News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

David Richards' saw mill at Campbellton, which was completely destroyed by fire a few days ago was insured for \$10,000.

The Woodstock canning factory is now at work preserving berries, making jams, juices, etc. The work on vegetables will commence shortly.

The saw-mill near Dumbarton Station, Charlotte Co., was burned down on Friday night last. Whether the fire caught from a spark from the engine, or whether it was the result of incendiarism, is not known. It was owned by Mr. Johnson, and has not been running for some time. Insured.

At Newcastle the grand jury found no bill against Wm. Curtis, charged with shooting the boy, Garfield Astles, at a Blackville charivari a few weeks ago.

Ezekiel Doughwright committed suicide at Moncton one day last week by hanging. Doughwright was a married man, about 44 years of age.

At Campbellton, Tuesday, fire destroyed the barn and shed of German Thibault. Mr. Thibault lost a horse. Loss about \$500, insurance.

Thos. Roach of Roachville, Sussex, the well known breeder of Ayrshire cattle, had a valuable chestnut horse poisoned one day last week. Paris green had been mixed with some food. It is hoped to discover the perpetrator of the crime.

A special on the Canada Eastern collided with a box car projecting from a siding at Blackville. Conductor Long was hurt, and Engineer Mick was thrown from his engine but not hurt. The engine, after colliding, ran about a mile and the broken tender came in contact with the bridge over the South-west Miramichi river, damaging that structure considerably.

At Hillsboro Saturday two sons of Willard Harding Steeves playing on a raft were precipitated into the water and one aged 18 years were drowned.

Friends gathered at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Graham, No. 94 Portland street, Monday evening of last week, to aid in the celebration of the 40th anniversary of their wedding. They were the recipients of a handsome Morris chair and beautiful parlor lamp.

A few days ago Ambrose Fanning lost a foot at Debec. He attempted to jump on a moving car but slipped and fell so far under the car that the trucks ran over his foot. The foot had to be amputated.

New Brunswick farmers should remember that \$700,000 will be given at the St. John Exhibition in extra Grain and Fruit prizes to each county in the Province. Twelve prizes for Grains and Flour prizes for Fruits will go to each county, making over 200 prizes in all. This will give every exhibitor several chances for a prize. Entries should be sent in before August 29th. Prize lists can be obtained from Chas. A. Everett, Manager and Secretary, St. John, N. B.

Dr. Phillip Cox, of Chatham, has gone to Quebec, where he will spend the greater part of his vacation in studying the fresh water fishes of the province. He goes at the instance of the Royal Society of Canada and the Geographical Department.

Great difficulty is being experienced in getting capital for the proposed pork packing establishment, in St. John, to which Mr. Packenham, of Dublin, offered \$5,000. It looks as if the effort to establish the factory will be a failure.

By recent postal changes in Carlton Co. Hartford, Wakefield Centre, Llang, Bloomfield and Brookville, will get three mails a week, instead of two. Good's Corner, Pioneer, and Long Settlement, will be served from Centreville and get three mails a week. Knoxfield and Greenfield will get three. Tracey Mills will receive a daily mail.

A house and barn owned by Thomas Rawline, three miles from Moncton, were destroyed by fire together with all its contents on Thursday night. Insurance, \$100; loss about \$600.

Nova Scotia.

Over 100,000,000 lobster fry have been hatched in the Pictou hatchery this season, and have been distributed in the beds around Pictou Island. Last year over 200,000,000 were planted in the same locality.

Efforts are being made to start a boot and shoe factory in Bridgetown. Stock lists were circulated last week and quite a number of shares have already been subscribed for.

A few days ago Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Rhodes, of Amherst, entertained eight of the oldest citizens of Amherst, at supper, at Sycamore Lawn. The combined age of the party was 670 years, an average of nearly 84 years.

Admiral Simpson, chief in command of the United States navy, has many relations in Cape Breton, says the North Sydney Herald. Admiral Simpson's father was born at L'Ardoise, Richmond County, and when a young man left that place for the United States where he married, the admiral being one of the sons.

