News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Walter L. Taylor, a young Englishman, is under arrest in St. John on the charge of forgery. He gave a cheque for \$150, the name of G. C. Carter being forged to it. He says he has been crazed with drink for some time.

The Lutes Mountain cheese factory is running full capacity, getting 3,500 pounds of milk daily, as compared with 2,000 pounds last year.

Miss Morris, matron of the Victoria hospital, has also handed her resignation to the board of trustees, to take effect on July 1st.

Alex. Mackenzie, of Spar Cove road, had his right leg broken in two places and was badly cut about the head and face Friday by a cellar wall caving in on him.

Milligan Rodgers, of Northampton, four miles below Woodstock, lost five cows by lightning during Tuesday's terrible storm. Six cows were taking shelter under an old fir tree in his pasture and only one escaped.

Percy Lewis, charged with attempting to marry his wife, pleaded guilty before Judge Forbes of St. John, and was allowed to go on his own recognizance in consideration of his previous good behavior.

Grand Manan fishermen continue to feel the influence of the Cuban war. Not a single sale of fish has been made since the war was declared. About \$20,000 of fish are ready for shipment.

A destructive fire occurred on the 17th inst. at Tracy Mills, C. Co. Mr. Z. Sloan's house, barn and grist mill were burned. The saw mill owned by Edward Sloan & A. Miller was also burned to the ground. The loss is very heavy. 125,000 feet of lumber and 10,000 feet of waisteering was destroyed. The only insurance, was \$1000 on Mr. Z. Sloan's house.

Among the late provincial appointments are the following in Carleton Co.: James G. Atkinson, M. D., Bristol, to be a coroner; Amos D. Hartley and George A. Giberson, both, to be justices of marriage licenses; William O. Cluff, William A. Hayward and Andrew T. Raff to be justices of the peace.

In Moncton, June 21, the five year old son of Smith Brown, jr., fell down stairs with a lamp in his hand, igniting a severe gash in his throat from the pieces of the broken lamp.

Charles Hayes, a resident of the head of the Millstream, fell from the roof of his barn Tuesday and received injuries which caused his death. He was in the 44th year of his age.

Peter McNaughton's home at Stanley and Rainford Boones house at Dorne Ridge, both in York county, were burned with most of the contents last week. There was a small insurance on each building.

A very serious accident occurred at a house No. 134, Britain street, St. John, Saturday morning. Mr. Frank Duffee carpenter with two men named Thomas Commack and Mr. McArthur were engaged in the shingling the back of the house. A staging had been erected to the roof and as the shingling was completed on the lower portion of the house the men were at work on the upper part about 28 feet above the ground. About 11:20 o'clock Mr. Duffee came down off the staging for some more material leaving Commack and McArthur at work. The men stepped on a board which broke and both were precipitated to the ground. In falling McArthur struck one of the cross-pieces of the staging and cut his nose and mouth severely. This broke his fall and he sustained no further injury. Commack fell heavily to the ground striking on his back and rebounding. McArthur at once went to the assistance of his fellow workman and carried him into the house. Dr. Daniel was summoned and pronounced his injuries of a very serious nature. Both were taken to the hospital. After getting his wounds dressed McArthur was able to go home but Commack was so seriously injured that it is feared he will not recover.

Nova Scotia.

George Lloyd, 22 years of age, a native of Oyster Ponds, N. S., was drowned by the capsizing of a dory on the Banks.

Fire Tuesday badly damaged two buildings on Water street, Halifax, occupied by Crowell Bros. as a hardware store, and D. R. Helsler as a grocery establishment. The damage is estimated at over \$30,000 which is nearly covered by insurance.

The export of canned lobsters from Halifax up to June 19 this year is 40,800 cases. At the corresponding time last year the export was 33,470 cases.

The store and dwelling at Annapolis occupied by William Malcolm was damaged by fire Thursday evening to the amount of about \$600. Insured.

The old Ritchford house at Partridge Island, Parrsboro, one of the landmarks of the place, has been torn down this spring. It was 108 years old.

