. The laymen talked freely about it; the feeling was decidedly against the change, and the motion was lost. Brethren McLeod, Phillips, Daggett, Crandemire and McGee were appointed to visit Gordonsville, at their earliest convenience, and counsel the church there concerning matters in which it seeks help. The committee on licentiates recommended that licenses be continued to brethren C. Stirling and J. E. Puddington, and it was done. The people of Connell deserved the hearty thanks of the meeting for their generous entertainment. The business being completed, the meeting adjourned at 3 p. m. The next session will be held either at Hartland or Lower Brighton, as the brethren of the two churches may determine.

PETITCODIAC, N. B.—Our people here have recently given a peculiar demonstration of their faith in the gospel, and have added another testimony to their belief in the public worship of God, by "beautifying the place of His sanctuary." Two months ago, at a special business meeting of the church, it was resolved to make some necessary alterations and repairs to the interior of the church edifice. The importance of the resolution and all that it entailed will be readily appreciated by those who know the size of the building, which is comparatively large, and our denominational constituency, which is comparatively small. At first it was decided to do only what was really pressing in the way of repairs, but as the work got under way the need of a complete interior renovation became apparent, and this noble little band, who possess in a marked degree "the grace of liberality," determined to honor the Lord with a whole sacrifice so that, while the work was begun with the intention to do a little, it has ended with having done a great deal. A heavy plaster cornice, which by its own weight was loosening and becoming dangerous, was removed, and the fractured walls and ceiling refaced and kalsomed; the wood finish and seats have been painted, a new carpet has been laid in the aisle, and six new chairs placed for the use of the choir. This, with numerous incidentals, caused an outlay of \$150.00, every cent of which came directly as a free-will offering from our own people. The men and the women "had a mind to work," and, as a result, we have to-day as neat and clean a place of worship as one could desire. We have reason to rejoice in the fact that every item of debt has been paid, for which we "thank God and take courage."

By the courtesy of our Baptist friends we worshipped in their church during the time of repairs, but on Sunday June, 19, we got back home, and engaged our souls in dedicatory exercises. Amid surrounding freshness and a brilliant floral display, the pastor conducted the service, assisted by the Rev. Joseph Pascoe (Methodist).