Eli Oakle, residing near Bridgewater, fell dead at his home Wednesday while dressing. Heart disease was the cause.

The directors of the Nova Scotia Pork Packing Company have decided not to go any further with the enterprise until the full amount of the \$25,000 capital is subscribed.

The tourist travel to Cape Breton promises to be the largest for many years. Every train and boat brings the parties from the different parts of the United States and from Canadian cities.

One day last week the Merchants' bank at Bridgewater received the largest brick of gold ever taken from the mines in this or adjacent counties. It weighed 553 ounces and was valued at about \$10,500. It came from the mines at Brookfield.

The canned lobsters shipped from Halifax, and which were on board the Bourgogne, amounted to 9,782 cases, worth \$104,000. They were insured to their full value.

As high as 6,800 quarts of strawberries have been shipped from Waterville station in one day.

John Lewis & Sons, of Truro, manufacturers of peg wood, pegs, bottle tops, lasts, etc., intend removing their mill to Sheet Harbor where they have purchased a large tract of timber land, about 12,000 acres. The firm is said to be one of only two in the world that manufacture peg ribbon for pegging machines.

At South Brook, N. S., the eighteen months old child of John Brown was drowned. The parents left the child alone in the house and on returning found it had fallen into a tub of utter-milk.

The Telegraph summarizes the results of wheat-raising experiments at the Model farm, Nappan. Different kinds of wheat were tried, and the period of ripening ranged from 105 to 113 days.

A fatal accident occurred on the Drummond Counties railway in Quebec, last week by which a brakeman was killed and Trackmaster Edward Lockhart of Petite Riviere, who has been looking after the ballast on the Drummond road, had one leg broken. The breaking of a cable on the steam shovel caused the accident.

Five cases of smallpox have been discovered in the Galician settlement, near Snowy Mountain, Manitoba. The cases are among a batch of recently arrived immigrants.

There are one million and a half acres under wheat in the province of Manitoba, and \$1,500,000 worth of buildings being erected in the city of Winnipeg.

In Toronto, Friday night, Mrs. Brandon and her daughter were terribly burned by fire at their dwelling. The fire was caused by the girl attempting to light a fire with kerosene oil. The girl died, and the mother lingers in terrible agony.

A boiler explosion took place at Sycamore Mills, Ont., Friday. James Palm, a mill hand, and John D-mbo, fireman, were instantly killed. Chas. Betts, proprietor of the mill, was fatally injured, and several mill hands received injuries.

The apple crop throughout the whole of Western Ontario will be one of the largest for many years, and the quality promises to be equal to the quantity.

Pietro Cappello, arrested in Montreal on a charge of murdering his wife and daughter in New York, has confessed his crime. He is the head of a gang of counterfeiters who have been flooding the surrounding country with spurious quarters, fifty and ten-cent pieces.

United States

Eleven men lost their lives at Cleveland, Ohio, Monday evening as a result of an explosion of gas in the water works tunnel that is being constructed under the bottom of Lake Erie.

A waterspout at Steelville, Mo., almost swept away the town and drowned thirteen persons.

Nearly all the shoe factories of New England are shut down at present, and are expected to remain so for several weeks.

During the session of Congress which has just closed the total appropriations footed almost \$900,000,000, and upwards of \$360,000,000 of this was for purely war purposes. It was the largest appropriation by any session since the civil war. One feature of the session was the enactment of the war revenue law. Its framers expect it to produce \$150,000,000.

Preliminary returns of the spring wheat acreage in the United States show a total area seeded of 16,800,000 acres, which, added to the area of winter wheat—26,200,000—makes a total acreage of 43,000,000, or over 3,500,000 acres greater than last year. The average condition of the winter wheat is 90.8 as compared with 78.5 as the corresponding date last year. The average condition of spring wheat is the almost unprecedented one of 100.9 as compared with 89.6 on June 1, 1897.