The closing exercises of the Halifax School for the Blind took place last week. It was also the twenty-fifth anniversary of Superintendent Fraser's connection with the school. Governor Daly, in commemoration of the occasion, presented the school with a beautiful corridor clock. The graduating class consists of ten.

Among the passengers of S. S. Roumanian, arrived at Halifax last week, there was a case of small-pox. Twenty-one steerage passengers, chiefly Germans, are held in quarantine.

Rev. D. H. Simpson, pastor of the Baptist church, Berwick, had his leg broken a few days ago by a kick from his horse.

The Yarmouth Herald says that Mr. Benjamin Roberts, of Glenwood, 93 years of age, and his wife Elsie, 91 years are enjoying good health. Mr. Roberts helping with the planting this spring. They have had 10 children, 38 grandchildren and 36 great grandchildren.

A three-storey tenement on Grafton street, Halifax, was gutted by fire Wednesday morning and an aged couple, William Arley and his wife, who slept on the top floor, were burned to death.

The prospects for a great fruit crop in the Annapolis Valley are said to be not as encouraging as they were a few days ago when the orchards were a mass of bloom. From all quarters of the Valley an unusually heavy dropping of the fruit formations is reported, and it is feared that the crop instead of being a large one will hardly equal the average, even if favorable conditions prevail for ripening and harvesting.

It is reported that Rocky Mountain locusts have made their appearance in small sections of southwestern Manitoba. They are the same as the grasshoppers that overran the country in 1874-5 and at different periods previously.

One death has occurred among the Galician immigrants quarantined outside of Winnipeg for small pox and measles.

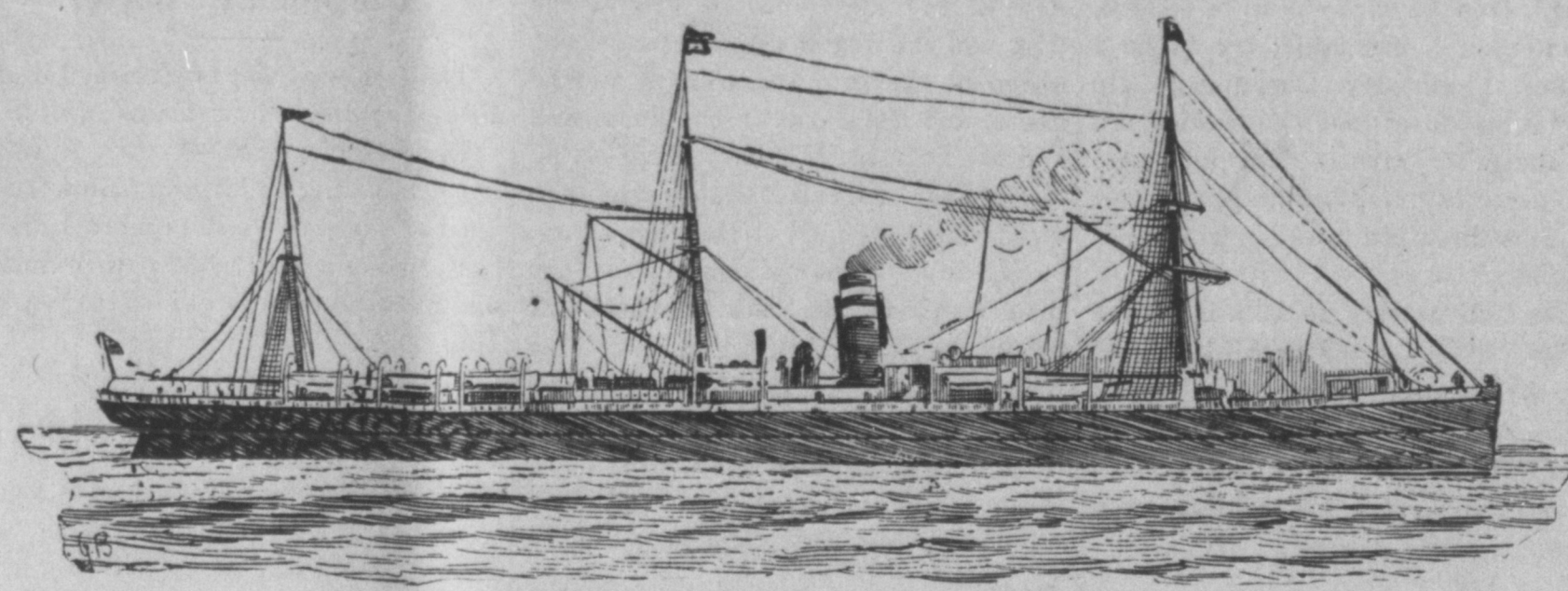
At Plattsville, Ont., Wednesday, Charles Hoffman, proprietor of the stove factory, was killed. His arm became caught between a belt and the pulley and was pulled off at the elbow. He received other injuries from which he died soon after.

