occasions, and special offerings be taken; and further, that the Secretary of each of these societies shall be the person to call the attention of the pastors and churches to these matters previous to the time for raising such monies.

The name of Rev E C Wall was, by motion, added to the list of elders, on recommendation of the Elders' conference.

The obituary committee reported the names of Edmund Ross, Susan Durkee, Jacob Lockhart, Welner Cox and Eldred Cohoon who had fallen in the ranks by death this year. Their counsels and labors have comforted many.

The location of the Conference at the next yearly meeting was left to the executive.

The Public Questions report condemned Sunday bicycle riding for pleasure, laid emphasis on the use of Bible in Sunday Schools, and greater care in selecting S School books.

The situation of the Prohibition question was regarded as disappointing, but not hopeless. In the present confusion, no clear plan could be suggested for united action, but the avowal of the "Prohibition first" idea for voters legislators, and measures was very decided. Stress was laid on steady work in temperance instruction in the schools and local societies.

Resolved, (1) That our people insist upon our representatives being pledged and tried Prohibitionists, and that we earnestly ask all voters to stand by their convictions and vote only for such as representatives of the people.

(2) That we believe the time has come when Prohibition as a great moral question should have precedence of all other questions.

(3) That we sincerely trust that our entire fellowship will faithfully regard our oft repeated resolutions and our covenant vows.

In the corresponding secretary's report two new churches were reported, Apple River and Salem, Cumberland Co and Westfield, Queens Co. One new meeting house at Westfield. There were 52 additions and the same number died and dismissed.

Reported membership, 3,414; monies raised, \$7,601; Sunday Schools, 38; pupils and teachers, 2,428; S S receipts, \$350.

The Y. P. Societies and Sunday Schools are in a flourishing condition. A new church is building at Pubnico.

The Education meeting gave especial attention to the Correspondence School as a means of theological education. Revs Hartley and Crowell spoke on this subject. The Elder's Conference also instructed them to recommend a course of study for licentiates and pastors at next year's meeting. Rev Mr Siddall spoke "on Educated Ministry."

Saturday, 7.30 p. m.—The Young People's Union had a grand meeting, showing 725 members in societies, and a good interest. Rev. D T Porter is the new president. Mrs. J W Freeman is the secretary. Miss W G Crowell's address of welcome was particularly fine. Miss Sadie Harding, of Yarmouth, and Mrs. George Phillips, of Clark's Harbor, gave beautiful and appropriate solos.

SUNDAY SERVICES.

Rev. G M Wilson preached the annual conference sermon at 10.30 a. m. His theme was "Apostolic power." It was ably presented. Rev. G F Currie, N B delegate, preached at three p. m. Rev. J K West at 7.30 p. m.; Rev. D T Porter at the Kirk, 10.30; Rev. O F Cooper, at the Union House, 3; Rev. T H Siddall, at Baptist house, 7.30; Rev. F S Hartley, at Clark's Harbor, 10.30; Rev. Joseph Wilson, Port La Tour, 10.30.

The Monday sessions were occupied with questions of routine. With a view to expeditious business it was resolved that hereafter the conference shall be in continuous session giving room only for the reports and prepared programs of the societies for the time allotted. The RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCER was commended for its good work and received a vote of aid.

The weather, entertainment, music all conspired to make the yearly meeting a memorable one. Suitable motions of acknowledgment were passed and read at a rousing meeting of the Temperance League Monday night, where the suppressed wit of the past week found vent.

Bro. Gosline, the new moderator proved to be an efficient chairman. May he and his churches enjoy a blessing this year.

—The new Presbyterian church built last winter at North Sydney, C. B., at a cost of over \$12,000 was completely gutted by fire Saturday morning. The bell tower and foundation and one side of the wall still stand. The seats and stained glass windows were removed, but of the rest of the edifice dedicated with such pride and thanksgiving a few months ago naught remains but a pile of unsightly ruins. The debt is not yet cleared, but will be covered by insurance which amounts to \$6,000.

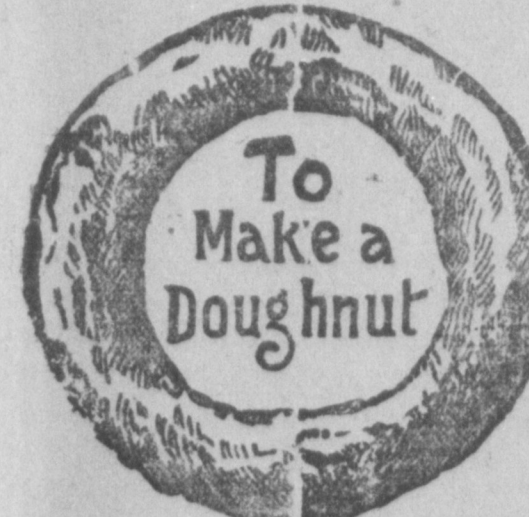
Travel Arrangements.
