BOY DRUNKARDS. — President Arthur W. Bishop, of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, in Patterson, N. J., recently, presented to the Grand Jury a remarkable case. It was that of twenty-seven boy drunkards, ranging in age from eight to fourteen years, and Mr. Bishop asked the dealers who sold the liquor to the children, he indicated the evidence goes to show that these children were supplied with whiskey by Zooker & Steier at the rate of fifteen cents for a small bottle, or five cents a drink, and it was often consumed on the premises. Most of the evidence against them was secured through the parents, who were horrified when their little ones came home to them intoxicated. Others were found intoxicated in the street.

And the people who apologize for the traffic and for those engaged in it are broad-minded men, not narrow snarks? A BIG SHIP. — The greatest steamship the world has ever seen is the White Star liner "Oceanic," which was recently launched at Belfast. She is nearly an eighth of a mile in length (longer than the Great Eastern, and more shapely), and when its machinery, supplying 28 000 horsepower is placed, will have cost nearly \$5,000,000. Its construction occupied exactly twenty-two months. Some 1,700,000 rivets hold together its external plates, which number 1 323, and weigh two and a half tons each. The Oceanic's first transatlantic trip will be made in the summer. There is accommodation for 1,500 passengers and a crew of 400, and room for an enormous cargo.

BIBLE WORK IN SPAIN. — The Rev. R. O. Walker, in the Bible Society Reporter, gives an interesting account of work among the soldiers returning from Cuba to Spain. Large numbers come back wasted in body, through hardship and disease. Many never reach their home. One transport buried 105 bodies at sea. Of 1498 on board another when she arrived at Cadiz, 800 were ill and 400 in a grave condition. At all ports of arrival efforts are made to bring the message of the gospel to the suffering soldiers. From Coruna, Miss Geiser, a missionary, writes, telling how she has been able to comfort some: "I have been twice into the Red Cross sanatorium, and was allowed to go from bed to bed with words of cheer and gospel for each. The first time Mr. P. and I stole our way in, but the doctor very kindly took us to his room and gave us permission to distribute books. "They did not want Romanism," he said, and have refused to allow Sisters of Mercy to come in and act as nurses." The soldiers stay for a little time, and are free from the influence of the priests. When they go on to their homes in the country to which they carry their Christian books with them.

SUNDRIES.—In Queen Elizabeth's reign the expenses of the navy were about £6 000 a year, a contrast to the present huge sum of £25,000 000 sterling spent annually on the fleet. There were at the close of the fiscal year 73 570 post offices in the United States. . . . C is dearer in South Africa than in any other part of the world. It is cheapest in China. The tomb of M. ha-mad is covered with diamonds, a pphires, and rubies, valued at \$2,500,000. The largest organ in the world is in the Cathedral of S. ville, Spain. It has 5,300 pipes and 110 stops. The number of Buddhists is computed to be 455,000 000.