Johnnie Powell, an English boy, on Tuesday at Austin, Min., shot and killed the four-year-old son of his employer, E. C. Wheeler, and then committed suicide. The motive for the awful crime is supposed to be the refusal of Wheeler to allow the boy to attend a picnic.

Henry Burke, Southport, a well-known fruit tree agent, was found dead in his house yesterday evening a short time after having returned from Charlottetown. The body was found lying on the floor, as though it had fallen from a chair. Burke has a wife and daughter in the United States. Deceased lived alone, taking his meals at a neighbor's. He had heart trouble two years ago, and this was aggravated by bicycle riding, probably causing his death. The verdict of the jury was death from natural causes.

J. B. Luselle, proprietor of the Hubpool room on Sussex street Ottawa, poisoned himself with a dose of carbolic acid at noon Friday.

A letter from Capt. Hall, of the steamer Alpha, which is on a voyage from Halifax to Vancouver, states that while at anchor at San Point, Straits of Magellan, the pilot and four sailors were drowned. The men were returning from a hulk in a boat, which upset near the steamer, and the current carried all five out of the reach of rescuers. The men lost were Freeman Enbree, Port Hawkesbury, N. S.; James McGrath, Halifax; Edward Sellhus, Ship Harbor, N. S.; and L. Sengen, a native of Norway. The pilot's name is unknown.

United States.

Locusts are doing great damage in Dakotas and it is feared the plague will be general next year. The State entomologist of Minnesota has issued warnings to farmers, after making an inspection of the Dakotas at the solicitation of the Northern Pacific Railway officials, to adopt every means of destroying the eggs that will be deposited this year, by ploughing their land deep, fire, etc.

Fire Saturday destroyed the business portion of Park City, Utah. The property loss is estimated at nearly \$1,000,000. Many people are homeless.

A fire caused by the explosion of a gasoline stove Sunday destroyed the entire business portion of Tracy, Cal. The total loss is about \$7,000.

All the coal mines in the Jericho district, Kentucky, will soon be transferred to an English syndicate.

A special from Tampa, Fla., to the World says: A stroke of lightning, which occasioned a terrific rain storm Friday night, killed one man and injured fourteen others in the camp of the second New York regiment of volunteers. The storm swept over the Florida coast with the intensity that characterizes tropical storms.

British and Foreign.

Good rains have fallen in Victoria, Australia, and it is estimated have improved the value of the wheat crop of Victoria by \$1,000,000.

One of the boats of Russian ship capsized Wednesday, off Noumea, capital of New Caledonia, and 14 sailors were devoured by sharks.

A despatch from Constantinople says: A band of forty brigands, has abducted a sister of Sultan. The Princess was seized while she was out walking a few miles from Constantinople.

During the launching of the new British battleship Albion, of 32,950 tons, at Beachwall Tuesday, the displacement of water caused an immense mass of water to rise on all sides, completely submerging one of the lower stages of the yard and immersing hundreds of people. The bodies of over thirty men, women and children have been recovered.
